FOREST FLAMES ARE OUT OF CONTROL IN NATIONAL RESERVES

BEND, Aug. 14.—Sixty more men have been sent to Wasco Lake to fight the forest fire there which has already burned over more than 1500 acres of timber. The fire fighting force in the region now numbers 160 men, 70 of whom have been brought from the road construction crew at McKenzie Pass. Taking these men from their usual work may mean delay in completion of the highway this fall, said forest officials here.
