The Art Of Beauty

The Older Woman

TO look younger than one's age is not necessarily to look more attractive. Each age has its own fascination, and to jettison the charm of maturity for the youthfulness of a spurious birthright. But, to make the most of this rare charm, a certain amount of wisdom must be acquired in the use of adjuncts to beauty.

Often the woman approaching middle age becomes panicky—either believes that art and artifice are no longer for her, and declines into a pallid and nondescript obscurity, or goes to the other extreme and plunges into a cosmetic only in the effort to retain the outward appearance of youth. Both extremes are wrong. There is no reason why the older woman should not use cosmetics in moderation to improve her appearance, but she will only defeat her purpose and add years to her age if she makes up in a glaring imitation of youth.

The reason for this is obvious. Cosmetics, apart, it is not natural for an older woman to have as high a line in her cheeks or lips as a young girl. Therefore, since the principal of artistic make-up is to adhere as closely to nature as possible, it is unesthetic for a mature woman to display cherry lips and bright pink cheeks, unless these attributes have withstood the years and belong to her naturally.

What rules of make-up then shall the mature woman follow? Obviously, she is of all types, blonde, medium, or brunette, so that no more than for the younger woman can any one type of make-up be laid down. Let her select the rouge and powder suited to her type, as discussed previously in these columns—for the blonde, rouge Maudslayi, Naturelle, or Peaches powder. For the Brunette, Ashes of Romea rouge, Rachel or Peaches and Cream powder. It is for her a question of reducing the emphasis. From say, forty or forty-five on, good taste demands the subdued use of color on the cheeks and lips.

It is extremely important for the older woman to apply rouge where her own natural color is. As a general rule, the color recedes as one grows older, and is found lower on the cheeks than

in early youth. The rouge must be very carefully applied and shaded at the edges so as to leave no hard line. By all means go to the window when doing this, so that the uncompromising light of day will guide you as to the amount of rouge to apply.

There are some women who find as they approach middle age that, far from losing their color, they have a tendency to become more florid in complexion. This sometimes is accentuated to an embarrassing degree after eating, dancing, excitement, or exercise. To tone down this unbecoming flush to a more delicate color, a new powder has been originated, which bears the romantic name of Vert Ophelia. While this powder has a green tone, it is of the utmost delicate water green, or the palest Nile, such as you might get in very flimsy gauze, and in fact the effect of its use is to pass a very becoming veil over the too-flushed face.

PRUNE GROWERS MEET

A meeting of prune growers to consider the formation of a local unit under the new cooperative plan now being advanced, was held at the city hall this afternoon. The plan generally is for local units to arrange for the packing of prunes in their respective communities, and to cooperate in selling through one special agency, the organization now proposed for this purpose being the North Pacific Cooperative Prune Exchange. Several units are expected in the county, Riddle, Myrtle Creek and Roseburg, each having started organization.
