MANY COMING TO CAMP MEETING

Everything in Readiness for Opening Service Tonight at 8.

IS AN IDEAL SPOT

Delegates to Conference and Ministers From Abroad Arriving in City Hourly.

With arrival today of many worshippers from all parts of Southern Oregon, the tent city over in Hellows beautiful grove in West Roseburg took on intensified animation this afternoon, and tonight the first service of the twelve days' session of the big camp meeting will be held at 8 o'clock. The pavilion tent is in readiness for the congregation, comfortable seats provided for practically two people, ample lights have been installed, and the program arranged for the meetings that will occur daily for the entire time of the conference.

During the past ten days a force of men have been busy getting the grounds in readiness for the encampment. Stumps were removed so that the assembly tent could be pitched within the shade, as far as possible, of the fire. The resident tents are arranged in streets, city water and lights provided, and the grounds generally made as smooth and free from litter as possible. During the day people who arrived have been assigned their places, and everything about the entire camp is carried on with military precision.

The program for each day calls for revivals at 8:30 a. m., followed by devotional meeting and young people's meeting at 6 o'clock, then finally worship in the tents at 8 o'clock, and children's meetings at 9, with departmental or conference sessions at 10:15. The dinner hour is from 12:30 to 1:30. Afternoon meetings are scheduled daily at 2:30, 3:30, and 5. The lunch hour is from 6:15 to 7 p. m., and then the evening service at 8 o'clock. The sessions Saturday vary somewhat from the daily program, in that there are no conference deliberations, and Sabbath school convenes at 9 to 10:15, followed by a sermon at 10:15. The services each evening at 8, and also the morning worship at 11 o'clock Sunday, will be of especial interest to the general public, and sermons at those hours will be presented by speakers from abroad, and those men, several of them who have endeavored the globe and preached to congregations on two hemispheres, will deal with subjects that are believed to be of intense interest to all students of affairs. In addition to the literary features, special musical programs will be presented each evening preceding the sermon. A well trained chorus will lead the singing, and gifted soloists also will feature selections at many of the services.

In addition to the main pavilion, three other large tents have been found necessary. One of these will be used for young peoples' meetings, and one of the others occupied by the book store and post office for the camp. The book store will carry a large stock of Bibles and denominational literature for sale.

The subject of the opening address this evening is "World Problems," and will be presented by Elder A. W. Spaulding, of Washington, D. C., who is the field secretary of the general conference-home commission of the Seventh Day Adventist organization. Elder Spaulding is said to be a brilliant and forceful speaker, and his extensive travels have given him
