FIRE TRUCK IS ON WAY HERE

Machine Was Shipped From
Factory on July 25
Letter Says.

TO UNDERGO TESTS

Underwriters Will Test Out
Machine to See That It
Fills All Requirements
Before City Accepts.

Roseburg's new Stutz fire en-
gine is expected to arrive in
Roseburg between the 7th and
10th of August, according to word
received here today. The truck
was shipped from the factory on
the 25th, and allowing ample time
for shipment should be here be-
fore the 10th. The truck will be
carefully inspected and adjusted
by an engineer from the Stutz
company and will then be sub-
mitted for the underwriter's tests.
The underwriters require all en-
gines to pass certain specified
tests before they are accepted.
The engine must pump 1200 gal-
lons of water per minute for 2
hours without stopping and a pres-
sure of 120 pounds must be main-
tained at the nozzle. This test is
made from suction with a ten-foot
lift.

In order to make this test it
will be necessary to build a plat-
form near the river where the
pump can draw direct from the
stream. Operating on a lift is
much more difficult than main-
taining pressure from a hydrant.
The second test is to pump for
half an hour at half capacity, or
600 gallons, maintaining a pres-
sure of 200 pounds at the nozzle.
The third test is pumping for half
an hour at one-third capacity, or
400 gallons, with a pressure of
250 pounds at the nozzle.

The specifications require that
the truck must pass the test of
the underwriters before the city
is required to accept the machine.
Acceptance will be made probably
between the 10th and 15th, and a
man will instruct the local fire-
men in handling the equipment.
Following Roseburg's purchase
of Stutz apparatus the Howard
Cooper company has disposed of
five more engines. The cities of
Boise and Nampa each purchased
1200-gallon pumps, exactly the
same as the one purchased by
Roseburg, and Boise, in addition,
bought a 500-gallon pump for
use in a residential section. Italics
and South Bend have each bought
400-gallon assembled pumps. The
business enjoyed by this com-
pany is an increase in the number
of machines handled by this com-
pany, agents for the Stutz ma-
chine, means that more equipment
and spare parts will be obtainable
on the coast.

TO MARKET PRUNES THROUGH EXCHANGE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, July 29.—A de-
cision was reached today by the
prune producers attending the
meeting of the newly formed North
Pacific Prune Cooperative
Growers' Exchange that the
prunes of all units of the organiza-
tion will be marketed through the
exchange only and all brokers who
have handled various brands will
be permitted to continue their ac-
tivities, but only through the ex-
change.

It was also determined that no
local unit of the federation,
whether newly organized or long
existing, will have anything to do
with sales.
Growers' units will be per-
mitted to pack under one brand, but
sales will be made only through
the exchange. In this connection
it was announced this noon that
the exchange will try to obtain
from the old exchange the right
to use the name of Midland as a
packing brand since this name
was high favor in the world of
prune consumers.
The remainder of today was in-
volved in considering a budget
for the exchanges, financial af-
fairs and to consideration of ar-
rangements for quoting prices to
the consuming markets. W. L.

PROHIBITION STAND LA FOLLETTE IS HIT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, July 29.—Sen-
ator La Follette, independent
presidential candidate, and his
leading supporters, immersed in
campaign work and in consider-
ing the possible endorsement of
congressional candidates, refused
to take notice for the time being
of attacks launched by temperance
organizations on the candidate's
"dry" status.

Senator La Follette was said
however, to have voted against
the Volstead act as being too
strict and to have views upon
prohibition that might be made
the object of a public statement
later in the campaign, but to hold
the general position that prohibi-
tion could not be considered par-
amount to other issues raised by
the new movement.

Governor Alfred E. Smith of
New York. Mr. Davis again will
urge the governor to become the
party candidate to succeed him-
self and is hopeful that this time
his effort will meet with success.
After a week in New York the
nominee will proceed to his old
home in Clarksburg.

SALEM, Ore., July 29.—Irriga-
tionists have prior rights
over power interests according to a
four to three opinion handed
down this morning by the su-
preme court in the matter of de-
termination of the relative rights
of claimants to use water from
Hood River and its tributaries.

The majority opinion was based
on the water code of 1909
which abrogated the right of Rip-
arian ownership. The court up-
held the ruling of Judge Fred W.
Wilson with modifications, in the
case of the Pacific Power and
Light company, appellant; Ore-
gon Lumber company, East Fork
Irrigation district, Mount Hood
Water company appellant and re-
spondent, on appeal from Hood
River county. The power com-
pany based its claim upon Rip-
arian ownership and that the use
of the water went with the title
to the land. The irrigation peo-
ple maintained that they held
prior rights when the project was
started in 1915. Concurrence in
special sessions was handed down
by Chief Justice McElride, Jus-
tices Hand and Coshaw, with Jus-
tice Barnett, Brown and McCourt
dissenting. The dissenting op-
inion was based upon the claim that
neither the court nor the legisla-
ture could take away the rights.
Justice Coshaw upheld the rul-
ing of Judge George G. Bingham,
of Marion county, who held that
the state game commission has no
authority to arbitrarily change
the date of the deer hunting sea-
son. The suit was brought by W.
C. Winslow, of Salem.

There was no opinion handed
down relative to the state income
tax and it was indicated that this
would not be handed down prior
to the summer adjournment of
the court this Friday.
