Reedsport Road Nearly Done—

Within a few days now the Scottsburg-Reedsport road will be open to travel, according to R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the St. Lawrence national forest, who has returned from a trip to the Gardner district, says the Eugene Guard. The only obstacle in the roadway will be Mill creek, where there is no bridge, but a ferry will be operated there. The road will make a new epoch for the two cities, as it is the first to be built connecting the two. The finishing touches are being put on the road at the present time, and the approaches to the ferry are being constructed. Later, it is said, a 120-foot span will be put in, and the ferry abandoned.

Smokers Start Fires—

Smokers were responsible for 174 forest fires, and campers 119 in the national forests of Oregon and Washington, according to reports for the current fire season up to July 31, just compiled in the office of the district forester, Portland, and received here today. Next in the list come brush-burning and lumbering with a total of 86 fires; railroads, 25 fires; and incendiary 23 fires. A total of 769 fires are covered by the reports. Sixty-two per cent of the fires are man-caused, the remainder being due to lightning. Forest officers point out that the percentage of man-caused fires is somewhat lower than usual, indicating that more people are learning the lesson of care with fire in the forest. They state, however, that the percentage is still too high, there being no reason why the man-caused fires should not be eliminated altogether. Estimates based on the reports show that these fires covered 25,114 acres of national forest land, 8,112 acres of private land inside national forest boundaries, and 34,183 acres of private land adjacent to national forest boundaries. A total of 72 convictions for fire law violations are reported. The figures given apply only to fires handled by forest officers on national forests and adjoining territory in Oregon and Washington.

WAREHOUSE FIRE
NEAR SALEM BAD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Aug. 10.—The Barker warehouse at McCoy, about ten miles northwest of here, filled with wheat, two houses, and a dance hall, were destroyed by fire shortly before noon today. Barker, who is a cripple was severely burned in escaping the flames after telephoning for aid from Amity and Dallas. Arrival of a Southern Pacific water tank car from Dallas saved the depot. Twenty-seven thousand bushels of loose grain and as much more sacked were destroyed at an estimated loss of \$60,000. McCoy has no water system.

IMPROVED ROADWAYS
THROUGHOUT STATES

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—(A. P.)—Oklahoma and South Dakota, two states noted in the past by automobile tourists for their bad roads are mending their highways with the result that in the future driving through them will be better and easier.

Oklahoma announces that 350 miles of hard surfaced roads are being built and the cost of the program, together with bridges, will reach \$9,959,000. Twenty-four federal aid projects embracing 127 miles of concrete highway at a cost of \$5,455,000 are being completed by the state highway commission. Twenty-nine stretches of gravel highway totalling 223 miles also receiving the aid of the federal government and costing \$4,014,000 are being laid.

The commission contemplates spending between \$8,000,000 and \$10,000,000 annually for six years. Three counties will vote within the next month on road bonds totalling more than \$2,000,000.

Financed by 70 per cent of a motor vehicle license tax and the entire proceeds from a two-cent tax on gasoline the 6,000 mile trunk highway system of South Dakota, begun in 1919, will be approximately one-fourth completed and gravel surfaced at the close of 1924, under supervision of the state highway commission.

The system comprises six direct east and west routes through the state and an equal number running north and south. The construction program of this season is the most significant yet undertaken, as it will complete a number of the through routes in the east half of the state.

By the end of the year a total of 4,000 miles of arterial system will have been graded. During the last fiscal year the highway fund received \$1,350,000 from automobile fees and \$900,000 from the gasoline tax. The former fund is devoted wholly to new construction and the latter to maintenance.

MILLION IS LOST
WHEN MILL BURNS

HOQUIAM, Wash., Aug. 12.—Sparks from a dry kiln plant of the National Lumber and Planing mill started a fire last night which destroyed the mill and 8,000,000 feet of lumber causing an estimated damage of \$1,000,000 and throwing 500 men out of work.

The principal owner of the plant is W. T. Culver, Chicago. It was built in 1902 and had a capacity of 750,000 feet of lumber daily when three shifts were employed.

Although three locomotives of the Northern Pacific railroad were rushed to the scene to aid in pumping water from the Hoquiam river, the fire obtained too great a headway under a stiff wind to put it under control before the plant was burned. Lumber mill workers from three nearby plants and firemen of the Hoquiam and Aberdeen fire departments also aided in fighting the flames.

According to local officials, it was believed the majority of the loss was covered by insurance.

RUHR EVACUATION
HOLDS UP ACTION
AT LONDON MEET

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, Aug. 12.—The French and German delegates to the international conference today resumed their struggle for a compromise on a time limit for the evacuation of the Ruhr—one of the questions which is holding up the work of the conference and which must be disposed of before the conference can proceed in a definite way with the program for instituting the Dawes reparations plan.

The Germans say that the evacuation should be completed within six months after it has been started, while the French are holding out for one year.

It is believed, however, that a compromise will be negotiated. It is understood that the "Big Fourteen" after a meeting at Downing street left there today without having arrived at any settlement on reparations in kind.

There is no indication that the Germans will yield the point on this matter until they reach a

separate arrangement out of the conference itself on the issue of the evacuation of the Ruhr.

The Ruhr evacuation question, disposal of which is necessary before the international conference can proceed in a definite way with the program for instituting the Dawes reparations plan, is being thrashed out in private interviews between the leading delegates of Germany and the allied nations.

The French premier, M. Herriot, is supposed to have returned from his Paris trip with authority to agree to the evacuation within 11 months, but the question of when the withdrawal is to take place and the details of execution remain to be settled.

VENSON CASE TRIED

The water in the South Umpqua river above the dam is safe for swimming but not for drinking purposes, according to a report made this morning by Dr. W. C. Belt, county health officer.

Dr. Belt took samples of water above the dam and at Winston, and these samples were analyzed by the state board of health.

Both samples contained colon bacilli. Dr. Belt reports, and had a bacterial count of 1,200 per cubic centimeter, a there is no direct sewage contamination, and the germ count is less than 3,500. It is not considered necessary to close the South Umpqua above the dam for bathing purposes. There is no typhoid in the county at the present time.
