FIRE ENDANGERS WASHINGTON MILL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 13.—A forest fire that suddenly sprang into life yesterday is sweeping down Pine Creek, in the Coeur d'Alene mining district of northern Idaho, and today was threatening the new \$100,000 mill of the Amy Matchless Mine and the village of Beebe.

Efforts of 200 men fighting its advances had succeeded in holding the fire away from the mine property after it had approached within a few hundred yards and had burned one or two outlying buildings in Beebe. A quantity of lumber of the Pine Creek Lumber company, and surface workings of other mines in the vicinity were also threatened by the fire, according to reports received here.

PRODUCE PLANT IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

ONE-MAN DIRIGIBLE IS NEW CREATION

DAYTON, Ohio, Aug. 14.—The army air service announces a new creation—the baby blimp, a one-man dirigible.

The craft is a mere pimple compared with present types. It is under construction at Hammondsport, N. Y., and will be ready to fly in about five months, according to officials of McCook Field here, where the ship was designed.

In general appearance the one-man dirigible will resemble a free balloon turned on its side. Its nose is blunter than larger dirigibles and Zeppelins and the bag is 20 feet long. Filled with 20,000 cubic feet of hydrogen it will stand 50 feet high.

The ship was designed by Matt Corbett, McCook Field civilian engineer, who produced the famous "jumping balloon."
