## ARTISANS TO HOLD SERVICES

### Caravan Will Be in City on Sunday and Will Present Program.

## SINGERS ARE COMING

### Many Interesting Features to Be Given in Connection With Service Sunday Evening.

A caravan of Artisans on the way to the convention in San Francisco, will spend Sunday night in Roseburg and will participate in the united church service in the evening, which this week will be held at the court house yard. All the churches of the city will unite in this service, special features of which will be furnished by the lodge, the main address of the evening, however, being made by Rev. Stewart O'Dell.

The caravan is leaving Portland early Sunday morning and will be led by representatives of the state traffic department, who will pilot the cars through the state to the California line. It is expected that there will be between 50 and 70 cars starting out of Portland, and lodge members will be picked up at all points along the line so that there may be as many as 100 cars in the caravan by the time it reaches Roseburg.

A band has been formed at Salem and will accompany the caravan to San Francisco. As a part of the services on Sunday evening this band will give a short preliminary concert appropriate to the occasion.

Ralph Thomas, baritone with the Portland Opera association, and H. E. Hudson, tenor from the Trinity Church will each sing, and the Artisan quartet will give several numbers. One of the features of the evening will be 48 girls with megaphones singing the old hymn "Till We Meet Again."

Hon. B. L. Eddy, a member of the order, will explain the purposes and aims of the lodge in a ten-minute address during the services.

The city officials are giving their cooperation, and Mayor Rice has instructed the police department to rope off the streets around the court house in order to preserve quiet and order during the progress of the services.

## GODS LAW AND THE CEREMONIAL LAW

"There are those who have gone so far as to say, 'The Decalogue is the law of Moses.' If it was it should read: 'I am Moses, which brought thee out of the land of Egypt. Thou shalt have no other Gods before me.' (Moses.)

"Thou shalt not take the name of Moses thy God in vain; for Moses will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain." With these words Evangelist T. L. Theunler opened his lecture on "The Two Laws," last night at the tent on Rose street.

"There are two distinct laws in the Bible. First, the Ten Commandment law, which points out sin. Second, the ceremonial law, which taught the plan of salvation from sin.

"According to the Apostle Paul, 'The law is holy, and the commandment holy, and just and good. He is spoken here of the law which points out sin; 'for I had no known sin, but by the law,' Rom. 7:7.

"Of the other law the same Apostle writes to the Hebrews: 'It makes nothing perfect—being being weak and unprofitable.' Hebrews 7:18-19. 'But the moral law, contained in the ten commandments and enforced by the Prophets, Christ did not take away,' said John Wesley.

"The ritual or ceremonial law, delivered by Moses to the children of Israel, containing all the injunctions and ordinances which related to the old sacrifices and services of the temple, our Lord indeed came to destroy, abolish," John Wesley, sermons, Vol. I, Sermon 25.

"Are we under obligation to keep the ten commandments? Yes, because it is founded on the nature of God; and can not be changed," Martin Luther.

"Are we under obligation to keep the ceremonial law? No; the ordinances which it enjoined were only types and shadows of Christ," Martin Luther short catechism, Ed. 1834.

## CLAIM GREEKS SHOT NINETEEN PEASANTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SOFIA, July 31.—Nineteen Bulgarian peasants are alleged to have been shot by a squad of Greek military men in Greecean Macedonia, says the Bulgarian Telegraphic agency, which cites a dispatch from the under prefect of Pritich.

This official said four peasants told him they were among 26 seized and bound by the Greeks upon orders from Greek officers at the frontier near the village of Tirche, and shot down, only seven escaping. Another group of 15 Bulgars was seized and taken to the same spot, but the peasants said their fate was unknown.

The Bulgarian government is said to have made a vigorous protest to the Greek government and asked that the international Greek-Bulgaria immigration commission make an immediate investigation.

## CLERK'S ORDER TO BOOST LA FOLLETTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CINCINNATI, Ohio, July 31.—Senator Robert M. La Follette and Senator Burton K. Wheeler, independent candidates for the presidency and vice-presidency respectively, were endorsed today by the executive board of the Brotherhood of railway, steamship, clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees.

At the same time the board voiced its approval of the "progressive program adopted on July 4 and 5," and recommended to its members earnest support of the program.

The names of Senator La Follette and Wheeler were not mentioned specifically, but in a supplemental statement for progressive political action, the board, which has been in secret session here for more than a week, endorsed the two independent senators and representatives in congress who are known to be progressives.

The action of the clerks is in line with that taken by several other railway brotherhoods which urged its members to support the two independent candidates.
