D. S. WEIR WILL LEAVE TONIGHT

Assistant Superintendent
Will Move to San Joaquin Division.

TUSCON MAN COMING

Official Who Is Departing
Has Worked Way Up
Through Leading
Departments.

D. S. Weir, for six years assistant superintendent of the Portland division of the Southern Pacific railroad, is leaving tonight for Bakerfield, California, to assume the position of assistant superintendent on the San Joaquin division. He is replacing J. C. Goodfellow, who moves to Tucson, relieving W. H. McBean, who is to take Mr. Weir's place in Roseburg.

Mr. Weir is a man who in every way upholds the traditions of railroad life. From the foot of the ladder he has worked his way up through all stages to a position of responsibility and power, but in spite of his advancement and attainment he has been an official to whom the men under his charge have felt free to carry their troubles and difficulties, knowing that they would in every way receive kind and courteous treatment.

Mr. Weir was reared in Santa Barbara county, California, and received his early education in the public schools there, later graduating from Santa Clara college. He entered the S. P. Service as a telegraph operator, later being promoted to chief dispatcher. He then quit that department and went into the motive service starting as a fireman, later being raised to engineer. He then dropped back to the train service, and started as a brakeman, was raised to conductor, later made passenger conductor and from the passenger service was raised to trainmaster.

From this place he was transferred to the Portland division as assistant superintendent, a position which he occupied six years ago. Three years ago he came to Roseburg as assistant superintendent, and has been a resident of this city since that time. He is a married man and the father of one child.

During his time on the Portland division, he has proven himself one of the most qualified superintendents on the system, and on account of his varied experience in the different departments of railroad activity, he has shown an exceptional ability as a supervisor.

During his six years on the Portland division he has made a great many friends who regret his departure but who wish him well in his new location.

As a token of their appreciation of his work in this community, the men of the local shops and yards presented him with a fine gold watch and chain, while the members of his staff gave him a beautiful 32nd degree scotch Rite ring.

GARDINER WILL GET ROAD WORK

State Highway Commission
to Build Mile Section
of Highway.

WILL GIVE RELIEF

Stretch to Be Built From
East Gardiner to Town
Will Afford Railroad
Connection.

PORTLAND, July 30.—It was decided at the meeting of the state highway commission yesterday that a bridge will be built across the Umatilla river on the Columbia river highway at a cost of \$48,000, Umatilla county to pay forty per cent.

Umatilla county will make an attempt to secure title to fourteen acres on the top of Blue mountain, where President Harding spoke July 3, 1923. It is proposed to make this site a public park.

A mile of highway near Gardiner will be improved, the state and Douglas county to share the expense equally. The public service commission will be requested to order an overhead railroad crossing at Gold Hill.

Following a threat from a group of Albany citizens that unless the location of a new bridge to be constructed there was changed an injunction would be sought to stop the work, the commission declared that if such action was taken state support on the construction would cease.

The news that the State Highway Commission has agreed to build the mile of road through Gardiner, will be very welcome news to the residents of this county.

The road to be constructed is a portion of the Roosevelt highway and will lead from East Gardiner station, through the city, and up the hill west of town. At the present time the road from Gardiner to the station, East Gardiner, is in very bad condition. It is a plank road, with the planks laid endwise and these planks have been loosened, and warped, and the road is not only hard to travel, but in places is dangerous.

Eventually the state will build the Roosevelt highway over the route, and rather than build a temporary road, which would be removed at the time of the construction of the Roosevelt highway, the Gardiner people have been anxious to secure construction of the mile of road giving the access to the railroad, and connecting with the old road behind the town. This piece of work will afford them much relief, and will be a very welcome improvement in that part of the county. Although



It will probably be several years before the bridge across the Umpqua can be built connecting the Roosevelt highway between Reedsport and Gardiner, yet the construction of the small section through Gardiner, will enable those people to have the benefit of the road until that improvement is complete, when they will gain the advantage of the entire highway.

SEVERAL COAST FIRES STUBBORN

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—Two men are dead today in the fight against widespread forest fires in California. They are Carl Rosel, superintendent at the Sulphate Cyanide plant of the Crown Willamette paper company at Floriston, Nevada county, and Robert Clyburn a fire fighter in the Klamath national forest.

Arson developed in the area and resulted in the conviction of Henry Shurt at Weaverville, Trinity county, for setting the fire that burned 1,100 acres of timber in the Trinidad national forest in a few days. According to the evidence Shurt applied the torch in order that he might make some money fighting the flames.

The Klamath reserve is the scene of the northernmost fire. The fire at the southern extreme is in the Hauiste canyon region of the Cleveland National forest which was still out of control today after having burned six thousand acres.

The fire on the lands of the Hutchinson lumber company near Oroville, were threatening the Llamas National forest today after having burned a big portion of the company's plant.

The fire reported yesterday in the Lassen National forest is still out of control today.

Although many ranches have been swept away, the many fires have yet failed to reach any settlements or resorts. The fire in which Rosel was killed was headed off when it was within a few hundred feet of Floriston. It is reported to be still burning.

MEDFORD, July 30.—There are now only two serious forest fires in Jackson county according to today's report from the federal forest service here. One on Forrest Creek, in the Applegate section has burned over 300 acres of good timber, the other on the slopes of Rocky Anne, near this city, has destroyed barns and buildings on two small hay ranches, and burned over 100 acres of brush land. Both fires are burning today, but the forest service expects they will be under control before night.

RIVERSIDE, Calif., July 30.—Additional men were being rushed to the San Jacinto mountains southeast of here today to fight the flames which last night jumped the south foot of the San Jacinto river and attacked heavy timber on the main slope of San Jacinto peak, threatening destruction of an important watershed.

In response to urgent requests telephoned to the sheriff's office here late last night. Three men were recruited from the streets of Riverside and sent to the fire zone to aid the three hundred fire fighters already there and preparations were made in Hemet and San Jacinto to dispatch additional crews from those points.

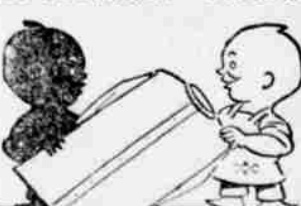
