FRESNO, CALIF., Aug. 15.—Dick Wooten, 30 year old medicine man of the Wooden Valley tribe of Indian Indians, was placed in the Fresno county jail last night accused of violating the state medical practice act, as the result of recent investigations of several deaths among his tribe. Harry C. Henderson and Deputy Sheriff Harry Collins arrested him late yesterday afternoon after a search of several hours.

Pony Dick last night vehemently denied that he had been the tribe's medicine man. Several times, however, he said, he had done a bit of blood letting on the insistence of various members of the tribe. In three cases, according to Henderson, the wives of Ben Hancock and Mono Dick, and a young woman Jennie B. Yrled died as a result of the blood letting.

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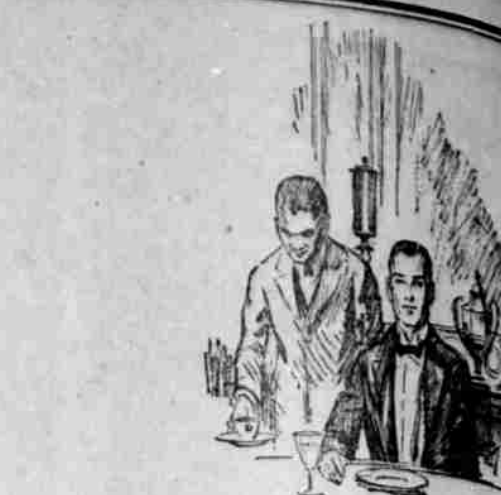
