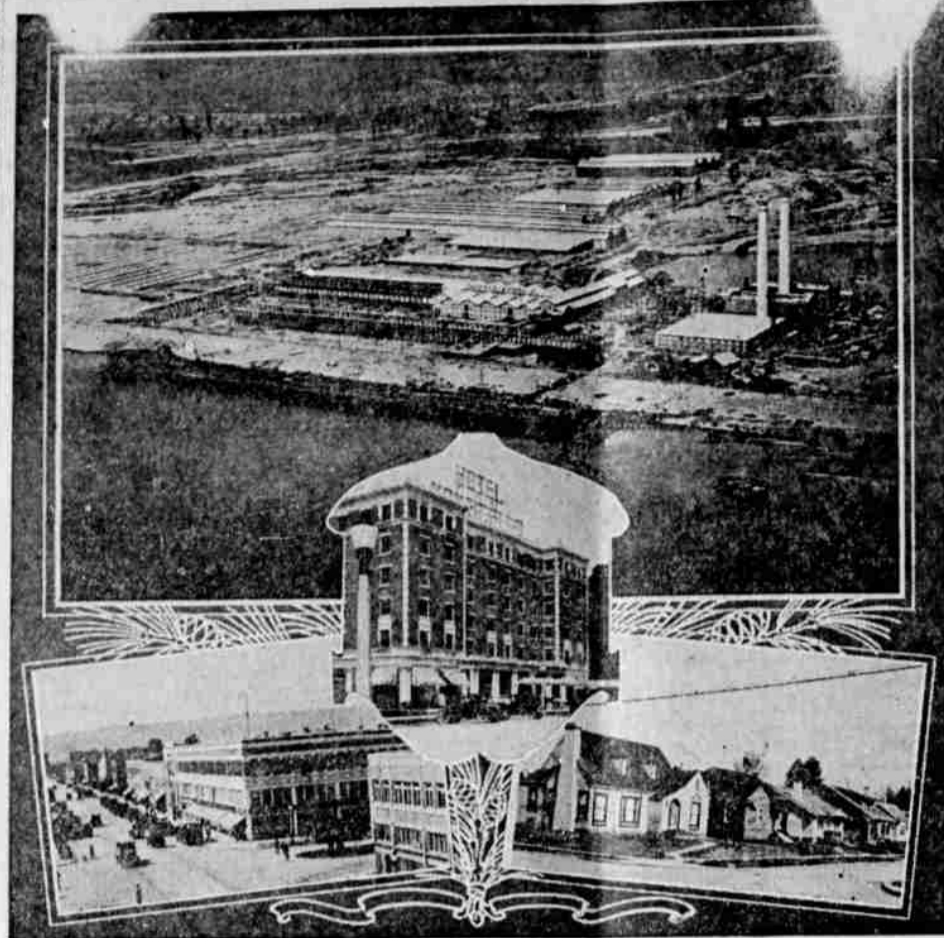

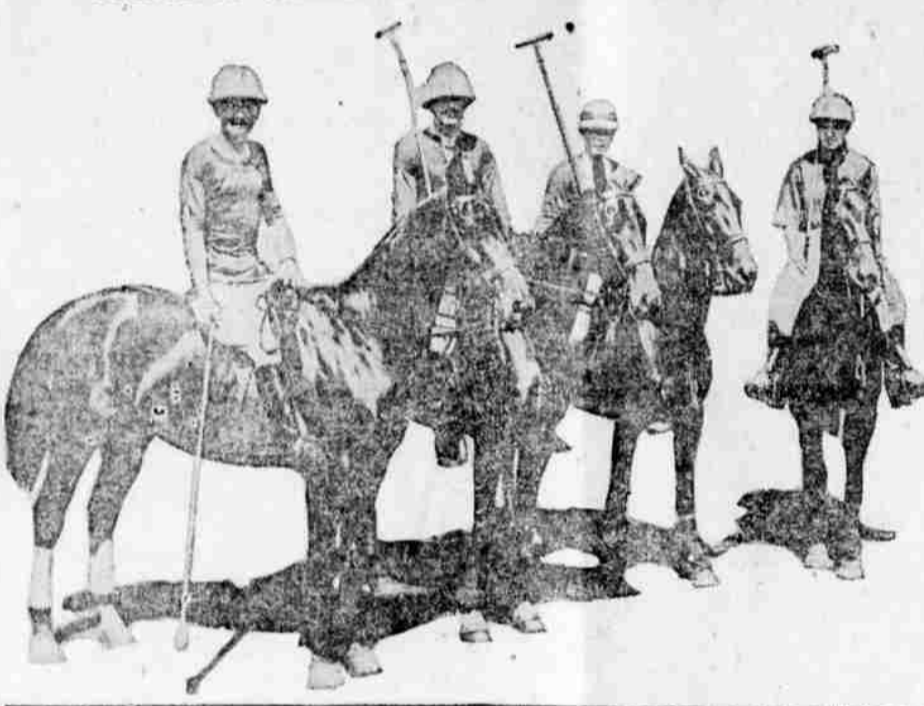

New City of Longview Celebrates First Birthday with Pageant of Progress.

Upper photo is airplane view of Long-Bell Lumber manufacturing plants at Longview, Wash., opening of which on July 31, will be a feature of a four-day Pageant of Progress. This plant is one of the largest lumber manufacturing plants in the world. At the right can be seen the electric power plant with its two stacks, each 350 feet high. Buildings of the manufacturing units proper—structures which required 34 acres of roofing to cover—are at the left. On the Columbia River export docks with a total length of 1400 feet are shown. Pictures, below, left, scene in the main retail business district showing portion of modern masonry structures which have risen within one year's time. Right, a block of homes in one of the residential districts; 850 homes have been built during the past 12 months. Insert shows Hotel Monticello, 200 rooms, the first permanent building, which was opened July 12, 1923.

STATE GETS LARGE INCOME FROM LAW

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, July 31.—Fines amounting to \$77,607.40 and a total of 12,188 days in jail were obtained by the state prohibition commission between January 1 and July 1, according to the semi-annual report of G. L. Claver has been filed with the governor's office. In addition 8854 gallons of liquor were seized and destroyed. Disbursements during this period were \$21,451.37 of which \$7421.63 were for wages and expenses, \$5940 for salaries and \$1126.76 for legal expenses. Incidental connected with the operation of the commission made up the balance of the amount. The commission received \$12,561.23 from the state treasurer prohibition fund and \$2890.16 from the state treasurer narcotics fund.

HUGE TIMBER SALE IN CASCADE FOREST

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, July 31.—Sale of 685,000,000 board feet of timber on the Cascade National forest in Oregon is announced by the Portland office of the forest service. A corporation represented by Geo. H. Kelly was the successful bidder for the Cascade Forest timber at an average price of \$2.25 a thousand feet for the Douglas fir. The total value of the timber is placed at \$1,500,000. It will be cut at the rate of 50,000,000 board feet yearly.

LABORER'S CLAIMS ALLOWED BY BOARD
