PARIS SUICIDE IS AMERICAN CITIZEN

PARIS, Aug. 5.—The American who ended his life yesterday in a Paris hotel was identified today by the American consulate as Samuel Burnham Chapin, 24, of Springfield, Mass., where his mother, Mrs. W. H. Chapin, lives.

Through the misreading of scribbled addresses on the back of an envelope he was erroneously identified as S. H. Chapin of San Francisco. The young man, who recently acted strangely, cut his throat and wrist with a safety razor blade.

AMERICAN REFUGEES WILL BE PICKED UP

GALVESTON, Tex., Aug. 5.—The revenue cutter Comanche, stationed here, is under orders to proceed to Tampico to pick up a party of American refugees. It has been learned from officers of the cutter. Orders state that the master of the cutter is to report to the American Consul at Tampico, who will direct him here to find the party, presumably at some point on the Mexican coast other than Tampico. The refugees are to be taken to Philadelphia.

MISSOURI VOTERS GO TO THE POLLS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 5.—Missouri voters went to the polls today to ballot for party nominees to the various state, congressional, judicial, county and local offices to be filled in the November elections.

Following one of the most energetic and bitter campaigns in the political history of the state, interest in the primary appeared centered chiefly in the outcome of the gubernatorial race with five democrats and three republicans entered.

With the main issues of prohibition and the Ku Klux Klan sharply drawn by the candidates for the offices of governor, other issues emphasize tax reduction and law enforcement prominent.

THE SABBATH AS THE SEAL OF GOD

"That the remnant church designated in the book of Revelation as keeping the commandments of God and having the faith of Jesus will scrupulously observe the seventh day Sabbath, thus exhibiting the mark of loyalty to the government of heaven and bearing the seal of God's law," were declarations made by Evangelist T. L. Thumler at the Seventh Day Adventist test last night in his Biblical lecture on "The Seal of God and the Mark of the Beast."

"The question of observing either Saturday or Sunday as the sacred day of rest enjoined in God's holy law, turns in its final analysis, on the worship of deities—the true or the false—and that the great decision which mankind must make is the one to whom they will obey."

"There is a law for the disciples of Christ. In a prophecy found in Isa. 54:18, which reads: 'Bind up the testimony, seal the law among my disciples.' This must refer to a work of reviving some of the claims of the law in the minds of the disciples, which had been overlooked, or prevented from their true meaning."

"To be complete an official seal must show three things: (1) The name; (2) His official position; (3) His dominion."

"The fourth commandment alone of the decalogue reveals the true God and author of the law. Thus the Lord (name) (office) (dominion) Heaven and earth (dominion) This then, is the seal of the law."

"On this point I quote from the Catholic doctrinal catechism, by Keenan as follows:

"Q.—Have you any other way of proving that the church has power to institute festivals of precept?"

A.—"Had she not such power, she could not have done that in which all modern religionists agree with her; she could not have substituted the observance of Sunday the first day of the week, for the observance of Saturday, the seventh day, a change for which there is no scriptural authority."

"The Sabbath and Sunday question is destined to become a very important issue during the years that are just before us. It involves a greater question than that of mere days. The Sabbath is a sign or seal of obedience between Jehovah and his people. Sunday is an institution that had its birth in heathenism and later was merged into Christianity, which did not in anywise alter its character."

"Tonight the sermon at the tent will be a review of a discourse given in the Christian church in this city last Sunday morning."

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JAPS TO DECREASE DIVISIONS OF ARMY

TOKIO, Aug. 5.—A committee of officers appointed to consider the reorganization of the Japanese army has decided to recommend that the army be decreased from its present 21 divisions to 16 divisions, according to the vernacular newspapers. It is the purpose to effect economies to enable the expansion of the air force as announced by Lieutenant General Issigaki, minister of war in the diet last month.

The recommendation of the committee is subject to the approval of the minister of war and the cabinet. The final reorganization program, however, will probably be postponed until the return to Japan of General Wada now in the United States. General Wada headed a mission to Europe to observe general conditions there.

DIVORCES INCREASE IN GERMAN COURTS

BERLIN, Aug. 5.—Divorce is steadily on the incline in Germany, according to recent statistics, which show that the number of legal separations being granted now is nearly double the number ten years ago.

Infidelity was the cause of 53 percent of the divorces in Germany last year, the men being to blame in the greatest number of cases, according to court records.

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M'MINNVILLE HIT BY COSTLY BLAZE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MCMINNVILLE, Ore., Aug. 5.—Fire starting at 2:30 o'clock this morning in the heart of the business section of McMinnville, swept over a square block, wiping out or damaging the headquarters of 17 business firms with an estimated loss of \$50,000 before the flames could be extinguished.

Approximately one fourth of the loss was covered by insurance. E. E. Beeson, local insurance man estimated.

The flames starting in the rear of the City Transfer company's barn from an undetermined origin, quickly consumed the structure and spread diagonally across the block, and by 4:30 o'clock the United States National Bank building was the only one remaining undamaged. One horse was burned with the stable.

When the Powell rooming house near the livery stable was attacked by the blaze, dwellers had only time to snatch up a few personal belongings and rush from the building. Mr. Powell was later seen walking the streets clad in a bathrobe and a pair of shoes, the only possessions he could salvage.

Miss Margaret Learn, an employee of the Coffee Studio, the heaviest loser in the Union block groped her way through the smoke to rescue the firm's books, the photographer being absent from town.

Mayor George S. Wright and his family lost practically all their household goods. They had an apartment in the Union block, the upper part of which was badly damaged.

Men and equipment were rushed to the assistance of the fire fighters from six nearby towns when a call for help was sent out shortly after the fire broke out. Sheridan, Newberg, Carlton, Salem, Willamina and Amity responded to the call.

Absence of wind aided in preventing the spread of the flames, firemen said.

PENDLETON WOMAN KILLED IN WRECK

PENDLETON, Aug. 5.—Mrs. George Longnecker of this city was killed about seven o'clock last evening when the car which she was driving turned over halfway between Pendleton and Pilot Rock. Her husband was badly hurt but will recover. Evan Smith of Pendleton, auto salesman, who was in the back seat at the time of the crash escaped with only minor scratches.

Mr. and Mrs. Longnecker were riding in the car, which was a new one, with a view to purchasing it and Mrs. Longnecker was driving when the car swerved off the road into loose gravel. As it was brought back into the road the front wheels buckled in the uncertain footing and the car rolled over. Mrs. Longnecker's skull was crushed and she died before she could be brought into the hospital. Mr. Longnecker was employed as an engineer on the United States government dam at McKay creek.

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FOUR MEN DIE IN RESCUE ATTEMPTS

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 5.—Four men, a taxicab driver, and 3 negro laborers are dead as a result of being overcome late yesterday by gas in a sewer. Four other persons engaged in rescue work were prostrated by heat.

Except for the first negro who entered the manhole, each lost their lives while trying to save the others.

NEGOTIATIONS DROPPED
