McCLINTOCK IS FAIR MANAGER

Local Man Appointed to Fill Office Created by Board.

GROWTH IS RAPID

Increase of Business at State Fair Made It Necessary for Board to Divide Work.

J. E. McClintock, who for the past nine years has been associated with the state fair as auditor and head auditor, has been appointed to the position of manager, a new office created at the last meeting of the board. The office is second to that of secretary, and has been provided because of the rapid growth of the fair during the past few years.

The work of the secretary has so increased during the recent years, that it is altogether too much for one person to attend to. Last year's fair was attended by so many people, and there was such a mass of detail to be given attention both before and after the event, that the secretary was literally swamped by the overwhelming volume of business demands.

In order to divide the work and responsibility, and to give greater speed and efficiency in attending to the many important matters which demand prompt consideration, the fair board has determined to create the office of manager and has appointed Mr. McClintock to the place. The manager will have charge of the general work in connection with the fair, and will work directly under the secretary, E. S. Wilson.

Mr. McClintock was selected because of his efficiency in past years and his knowledge of state fair work and procedure. As auditor he was in close touch with the business of the fair for many years and is thoroughly versed in all lines connected with the annual event. Through this association he will be able to handle the office much more efficiently than a person who had had no former dealing with the fair.

Mr. McClintock will leave here about the middle of August to take up his work, and will probably remain at Salem until about the first of October.

RIVER CLOSED FOR BATHING PURPOSES

PORTLAND, July 31.—Due to the finding of pollution and infection in the water of the Willamette river during its entire course inside the city limits, all bathing resorts in the city have voluntarily closed and Dr. George Parrish, city health officer, announced that he will recommend to the city council that no bathing or swimming be allowed anywhere in the river within the southern and northern limits of the city.

This photograph shows the S. S. Boston, plying between Boston and New York, as she appeared after being towed into Newport, R. I., rammed in a fog off Point Judith, R. I., by the freighter Swift Arrow, whose broken stem also may be seen. Ten feet lower and the Boston, with 700 persons on-board, would have been sent to the bottom. Four persons were killed, among them Mrs. Rose Green, a Brooklyn, N. Y., actress, whose husband was seriously injured. Captain A. W. Call, commander of the Boston, received great praise for the manner he handled the passengers.
