In fact this was the first carload of green prunes ever shipped from Myrtle Creek. Prune men will watch with interest this new fruit movement with a view to future markets for the fruit in this state. The fruit is being shipped under the name of Denney & Co., of Medford, and Mr. R. E. Shinn, of Medford, is here managing the packing and shipping of the fruit. The Drager packing plant at the S. P. depot is the location of the packing operations. A force of several men and women are employed for the purpose. The fruit is packed and loaded into refrigerator cars as quickly as possible after arriving at the packing plant, as this is an important factor in guaranteeing delivery of the fruit in good condition at its destination. It is estimated that some sixty carloads of green prunes will be shipped from Myrtle Creek and Biddle this season by Denney & Co. and by Foster Butler. This will mean the distribution of from \$20,000 to \$25,000 in this section within the next thirty days.

Haveland was almost directly under the jet. The older man was burned from the shoulders down. At the hospital it was said his condition was grave.

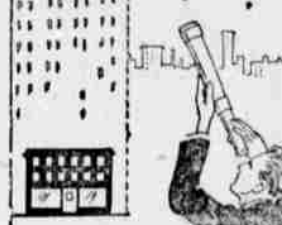
