INSANE WOMAN FORMER NURSE

Woman Found Near Eugene Formerly Employed in Hospital Here.

MENTALLY DERANGED

Case Formerly Attracted Attention When She Demanded Admission to State Hospital.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 7.—Mrs. Rudolph Hansen of Walker, has identified as Mrs. Vesta Granger, a former Roseburg nurse, the woman found nearly nude and semi-conscious on a gravel bar in the Willamette river last Saturday.

The sheriff's office also has located some of the woman's personal effects at Corvallis and Portland. A man was with her at Corvallis, officers said. She is reported to have been known to be mentally deranged.

Mrs. Bertha Granger, or Vesta Granger, as she is also known, who has been identified as the woman found in an almost nude condition, suffering from mental derangement near Junction City, a few days ago, was employed in Mercy hospital in this city early in the year of 1922.

She was fairly well known during her stay here, and was considered a very efficient nurse.

She attracted considerable attention and interest following her departure from Roseburg, when she figured in a case somewhat similar to the present one.

At that time she appeared in Salem at the door of the state hospital and demanded admission. She had been seen previously peering in at the windows of the institution. She had nothing to identify her and was unable to give her name or any information concerning herself.

Hospital authorities made an effort to identify her and the case attracted considerable attention throughout the northwest. Portland papers took up the effort to identify the woman and published her photograph, a picture finally leading to recognition by a friend and resulting in her identification.

She was cared for in the state hospital until May 18 of this year when she was released, her condition having improved.

She was found last week lying on the banks of the Willamette river. She was lying unconscious on a gravel bar, and her almost nude body was badly sunburned.

She was taken to a hospital in Eugene where efforts have been made to identify her. She rallied once but did not give any information concerning herself.

It was feared that she had met with foul play, but examinations disclosed that her trouble was mental and that she had not been mistreated in any way.

She is said to have a sister, Mrs. J. E. Dooley, at 700 Fremont street, Portland. Her mother is said to reside in Walla Walla.

PERMIT GRANTED FOR NEW RAILWAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The Wenatchee Southern Railway company has received authority from the interstate commerce commission to build a 112 mile line in Chelan, Kittitas and Benton counties, Washington.

WENATCHEE, Aug. 7.—The granting by the interstate commerce commission of a permit to build the Wenatchee Southern Railway ends a five year fight on the part of the Wenatchee Valley fruit growers and local business men, for a greater outlet for fruit crops of north central Washington. The general plan is for the construction of a line to Pasco and Kennewick connecting the Wenatchee Valley with four railroads, the Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Chicago and St. Paul and the Oregon and Washington.

County Roadmaster Floyd Frear will go to Scottsburg next week to stake out the Mill creek bridge upon which construction will start in the very near future. The plans for the bridge were drawn by the state, and provide for a 120-foot span, which will give 80 feet of approach. The piers are to be of heavy piling, which will greatly lower the cost. The bridge is so designed that it at any time in the future it is desired to put in concrete piers, they may be constructed under the bridge, and the whole structure pushed over a few feet and placed on a new foundation, without interfering with traffic. The bridge is of a heavy type and

will last for many years. The bridge will be covered and will have large windows so that none of the scenic beauty of the stream it crosses will be hidden. The state is taking considerable interest in the bridge, as it is quite probable that the state will take over the road as one of its state highways, when the Roosevelt highway is built into Reedsport and the road down the river becomes a connecting link between the Roosevelt and Pacific highways. As a result of this interest the state is making certain that the structure to be erected over Mill creek is of a design which will be permanent and will stand up under the heavy traffic which the road will be called upon to withstand.

IRRIGATION TO BE DEMONSTRATED

Two irrigation demonstrations will be staged next week for the benefit of farmers and orchardists who desire to see plants in actual performance, according to B. W. Conney, county agent.

One of these demonstrations will be put on at the farm of Mr. G. W. Burt in Happy Valley Tuesday, August 12th, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Mr. Burt is successfully irrigating alfalfa and vegetable crops. The second demonstration will be at the farm of George Neuner, Jr., at Riddle on Wednesday, August 12th, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Mr. Neuner is applying water to a field of alfalfa and a prune orchard. Both of these plants have been installed under the direction of E. E. Price, specialist in soils, and are giving excellent results.

Mr. Price will be present at these demonstrations and will be glad to explain the details of the irrigation systems to all who are interested in this practice which has been developing rapidly during the last two years.

All farmers and orchardists who are interested in this phase of agricultural development are invited to attend one or both of these demonstrations.

MERCHANTS WILL VISIT AUTO CAMP

One of the strongest features of the meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday afternoon was the decision to ask the various members of the chamber to visit the motor tourist night camp each evening. The membership has been divided into parties of six, and it is expected that by the time the tourist season ends every member of the chamber shall have visited the camp and talked to the people staying there. It is proposed to start these visitations beginning next week, and it is planned to get out a letter to all members telling them on what day they are supposed to go down to the camp, and the day previous a card will be sent to them reminding them that on tomorrow evening they are presumed to carry out the suggestion of the directors as outlined in the proceedings published in these columns yesterday.

"Right now we are between seasons in a way," says Secretary Holbein, "and it is necessary that we take advantage of every opportunity to have money spent among our merchants. The visiting members will be asked to familiarize themselves with the favorite fishing places in the county, the places that furnish the most picturesque scenery, and every detail possible about the boundless resources of Douglas county. In short, to talk as interestingly as possible about Roseburg and Douglas county as a whole. The plan being to hold them in this section of the state as long as possible, so that more money will be spent among our business and professional men."

"It is sincerely hoped that all members of the chamber visit the camp at other times at their convenience, but particularly when their visiting day comes. Every effort should be made to make the plan as doped out workable, but it will take the united work of the entire membership of the chamber to make it thoroughly effective."

GREEN PRUNES ON WAY TO MARKET

The first carload of green prunes to be shipped out of the county, was loaded today at Myrtle Creek, consigned to Chicago. The car was purchased by Frank J. Norton, of Sutherlin, who states that he expects to ship five carloads each day next week.

The fruit is ripening rapidly, he reports, and growers who desire to ship for the fresh fruit market, are all getting ready to pick. Prune pickers are in demand and efforts are being made to secure additional orchard help.

Growers are being paid \$20 and \$22 per ton for their fresh prunes, delivered to the purchaser in lug boxes, the fruit being accepted as standard run, with no regulations regarding size. Many growers having small orchards are taking advantage of the fresh fruit market, Mr. Norton says. This method of selling prunes appears to be growing in favor, and it is expected that there will be many carloads of green fruit shipped out this year.

Several local buyers are in the market for green prunes, and it is believed that more will be shipped in that condition this year than ever before.

KLAN MEMBERSHIP DENIED BY DAVIS

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—John W. Davis, democratic candidate for president in a letter made public today, declares he is not a member of the Ku Klux Klan and never was a member. The letter was written in answer to one sent to Mr. Davis by Devere Allen, editor of the "World Tomorrow," a magazine published here.

According to Thomas J. Spellacy, manager of the Davis eastern campaign headquarters, Mr. Allen in his letter called the attention of Mr. Davis to charges that the nominee was a member of the Ku Klux Klan and asked specifically if this were true. Mr. Davis replied:

"In reply to your letter which has been brought to my attention, I answer the question in the same direct manner you have put it, by saying that I am not, never have been and will not become a member of the Ku Klux Klan."

"I trust that in my coming speech of acceptance I shall make my position on the great question of religious tolerance, too plain for any misunderstanding or dispute."

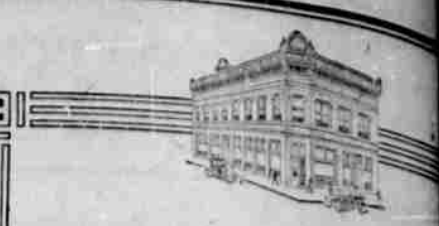

KLAN MAN NOMINATED
PORTLAND, Maine, Aug. 7.—State Senator Ralph O. Brewster, who ran with Ku Klux Klan support, was declared by the governor and council today to have been nominated for governor by the republicans at the June primary. The official returns giving a majority of 320 to Frank G. Farington, president of the state senate, were changed by a recount to a majority of 581 for Brewster.

CORN CROP ESTIMATED
WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The corn crop this year was forecast today at 2,567,000,000 bushels and the combined winter and spring crops placed at \$14,000,000 bushels by the department of agriculture August crop reports. Last year 2,046,000,000 bushels of corn and 786,000,000 bushels of wheat were harvested.

FIRE DESTROYS GARAGE
