LEAGUE ASSEMBLY WILL HEAR SPEECHES BY THREE PREMIERS

GENEVA, Aug. 15.—For the first time in the history of the League of Nations the heads of the three great European powers will attend the assembly which opens September 1. Not only have Premier MacDonald, Herriot and Mussolini announced their intention of coming, but it is expected all three will make important addresses. The lesser powers are expected to send their foreign ministers.

In view of the increased collaboration of the United States, more particularly with reference to opium and matters affecting the problem of reduction of armaments, the question is being asked at Geneva whether there is any likelihood of Washington sending observers, either official or unofficial.

It is believed in Geneva that this assembly will constitute the great subject of this year's assembly debate. As a Swiss newspaper put it, England's recent repudiation of the League of Nations' provisional draft treaty of mutual assistance has resulted in the effectual burial of that treaty. It will be exhumed, undoubtedly, but only to serve as the basis of a general inquiry dedicated to the finding of some more suitable arrangement for the reduction of armaments.

Can security for France and Belgium be made possible through the mechanism of the league? Can definite zones of territory between particular countries be demilitarized? Can special international frontiers, as for instance the borderland between France and Germany, be subjected to international control through the League of Nations as a means of preventing future wars? Can the court of justice at the Hague be utilized more largely as a means of preventing hostilities when danger of war arises in the future. What system can be devised to secure a limitation of armaments which will have the collaboration of the United States?

These are some of the questions which men are turning over in their minds as the assembly approaches. It is felt here that the great difficulty to the attainment of anything practical in disarmament through the machinery of the League of Nations is the absence of the United States from the League of Nations is the abnormally pointed out by Premier MacDonald in his recent communication rejecting the provisional draft treaty of mutual assistance.

Another subject of preliminary assembly discussion is England's rejection of any plan, such as is contained in the pact of mutual assistance, to make the League Council an executive body with very large powers in the control of military forces sent to operate against aggressive states. England wants the council's prerogatives to be kept merely advisory, pointing out that under article 16 of the covenant, the council can only recommend action, while even under article 16 it can only advise.

The trend of thought here is that the League must not seek to thrust its authority upon nations, but through careful examination and carefully weighed opinions and by resultant publicity, indicate to the world where responsibility for aggression lies and suggest conciliatory means of settlement.

The preliminary agenda of the assembly indicates that a great variety of legal, financial, political, administrative, technical and humanitarian questions will come before the assembly. The assembly will be told all about the arrangements for the International Optism Conference which will be held at Geneva in November, and will hear something of the difficulties which prevented any agreement by the experts for a preliminary draft convention. The problem of Russian and Greek refugees, the position of the mandated world territories, which include some 60,000,000 people, the progress of the reconstruction of Austria and Hungary and the happy solution of the Jewish problem through the assistance of an impartial American, Norman H. Davis, all will come before the delegates.

more prunes than were packed at the plant last year, so that the prospects are very good.

Following prunes will come apples, which will carry the season well into the late fall or early winter. The cannery is now employing practically 100 men, women and girls, and it is expected that this force will be maintained for a number of weeks.

The new plant is proving well worth its cost, as much greater efficiency is being shown in handling the fruit. The equipment is so arranged that there is little wasted effort and time and much more can be accomplished than in the old plant which was not well arranged.

The new building is also light and well ventilated and can be flushed out and thoroughly cleaned every day so that the sanitary conditions are perfect.

Visiting cannermen, and men acquainted with cannery business have praised the Roseburg can-

nery very highly, commenting on the cleanliness of the employes, the fine arrangement of the building, and the equipment claiming it to be one of the best plants of its size to be found anywhere upon the coast.

AMERICAN EXPORTS SHOW BIG DECREASE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Due to a seasonal decline, American exports for July decreased nearly \$29,000,000 from June, leaving a \$400,000 unfavorable merchandise balance for the month, figures made public today by the commerce department showed.

It was the first month that the balance of trade had been against the United States since June last year, when March, April and May also showed figures in favor of foreign countries. Imports for July showed a slight increase over June.
