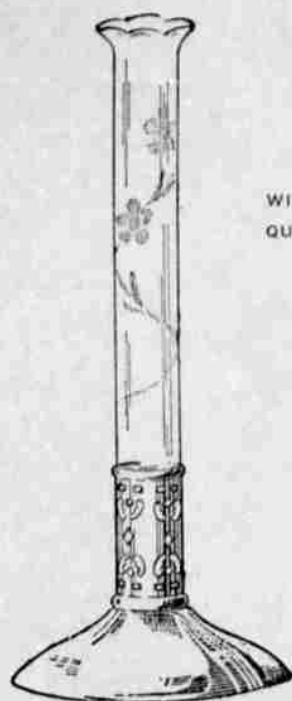

American soldier number 1,000,000 who served in the ranks throughout the war and is now a staff sergeant.

"Although we cannot claim that, as a result of the world war, the world has been made 'safe for democracy,' it is apparent that the American principle that 'governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed,' has been for the first time, impressed upon European minds."

William Allen White, Kansas editor:

"The gain came in self-respect for the working man and the man of small means and his women folks. And it cut through nationalities without respect to allies or central powers. In that much democracy has gained and will never go back."

Sir Philip Gibbs, British war correspondent:

"The only gain to humanity from the world war, as far as I can see now, was the inspiration that comes from supreme valor of youth and its ready sacrifice for ideals higher than self-interest."

Sir Arthur W. Currie, commander-in-chief of the Canadian expeditionary forces:

"By the world war we gained a truer appreciation and a better realization of war's unspeakable waste, its dreadful hardships, its cruel slaughter and its aftermath of loneliness sorrow and broken hearts. We now know that, as a means of solving the world's problems and removing international discord, war is a delusion and a lie."

General Henry T. Allen, commanding American army of occupation:

"The world has seen that the impious creeds that might makes right, and that the state as the incarnation of power stands above law, have been overthrown. The world has learned much more of the interdependence of states. It has learned that Europe cannot proceed properly along the road of moral and physical restoration without our participation in the great post-bellum measures."

Norman Angell, English publicist and author:

"If we cannot make a workable world in peace-time, implying again a world organization, then we shall again have a world catastrophe, as much worse than the last as that was worse than the preceding one, and the world will have gained nothing at all by the war."

Maximilian Harden, German editor and publicist:

"The certainty that war has lost its last glowing charm of romantic chivalry of knightedness, that it has lost the manly nobility of a fight to be decided by personal valor and has become an endless war of industrial masses of industrial and chemical devils—work."

Hilaire Belloc, English historian and student of military science:

"The world gained by the great war a demonstration in practice that the atheist doctrine and tra-

dition of which Prussia had been the increasingly successful exponent for 150 years would ultimately prove weaker than the culture of christianism."

Charles W. Elliot, president-emeritus of Harvard:

"The world war destroyed the huge Russian, German and Austrian autocracies, revived several free nations which those autocracies had crushed or cut into pieces, strengthened the three great powers in which democratic principles have made good progress and brought them near to effective union for promoting liberty, justice, and peace throughout the world."

ZEALANDER SAYS LAW IS EFFECTIVE

SEATTLE, Aug. 1.—Cleanliness of American cities and absence of external evils of prohibition are the most obvious changes in the United States since the adoption of the eighteenth amendment, according to George Fowlds, president of Aueland Fowlds and former minister of education and public health in New Zealand who is here as special commissioner for the Rotary International of New Zealand.

"I have made four trips to the United States before prohibition and four since," said President Fowlds. "I find there is less filth, degradation and poverty existing in American cities on this last trip."

"In New Zealand, where saloons are licensed, but the sale of liquor is prohibited after six o'clock, there is more bootlegging than in the United States."

WOOD GETS BONDS
