KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 12.—Mrs. Rebecca Stewart, 105 years of age, is dead here today. Her age is substantiated by records in the family bible showing she was born in London, August 17, 1819 and came to the United States August 12, 1861. She is survived by four of her eleven children, I. Stewart, 69; Delander Stewart, 73; R. M. Stewart, 70; and Louisa Smith, 65. Her husband died in 1893 and is buried in Salt Lake City.

Mrs. Stewart had traveled through every state in the union. She arrived in Klamath Falls early this summer accompanied by her son, I. Stewart. The two spent last winter near Medford and came here recently in a prairie schooner.

SPARKS SET FIRE TO FARM PROPERTY

MEDFORD, Aug. 13.—Sparks from a forest fire are believed to have caused the destruction of the barn and warehouse on the C. J. McKay ranch near Bybee bridge last night, which resulted in the loss of 3 tons of hay, two horses, several calves and hogs and 250 chickens. A tractor and two automobiles were badly scorched. The forest fire burned over 40 acres of Wood land near the McKay ranch the previous day, but was practically extinguished Monday night.

ANTI-KLAN TICKET GETS NOMINATION

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 13.—Harry L. Davis, of Cleveland, former governor of Ohio, was nominated for reelection to that office on the republican ticket at yesterday's state wide primary. A Victor Donahay, the present governor, was chosen to oppose him on the democratic ticket.

Davis triumphed in a field of eight aspirants for the nomination. He received 57,000 votes, with less than one fifth of the state's 8,300 precincts still to be heard from.

Donahay swept aside James C. Beatty, his only opponent, who made his stand on an anti-Klan platform with a ballot which gave him a vote almost five times that of Beatty.

FILIPINOS OBSERVE U. S. OCCUPATION

MANILA, Aug. 13.—The twenty-sixth anniversary of the American occupation of the Philippine islands was observed as a holiday here, all government offices remaining closed today. The Spanish-American war veterans held a reunion which was attended by Governor General Wood and visiting officers from the Japanese Cruiser Oi. The governor general entertained the Japanese officers later at a dinner.

About 100 Filipino veterans were included in the reunion with general Emilio Aguinaldo, one time leader in the struggle against American rule. The former insurrectionist leader also made a brief address, saying that while the forces under his command fought against the Americans and were at one time their enemies, they all met as friends today.

He said he was sure the motives of the United States as evidenced in the policies of Governor-General Wood, were designed to promote the best interests of the Filipino people.
