MANY VISIT HOME TOWN OF COOLIDGE

PLYMOUTH, Vt., Aug. 20.—
President Coolidge sent his "heartly
congratulations" to Charles G.
Dawes on the vice-presidential
nominee's speech of acceptance
delivered last night.

President Coolidge planned a
visit today to headquarters of the
"home town Coolidge club" in the
farm home near here of Richard
Brown, secretary.

Earl Kinsley, republican national
committeeman from Vermont, ar-
rived last night and visited the
club this morning reporting later
to C. Bascom Slem, the presi-
dent's secretary, that more than
14,000 names had been enrolled on
the club roster, principally from
tourists passing through.

Thomas Edison, Henry Ford and
Harvey Firestone, who called for a
short time on the president and
Mrs. Coolidge, yesterday were
among the latest to enroll.

Mr. Coolidge, since coming here,
has seen but few visitors and all
have painted bright pictures of the
political outlook. Keeping close to
his father's home most of the time,
and riding or walking about during
the evening the president is re-
ported as greatly rested from his
vacation.

GIANT AIRSHIP PLANNED BY BRITISH GOVERNMENT

(By Associated Press.)
CARDINGTON, England, Aug.
20.—To make room for the laying
down of Britain's new giant air-
ship of 51,000,000 cubic feet ca-
pacity, the old R 33 is being re-
conditioned for an experimental
flight to India where a mooring
mast and gas generating plant are
to be erected.

At the same time that work com-
mences on the big ship at Cardin-
gton, another of similar size will be
begun at Howden. Both of these
immense airships will be approx-
imately 760 feet long, 110 feet
in diameter, and capable of carrying
200 passengers at 80 miles an hour
on a non-stop flight of 3,000 miles.
It is stated that such a vessel
cruising at 40 miles an hour will
be able to remain in the air for
nearly three weeks without alight-
ing to replenish fuel. Steel is be-
ing considered as a possible sub-
stitute for duralumin in the struc-
ture, and engines that will burn a
mixture of hydrogen and kerosene
are being experimented with.

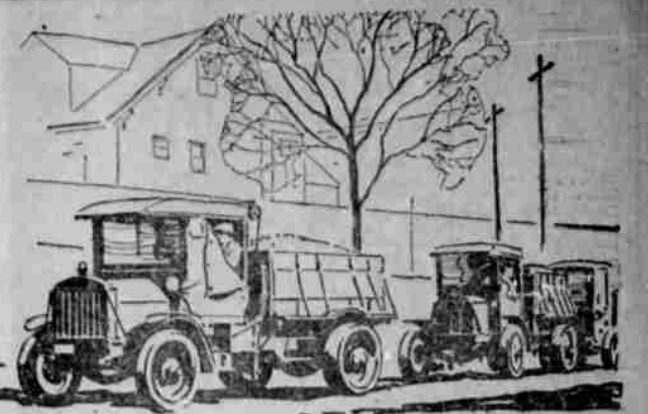

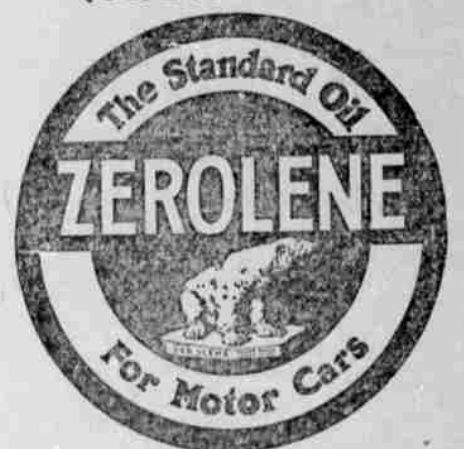
