THREE MILES OUT

PRUNE BREAD CONTEST IS ON

Cooking Clubs to Demonstrate Use of Prunes in Making Bread.

TRIP IS OFFERED

J. H. Booth to Pay Expenses of Winning Douglas County Team to Livestock Show.

Practically everyone has known for a long time that Oregon raises quantities of prunes, and a few people also know that lately it has been a real problem to dispose of them. Knowing this the Boys and Girls Club Department of the Oregon Agricultural College has started a state-wide contest among the cooking clubs on prune bread making.

The plan is to use the prunes just as raisins are used in the making of raisin bread. It is equally as good, if not better, than the best raisin bread.

There are three cooking clubs in Douglas county: one at Greensdale, one at Wilbur and one at Glendale.

These girls are going to give public demonstrations on prune bread making and a tryout will be held later to select the winning team from this county to go to the Pacific International Livestock show in Portland next November, and there take part in the state contest.

The team to make the trip will be composed of two cooking club girls and their local leader. Each county must pay the expenses of its own team, and because he believes this is another good way to use prunes and to advertise them, Mr. J. H. Booth of the Douglas National Bank, has offered to pay the expenses of the team selected to go from this county. Mr. Booth says he believes in the prune industry of our country and that he also believes in the boys and girls and their club work, and that he is glad to help advertise both of these famous Douglas county products in this way.

Miss Helen Cowgill, Assistant State Club Leader, from the college, spent Tuesday of this week with the cooking club of the Green community at the home of Mrs. Fred Renner. Miss Cowgill demonstrated the methods the girls should use in their demonstration work. Mrs. Renner and Mrs. Howard are acting as local advisers and leaders for the girls.

Miss Cowgill also spent Wednesday with the club at Glendale assisting them in the work of preparation for their prune bread baking contest. Mrs. Fred Cornell is acting as local leader for the club at that place, and the club members who are taking part in the contest are Dorothy Hillside and Rosetta McGee.

The rules of the state contest are that all teams are to compete in a county contest before being eligible for the state contest. Each team must bake prune bread at least four times before entering the contest; each team must practice as a team at least four times besides the individual bakings before the county contest; one member of the team will work while the other talks, each working part of the time and talking part of the time.

Following is the recipe for making prune bread:

1 qt. liquid (milk or water).

1 or 2 cakes compressed yeast.

about 2 qts. sifted bread flour.

1 melted shortening, 4 t salt, 4 t sugar, 1 pound prunes.

Wash the prunes carefully and soak overnight in cold water to cover. Pit and cut up somewhat.

Scald milk. Pour it into the mixing bowl, reserving 2-3 cup in which to soak yeast.

Add the sugar, salt, and melted fat to the milk in the bowl. When lukewarm (80 degrees F.) add about half the flour.

When the milk in the cup is lukewarm, break in the yeast and add 1 t sugar.

Add yeast to batter. Beat well; add enough more flour so that the dough may be put out on the board and kneaded.

Knead for about 20 minutes, adding the prunes and more flour from time to time. The dough should feel springy and free from stickiness when it has been kneaded enough.

Put the dough in the greased mixing bowl, grease the top of the dough to keep it from crusting over. Cover the bowl with a clean cloth and set the bowl where it will keep warm.

When the dough has doubled, knead it down again, and let it rise a second time until double in bulk. Form into loaves, let rise until nearly double in bulk and bake 45 minutes to one hour depending on the size of the loaf.

Drain's Treatment

MOTORISTS PROBED

Extensive investigations of the alleged unfair means used by the city officials of Drain, Douglas county, Oregon, in getting fines out of motorists are being made by the Oregon state branch of the American Automobile Association, according to J. S. Maglady, director of the state association from the Eugene district, according to a story appearing today in the Eugene Register.

The register says: "The manager of the Oregon State Motor Association, George Brandenburg, is at Drain now. Mr. Maglady said last night: 'While the association wants motorists who may grossly violate the traffic laws prosecuted, one of its major functions is to protect the traveling public as far as possible from arrest on trivial offenses and technicalities.'"

"Mr. Maglady made this statement after learning of the case of A. D. Addison, of 561 Thirteenth avenue east, who was picked up Tuesday afternoon at about 5 o'clock by A. C. Cornell, speed cop at Drain. Cornell was at one time traffic officer in Eugene.

"Dr. Addison, according to a statement made by him yesterday afternoon, drove through the town of Drain, which is located on the Pacific highway, at a moderate rate of speed, safely within the speed limits. Cornell is said to have admitted this when Mr. Addison appeared before Police Judge A. J. Burns at Drain.

"As he left all signs of a town behind him and apparently was on the open road, he speeded up a little. He was stopped by the traffic officer, taken before the police court and fined \$10.

"Mr. Addison was told by people at Drain that the daily catch runs as high as 16, most of them tourists, who are innocent of the extent of the town of Drain. Many of them have difficulty in scraping together the \$10 to pay the fine. All of them leave the town with a poor opinion of the entire Willamette valley, Mr. Addison states.

"Mr. Maglady has received no word from Mr. Brandenburg since he went to Drain over a week ago. It is the director's belief, however, that the Douglas county town finances it police department on a basis of percentage of fines. This system, Mr. Maglady states, always encourages the situation that is found at Drain."

closure of the season.

A. E. Burkhoff, state game warden, speaking for the game commission said the commission desired to concur in any recommendation the forestry department desired to make.

R. H. Chapler, member of the federal department, said that from Mount Sexton in Josephine county he had seen numerous fires started on the day after the hunting season opened. He admitted these were not set by the hunters, but by other persons who wished the blame to rest on the hunters. It is one of the conditions he said that should be avoided this year by a closing of the season because of the accumulated dryness.

C. C. Scott, speaking for the fire warden said that from September 3 to 8 last year 90 percent of the forest fires were caused by hunters.

Gerlinger and Cecil commented the newspapers for publishing the true condition of affairs, and Cecil referred to Winslow's statement that the department was seeking more money as "childish."

Governor Pierce read a large number of telegrams he had received from various interests throughout the state, including many sportsmen's organizations, which were about evenly divided for and against closing. One from F. J. Maloney of Pendleton, a member of the game commission expressed the opinion that there was no occasion for closing in district No. 2 beyond September 1. Winslow declared that the fight was largely between him and the game commission because he had been able in court to prevent the commission from fixing the opening date of the season later than provided by law, and declared that the "same interests represented here today were before the legislature trying to get the same thing they are now asking the governor for."

"Mr. Winslow doesn't want to play fair, he wants to hunt," accused Gerlinger. "Everyone who has anything to do with forests has been stepped on this year, and thousands of men have been thrown out of employment in the last 30 days because of the dangerous condition."

"You wait until the next legislature," was Winslow's parting shot.

the ice and establish a base on some other point on the sea coast."

It was added that the two principal fliers would wait at Reykjavik "until Greenland bases are established which are consistent with safety and success of flight."

The Cronkite dispatch was dated yesterday and evidently was sent before Rear-Admiral Magruder decided to call a conference to discuss the advisability of discontinuing the flight.

Army officials said, nevertheless, it was definitely recommended that the "one-way" record of the Cronkite dispatches be followed by the fliers along the Greenland coast.

The air service also received a message direct from Lieutenant Oswald stating that he would be obtained from the Danish government for him to visit their base and headquarters and visit the fliers.

"An interesting fight between two men, one of whom was a Dane, was fought near Cape Farewell," the dispatch said. "Many men were without food and provisions and were in a state of distress."

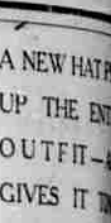
