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LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

REV HILTON WRITES HOME

Burbank, Calif., July 28, 1924.
Editor Roseburg News-Review:
We left Roseburg Monday evening at five o'clock, and we had a fine trip. The most thrilling experience was the going through a big forest fire near Grants Pass. The great trees burning, and the fire running right down along the track in spots made us all sit up and take notice, but the train itself was in no danger. We arrived at Sacramento at two thirty Tuesday, and were met at the train by our son Monroe Hilton and had a most delightful visit with him.

On Wednesday afternoon we left Sacramento, and woke up Thursday morning running along a country of sand, sage brush and rocks. I began to have the shivers and wondered if this was the kind of thing we were going to have. We arrived at Burbank right on time, and were soon safely settled in the home of our old Roseburg friends, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Johnson. We came into the parlor the next day, and fixed it so we could camp until our household goods arrive. We have a beautiful six room bungalow for a parsonage. It is new, and looks as if we would be most comfortable in it. On Friday night we had a big reception, and were enthusiastically received. We met our people Sunday and had fine attendance for the summer season when so many are away, and had a very good impression of things, except we were disappointed in the church building itself. But it is situated right in the heart of the city, and I am told is worth \$20,000 at any time.

What about Burbank itself? It is a city that stretches far and wide. It is laid out three miles west, and as far south. On the north it ends right at the foothills, and on the east runs into Glendale, for you can hardly tell where Glendale begins and Burbank's line, in fact from here to Los Angeles is one continuous city. Los Angeles, in fact has taken in everything around us, and wants to take in Burbank. The streets here are beautiful. They are all paved, and are very wide, and great pepper trees grow on either side of the street, making a beautiful shade. There are several factories here, the largest being the big truck factory. There is an aluminum plant here, and a china factory, and some other industries, and one or two more big affairs looking at this point for factory sites. It seems to be a place of a wonderful future. Last year there was more than two million dollars worth of building, and in January of this year over \$200,000. Then the trouble hit the country and there was a temporary slump. Things are already beginning to pick up again, and the outlook is hopeful.

On Saturday we were happily surprised at the appearance of our good friends Mrs. L. S. Taylor and Mrs. L. S. Taylor, who connected us again with Roseburg. They are coming home soon, but it was a joy to see a Roseburg friend. On Sunday my wife's brother and sister with their families drove over and after church took us home for a big dinner of the family kind. Then what a ride we had. We went over Mt. Washington, through Tuljunga Pass, down Riverside drive, through Hollywood, on to Lankershim, and then home. Cars, brother, believe me, if you want to see cars get into Los Angeles, and on these great highways. It is a jam all the time. I have not seen anything like this from the standpoint of cars, or from the standpoint of lots laid out for sale. They run for miles and miles, and people are buying. I could fill your paper with things about what we are seeing, and how things look to us, but must quit. More anon.

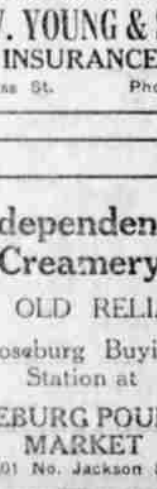
