or open water with no certainty of a proper landing place. The reports from Annapolis are conflicting, there being no assurance as yet that the supply steamer Gertrud took reported yesterday caught in the ice. 15 miles off shore, had been able to deliver her supplies for the air men's next stop.

Major Clarence P. Cummins of the United States army air service, who was awaiting the fliers here when they arrived yesterday, is canvassing the situation.

Preparations were made today to pull the planes ashore for minor repairs. These will require less than a day. The machines came through their battle with the high wind on the flight here from Hornsford yesterday in good shape despite the fact that the gale at times was so ferocious that it carried away part of the cabin entrance of the engine.

When the Chicago and New Orleans arrived over Berkeley they found the harbor crowded with shipping. It had been planned on this account for them to land outside the sea wall but this was impracticable because of the rough water. The pilots were equal to the emergency, however, and made a beautiful landing in the limited space inside.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 6.—This

city is planning a literal "home-coming" for Lieutenant Lowell H. Smith, commander of the army around the world fliers when they reach here for an overnight stop before making the last leg of the journey to Seattle.

IRISH BOUNDARY PROBLEM ARGUED

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Colonial Secretary Thomas announced in the house of commons this afternoon that after a full and frank discussion of the Irish boundary problems with members of the Free state government the British government had decided to summon parliament to deal with the question September 30, unless by that time the Ulster government had nominated boundary commissioners in accordance with the provisions of the Anglo-Irish treaty.

DAZED WOMAN IS STILL A MYSTERY

EUGENE, Aug. 6.—The mysterious woman found in a dazed condition on a gravel bar in the Willamette river last Saturday is still in a coma. Tuesday night she rallied just enough to give hospital attendants a slight hope. A. F. OF L. ASSAILS LIBRARY SYSTEMS

Shipped are none too plentiful and buyers are keen for stocks due to a brisk outside demand.
