EUGENE MEN HURT IN AUTO SMASHUP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
EUGENE, Aug. 2.—Mayor E. H. Parks and City Councilmen W. H. Wallace and L. Simmons and Dr. Charles D. Donahue, local physician, narrowly escaped death on the steep seven mile hill above Cascade late Friday afternoon when the car in which they were returning from the Clear Lake water project investigation was overturned.

Mayor Parks was bruised about the body, and it was thought this morning that his collar bone might be broken. An examination is to be made later in the day. Mr. Wallace suffered a badly bruised shoulder while Mr. Simmons and Dr. Donahue escaped with minor injuries, according to the report.

The car was coming down the long hill, driven by Mr. Simmons. His brakes were set, but the car gained momentum, and fearing a headlong dash down the steep road, he turned the car head-on into the bank to stop it. The speed of the car was great enough to overturn it.

Mayor Parks was thrown clear over Mr. Simmons, while Mr. Wallace and Dr. Donahue, who were in the back seat, were also thrown clear. Mr. Simmons was pinned beneath the car. The machine, after overturning, bumped against the log siding, and stopped. Had the log, which was on the opposite side of the road from the bank, given away, the car would have plunged down hundreds of feet, it was said.

Mr. Simmons and the mayor were brought home at about midnight. Mr. Wallace had not returned this morning, and the telephone at Dr. Donahue's home was not answered.

PYROTOL ORDERED TO AID FARMERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, Aug. 2.—Thirty-nine million pounds of pyrotol, a new type of explosive, adapted for land clearing, will be manufactured at the Puget Sound plant of a National Explosive Manufacturing company for the government and sold to farmers and land clearers of the Pacific Northwest and Alaska, according to an announcement by T. E. Doremus, Pacific Northwest manager of the company.

"The pyrotol, developed by the United States bureau of mines will be made from war materials remaining in the government's possession and turned over to the department of agriculture for selling," said Doremus. "Production will start immediately. The entire contract with the government however, calls for 100,000,000 pounds of explosive, which will take about five years to make."

GOVERNOR SLAMS KU KLUX KLANSMEN

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 2.—Making his first public address in his home city since his impeachment and removal from the governor's chair last fall, J. C. Walton, candidate for the democratic senatorial nomination last night declared that he recognized but one issue—"the Ku Klux Klan menace." Much of his address was devoted to an attack on the Klan. He charged that "95 percent of the ministers of Oklahoma are Klansmen" and that they devote much of their sermons to "breaching the Ku Klux Klan, which is nothing short of paganism."

Walton spoke on a downtown street corner and thousands of persons crowded both thoroughfares as far as he could be heard.
