ALIENISTS CALLED IN FRANKS CASE

drove the boy to death used the diminutive twice himself.

There were six points which Dr. White said were objectives in the crime.

"They were," said Dr. White, "first, the joy in planning; second, the thrill of contemplation; third, the anticipation of getting \$10,000; fourth, the publicity; fifth, his own discussion of the crime with others, and last and least the money itself."

Dr. White testified that Loeb had lost the capacity to distinguish between truth and falsehood just as he had lost ability to differentiate phantastic imaginations from actual realizations in his life.

A desire to excel led Nathan Leopold, Jr., co-defendant with Loeb to early habits of smoking and drinking, said Dr. White, early, too, the doctor said, Leopold began to destroy emotion and feeling and to base his actions on a "philosophy of mechanism in which there was no God."

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—Judge J. R. Caverly today overruled objections by the state to alienist testimony offered in mitigation as to punishment by the attorneys for Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb.

The result which came after more than two court days of argument, was advanced to victory by the defense as it established the right to give testimony on "mental disease short of legal insanity, not as a defense, but in mitigation of punishment."

The decision was momentous in legal annals of this state, as no exactly similar situation could be found by attorneys for either side in Illinois records. The field opened by the judge's finding was more extensive than in cases which bordered it.

"It is the court's duty to hear this evidence," said Judge Caverly. "It is not his duty to reject it before he had an opportunity to hear it."

"The objection by the state is overruled."

Immediately Dr. Wm. A. White, alienist from Washington, D. C., took the stand and stated his professional connections, the stage where his testimony was interrupted Wednesday.

Early in Dr. White's testimony Mr. Crowe, state's attorney, brought in specialists, opinions as to the influence of home environment. Judge Caverly ruled that the witness might answer only as to what he had learned about the defendants, but allowed him to state the relative importance of such conditions.

"They are highly important," said Dr. White.

Crowe Strikes Back

Robert E. Crowe, state's attorney, today struck back at Chicago's Dr. Wm. A. White, and Walter Bachrach, attorneys for Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb.

"I was in doubt, as I listened to Mr. Darrow whether he realized he was in a court room and not arguing before a legislature," said Mr. Crowe.

"And Mr. Bachrach," continued the prosecutor, "would bar the state's attorney from the court room and make of this, not a trial, but an experiment."

"The defense would have us say these boys who have sneered in the court day after day at the representatives of law have not blood on their hands, but jam."

Mr. Crowe said the defense had pictured Leopold and Loeb not as intellectuals who in their self-imposed superiority have rejected God, but as innocent babies who still believe in Santa Claus.

"Mr. Darrow has chided me because I sentenced a confessed criminal to death when I was on the bench," said Mr. Crowe, "but I was following the law."

State Defends Course

Mr. Crowe also defended his course in backing a bill in the last Illinois legislature for revision of the lunacy laws.

"If that bill had gone through and I had brought these defendants into court as insane," he said, "Mr. Darrow would have represented them here as intellectual clients from the University of Chicago."

More arguments on the admissibility of the testimony of alienists in the proceedings which are to determine the punishment of Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, for the murder of 14-year-old Robert Franks, were in prospect when court opened today.

The prospect of more vocal pyrotechnics with perhaps a momentous legal ruling by Judge Caverly at their conclusion proved a magnet for court fans.

"We have made an analysis of all the cases cited by the state," said Mr. Bachrach, "except in one or two inconsequential instances, none of them related to instances in which mental disease was offered as mitigation of punishment. All were inapplicable to this case."

Haps Crowe's Stand

"As this argument has progressed I have wondered what function there was in the office of the state's attorney that allowed him to fix the punishment of these defendants."

"What right has he as an officer of the law to demand what form of punishment should be meted out?"

"It is, in fact, none of his business whether a defendant pleads guilty or is convicted by a jury, his function is to inform the court by laying before it all facts in the case."

"It seems a useless thing for me to have to stand here and argue that mental condition, like age, shall not be considered in mitigation of punishment."

Mr. Crowe followed, saying the issue before the court was something for Judge Caverly himself to define.

Mr. Crowe referred to remarks by Darrow that he had no right to present evidence in the case after a plea of guilty and by Bachrach that the state's attorney's duties ended with presenting

his case, denying the defense had stated the case correctly.

Would Bar Law

"Yes, the state's attorney is a sworn officer of the law," Crowe said, "but the defense would bar me because they would have this proceeding not as a law suit at all."

"We are roaming around in dreamland. The state's attorney is entirely at sea as to what is going on here. These men are men of intellect and graduates of universities and should be held to strict accountability for their acts. We should not discuss a cold-blooded murder in their presence."

"Mr. Darrow has castigated me because when I occupied the place your honor occupies I attempted to follow the law and protect the women and children of the community. I followed the law and gave a man the extreme penalty. I did my duty as according to law."

"The purpose of the testimony now about to be introduced concerns the mental responsibility of these defendants. The legal effect and the effect it has on the mind of the layman is that it is a defense of legal insanity. You have no right to hear it. The state could not appeal. The defense if satisfied would not appeal. If not satisfied they would appeal and the supreme court would send the case back on appeal. I insist your honor follow the rules of logic in the matter of hearing this evidence."

Judge Overrules

Judge Caverly looked inquisitively at the attorneys for both sides and finding none wished to argue further, delivered in a few short sentences his decision.

There was a stir as the significance of the court's words struck home. Loeb and Leopold, with broad smiles on their countenances, leaned over to Benjamin Bachrach and spoke in a low tone.

Jacob and Allan Loeb, and Nathan Leopold, Sr., and Foreman Leopold nodded and smiled their approval and Mr. Darrow leaned towards the state's attorney chuckling and "razzing" them.

Dr. Wm. White, first defense witness, climbed back on the stand.

Alienist Testifies

Dr. White testified he was asked by Bachrach to come to Chicago and go over the situation and report on the boy's condition.

"There was no other agreement," said Dr. White. "I merely was to inform you of the boy's condition so that you could state your case."

"What value has a patient's inner life in the determination of adjustment of his condition?" asked Mr. Bachrach.

Mr. Crowe objected and again was upheld. Judge Caverly ruling the doctor could tell "what he found."

"I used to think—" the doctor started and again Mr. Crowe interrupted and Judge Caverly told the doctor to confine himself to the case. "What is the condition of the boys," asked Judge Caverly. "If there is anything wrong let him say so."

"What is the importance of the past and environment in examining a patient?" Dr. White was asked.

"It is of enormous importance," Dr. White answered.

He said the examination of Loeb and Leopold lasted from July 1 to July 8 in the county jail, under proper conditions, the boys being removed from cells to a big room providing excellent conditions for observation.

"The examination was carried on by question and answer," Dr. White said, and explained the state of mind of the examiner displayed a part in the examination.

"Distortions in youth are quickly embedded in the make up of the individual," he said.

Explains Inner Mentality

The doctor talked about the "inner mental life" and Mr. Crowe interrupted. "Just what question is he answering now?"

The court allowed the lecture to continue.

"The inner mental life of an individual gives us an insight into his real life, his ideas, ambitions and desires," said Dr. White.

He said that the organs of the mind, their various "functions and mechanisms by which they work" were as well known as the functions of the heart, liver and kidneys.

"The patient disclosed himself to us in quite the same way an x-ray would reveal his personal state," said Dr. White. He launched into a 360-word sentence amplifying and when he finished Judge Caverly declared a recess.

Dr. White described first the "historical factors" he had discussed about Loeb. He mentioned the defendant's poor health in the first four and a half years of life and that for the next six or seven years he was under the influence of a governess, who, the doctor said, was "some what prudish, austere and rigid in character."

The doctor said that Dickie was born down so by the governess that he got in the habit of telling her lies.

Concussion of Brain

The doctor said that at the age of 15, Loeb was in an automobile accident in which he suffered concussion on the brain. College brought an interesting and rather unusual career. Dr.

White said.

"He had a feeling for the underdog and felt he properly might rise up and take the law in his hands."

Loeb followed the lines of least resistance and had no idea about what he was trying to fit himself for.

Resuming, the doctor said: "Dickie" did not believe in God.
