FLOATING CABARET SERVES REAL STUFF

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Anchored 15 miles off Fire Island, a small island, says a copyright article in the New York Herald-Tribune today, is a 17,000-ton liner flying the British flag which has been converted into a floating cabaret where almost any kind of vintage of Bacchus may be had—for a price.

The name of the vessel has been painted out, and those on board are reticent regarding the registry of the ship or its home port. There is a \$5 cover charge and the price of drinks range from \$1 to \$2.50. Wine is \$20 per quart.

The article says the mysterious liner is the scene of nightly parties which last well into the morning, given by wealthy patrons who go off to the carnival ship by means of private yachts and hired speed boats.

On the poop deck of the vessel is a reproduction of the statue of Liberty, to which convivial patrons drink midnight toasts, the article says.

State rooms at \$5 and up house the guests and an excellent hotel service is maintained, the article states, and a large hall room makes up for gaiety. There are midnight movies. Women as well as men visitors stand up to the bar.

The observations have been in progress for several months, and will be continued for some months after the red planet's nearest approach to earth on August 22 next, when it will be closer to human eye than it has been for approximately a hundred years.

The observing program includes visual and photographic observations of the various surface features and the phenomena related to them. Together with photometric and spectroscopic studies of the light and radiometric determination of temperatures. In this work the observatory's 24 inch refractor and 40 inch reflector will be used, as well as other highly sensitive instruments for measuring light and heat.

Three members of the observatory staff—Dr. V. M. Slipher, Professor C. O. Lampland, and Professor C. O. Slipher and Dr. W. Coblentz of the United States bureau of standards are conducting the observations.

U. S. SENATOR COLT-RHODE ISLAND DIES

BRISTOL, R. I., Aug. 18.—United States Senator La. Haron Colt died at 5 o'clock this morning. He had been ill for about two weeks from heart trouble and nephritis.

La. Haron, Bradford Colt republican senator from Rhode Island 1913 was born in Dedham, Mass., June 25, 1846. After graduating from Yale in 1868 and study of a law course at Columbia he practiced in New York.

In 1873 he married Mary Louise Ledyard in Chicago who died in 1923. Three daughters survive this union.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Senator Colt's death leaves vacant the chairmanship of the senate immigration committee and may result in the elevation to that post of Senator Hiram Johnson of California, a prominent figure in the recent fight for Japanese exclusion.

Ranking next to Senator Colt among republican members of the committee was Senator Sterling of South Dakota, but he has been defeated for renomination and if he takes the chairmanship he can serve only until next March 4.

Senator Johnson, who ranks after Senator Sterling, is chairman of the committee on territories and insular possessions, and may not desire to give up that place in order to become head of the immigration committee. In the event, immigration committee chairmanship will probably go to Senator Keys of New Hampshire.

ADVISORY BOARD TO DAVIS IS SELECTED

LOCUST VALLEY, Aug. 18.—Organization of the "board of strategy" for the democratic presidential campaign formed the subject matter of a conference here today between John W. Davis, the party standard bearer, and Daniel C. Roper, former revenue commissioner, Robert Woolley, former interstate commerce commissioner and Senator Pittman of Nevada.

Six members of the board which is to act in an advisory capacity to Chairman Shaver of the democratic national committee have been selected.

SURRENDER SOVIET LEGATION SOUGHT

PEKIN, Aug. 18.—Surrender of the Russian legation here by the diplomatic corps to L. M. Karakhan, recently appointed ambassador from Soviet Russia to China, was brought one step nearer today when it was announced that the reply of the protocol powers, acquiescing, was ready for delivery to Karakhan by Ken-ichi Yoshizawa, Japanese minister to China, senior diplomat at Peking.

The Russian legation has been in the hands of the diplomatic corps here since suspension of recognition of the old Czarist government in 1920. Under the protocol of 1901, which forms the basis of the present negotiations government of the legation quarter in Peking was provided for without Chinese interference.

MACLAREN WILL NOT TAKE SECOND CHANCE

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., Aug. 18.—Major Stuart MacLaren, British aviator who failed in an attempt to fly around the world, has announced that he probably would not "make another attempt."

He asserted that such a venture to be a success, must be backed by greater resources than private firms can provide. He had no excuse to offer for his failure, beyond general misfortune and bad weather conditions.

Major MacLaren admitted that he sat on the beach and wept after his plane had been hopelessly damaged in the surf at Nikolai Island, off Siberia.

PRESSMEN'S HEAD TO BACK DEMOCRATS

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Major George L. Berry of Tennessee, president of the International Pressmen's assistants Union will support the candidacies of John W. Davis and Governor Charles W. Bryan rather than the La Follette-Wheeler ticket. Major Berry says he has no notified Mr. Davis.

Major Berry was a candidate for vice-president at the democratic convention.

MAN IS INSTANTLY KILLED IN CRASH

EUGENE, Aug. 18.—Hurled against the corner of a coach of a west bound Coos Bay branch line train Sunday morning when the truck in which he was riding was suddenly swerved to one side to avoid hitting the train, Lewis Farlow, 23, was instantly killed at Veneta, 15 miles west of here. Farlow was riding on the running board of the truck. The driver, Jake Robbins, seemed unaware of the approach of the train, as did the others. When almost on the track he caught sight of the oncoming locomotive and swerved the truck sharply. Farlow was pitched off, his head hitting the corner of the mail coach.

JEWS ARE INVITED MIGRATE TO MEXICO

CAMPAIGN CHAIRMAN APPROVES CEREMONY

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—Final approval was given today by William M. Butler, chairman of the republican national committee to plans for the notification ceremonies here tomorrow night for Charles G. Dawes, republican vice-presidential candidate.

The notification itself will consist only of an invocation, the formal address of notification by former Representative A. J. Jeffers of Nebraska, and the response by the nominee. Chairman Butler will preside and both addresses will be comparatively brief.

The "doings" as General Dawes looks upon it, will be the rally and parade before the formal ceremonies. Hundreds of telegrams have been received from cities in the middle west telling of plans to send delegations to march in the parade and a large representation of the party will go out to Evanston from Chicago.
