LEAGUE PLANS DISARMAMENT

Five Years of Effort to Be on Program of League of Nations.

PLANS ARE SHAPED

Outline of Geneva Program Shows Ground Work Laid for Ending of War.

GENEVA, Aug. 1.—With the meeting on September 1, of the fifth annual assembly of the League of Nations, the latter counts on being able to whip definitely into shape the great fundamental basis for a world-wide reduction disarmament.

In fact, the League intends that 1924-1925 shall pass down in history as "disarmament year."

The projects which the League expects to have adopted in September are the result of five years' study under the auspices of the League of the whole problem of disarmament by the leading military, naval and aerial experts, economists, financiers, governmental experts, industrialists and work men.

In the minds of those who have handled the subjects for the League the projects constitute the only practical basis on which a beginning in the reduction of armaments can be attained. All idealistic projects have been swept aside and the subject brought down to a basis of concrete reality and possibility.

The disarmament program, as it has now been prepared after five years of effort, and as it will be presented to the September Assembly of the League of Nations, will be embodied largely in the four following projects:

- 1.—The launching of an international treaty of mutual defense, conditional upon a reduction in armaments by all the signatory powers.
- 2.—The summoning of an international conference for establishing a basis and limits of naval disarmament.
- 3.—Launching of a new international treaty regulating traffic in arms and munitions and which will replace the St. Germain treaty that never became effective.
- 4.—The launching of an international treaty placing the private manufacture of war material under the control of the government of each country.

Of the four projects, the first one constitutes the great fundamental basis for beginning the reduction of armaments. The idea which was originated by Lord Robert Cecil, based on the conviction that no state could be induced to reduce its armaments unless there was some other guarantee for its national security and that this other guarantee could only be provided through treaties of mutual defense, was drawn into the form of an international convention and adopted by the League Assembly last year.

In order, however, that the whole plan might be launched upon the most practical basis possible, final action was deferred until this year's assembly. In order to give all the governments a chance to study the project and send in their observations on the subject, as well as a declaration of just how far they are disposed to go with such a treaty.

Virtually all of these replies are now in, even non-League states like the United States, have submitted a declaration of their opinion and position on the subject. These replies will be submitted to the September assembly and will enable the latter to complete the final draft of the treaty of mutual guarantee on a basis acceptable to the largest number of nations possible, and to launch it before the assembly begins.

Regime required to date from the various governments indicate that various aspects of the treaty will be severely attacked by single governments.

For instance, there will be all sorts of opinion as to whether in addition to a general ban on all export of military munitions there may also be legislative, administrative, governmental, such as the League of Nations and the United States, should be required to take any steps.

The French, indeed, absolutely veto the suggestion of those who advocate in the treaty, and they will certainly have the support of all other nations who have recognized themselves as being since the end of the war, as a consequence, the support of the League of Nations, and the United States, will be a general agreement that will prevail but it will be distributed by the League to the various states that even if approved, will not be a ban on the export of munitions, but only a restriction on the amount of munitions and munition factories in their mutual defense, without consulting the

League of Nations, or whether the latter shall have the supreme authority for putting into motion the mutual defensive arrangements provided under each group agreement.

The Swiss contend that if the states in such group have the right to decide for themselves when they are attacked and to begin their mutual defense without consulting anyone but themselves, that Europe will be little better off than before the war, and at the mercy, as far as the starting of a war that may involve all Europe is concerned, of any group of states that may consider itself the victim of aggression.

The Swiss will insist that the council of the League of Nations have the supreme right to decide both in the general treaty of mutual defense and the group treaty, which state in the agreement and to set in motion the arrangements provided for mutual defense in such a case.

IDAHO BLAZE IS BREAKING CONTROL

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 1.—Fanned by strong winds and aided by the intense aridness prevalent in that section of the state, the forest fire which started near Big Eddy Tuesday night on the east side of the Payette river and about six miles from Smith's ferry, was spreading with alarming rapidity late last night and getting beyond control, according to a message from the fire dispatcher at Cassada.

The fire started by sparks from a locomotive of the Oregon Short Line railway between Nampa and Payette Lakes according to a report received by I. H. Nash, state land commissioner.

One hundred and sixty five men are fighting the fire under handpumps most trying and three of the crew have been injured, one hit by a rolling rock and two struck by falling trees.

REEDSPORT TO GROW BROCCOLI

Dairy Industry Will Be Second If Experiments Are Successful.

ARE BUYING PLANTS

Seventy-Five Thousand Plants to Be Set Out in Experimental Tracts in Lower Umpqua.

"If experiments in broccoli and cauliflower raising, in the Reedsport vicinity, are successful the dairy industry in that vicinity will become second in importance," J. C. Diehl, one of the leading residents of the Lower Umpqua district stated today. Mr. Diehl came to Roseburg to buy broccoli plants, and it is expected that a most thorough test will be made to determine the advisability of going into the industry on a wholesale basis.

"Last year we planted between three and four thousand broccoli plants," Mr. Diehl said, "and the results were so promising that this year we are going into the experiment more extensively than ever. We are setting out between seventy and seventy-five thousand plants on four different tracts, and are also trying various strains and varieties in order to determine the one most suitable for our climatic conditions.

"In addition to broccoli we are experimenting with cauliflower and it is possible that we will raise cauliflower as well as broccoli. The experiments are being watched with much interest by the farmers of the Reedsport district, and if it is proven that broccoli can be grown successfully dairying, now our chief industry, will become second in importance and we will center our efforts on broccoli. We are still young in the industry and are depending upon Roseburg and the organizations perfected there to help us out and give us advice and assistance in growing, harvesting, packing and marketing our product, and show us the course we should follow.

"In addition to these experiments we are making an effort to provide for more extensive operation of our cannery. We have a well equipped fish cannery, which during the periods between the fishing season might as well be working on other products. The equipment is such that with but few changes and additions the cannery could handle all kinds of products. We are trying to interest farmers in growing the products necessary to keep the cannery in operation during the summer season. We have many children who would be glad of employment in the cannery and helping on the farms in picking berries, peas, beans, and fruits of all kinds, and we could keep the cannery

FRESNO GIRL DIES IN AUTO ACCIDENT

SALLEN, Aug. 1.—Esma Mina Hockenberry, 19, of Fresno, California, was instantly killed and M. H. Hockenberry, her father, suffered minor sprains in an accident on the Pacific highway about 2 miles south of here at 3:10 this morning. The cause of the accident is unknown, but the girl's father, who was driving the car, declaring that he has no recollection of what happened other than the mere fact of the crash. No other car was near at the time of the mishap.

The accident occurred in a place where the road makes a turn at the bottom of a gulch. The car was found on the wrong side of the road, turned completely over, facing a point and it is thought that the driver possibly may have fallen asleep for a moment and failed to see the turn. The car of Mr. Hockenberry who was pinned under the car brought aid from a nearby auto camp.
