TODAY'S MARKETS

The Latest Summary of Domestic Market Conditions as Issued by the United States Department of Agriculture.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—Egg prices rule firm with values generally unchanged in the local market. Outside markets continue to advance and this is a strengthening factor in the local situation.

A weak undertone prevails in the local butter market. Standards and firsts eased off a half point on the dairy exchange. Extras and prime firsts held steady.

Tomato prices are easing off under heavy receipts. Shipments from the upper Columbia section are heavy and coming in ripe, necessitating prompt movement.

Quantity of country hams continue light with the market in a good healthy condition. Top val and calves bringing 15c readily.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—Poultry steady; heavy hens 21@22c; pound light 13@14c; spring, 20@24c; stags 13c; old roosters 10c; ducks, white pekín 20@21c.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—Potatoes steady \$1.85.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—(United States Bureau Agricultural Economics.)—Eggs steady; extra pullets 34c.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—Opening corn quotations which ranged from 11 1/2c to 21 1/2c higher; December \$1.04 1/2 to \$1.05, were followed by an irregular advance of more than 3c a bushel in some cases.

After opening unchanged to 1c lower, September \$1.28 1/2 to \$1.29 and December \$1.32 1/2 to \$1.33, wheat rose all around to well above yesterday's finish.

Starting unchanged to 7 1/2c higher, September 49 1/2c to 49 1/2c, oats later showed gains of one cent or more.

Provisions rose with corn and hogs.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—Eggs strong; current receipts 28 1/2c; pullets 27c; firsts 29c; henning 31 1/2c delivered Portland.
