TRIAL OF POLICE AGAIN TAKEN UP

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Resumption of prosecution of the Cicero policemen who are charged with beating Miss Rosetta "Topsy" Duncan, the actress, July 4, when they arrested her brother for a traffic rule violation, was set for today before Justice Henry G. Williams of Krasnow. Decision will be made as to whether Patrolman Benjamin DeLany, charged with assault to kill or Chief Theodore Svoboda, charged with assault will be tried.

the law has no application," said Mr. Marshall. "The anarchists were executed by the law they damned, not for their philosophy but for their violation of law."

Mr. Marshall, in a similar vein, discussed the more recent communist cases in which the millionaire Lloyd was the central figure. "Upon what theory can it be said that the views of Leopold Jr., since they do not protect him from the consequences of his act can they be in mitigation of crime?" asked Mr. Marshall.

The findings of the supreme court of the United States in the polygamy cases against Mormon leaders were referred to as another instance in which a philosophy was disregarded by the courts as a mitigation.

"Want of consciousness of criminal intent is no excuse at law," read Mr. Marshall from this case.

Again he read that to allow a plea of religious belief and philosophy as mitigation "would be to introduce a new element in criminal law to permit every citizen to become a law unto himself."

"So when Leopold Jr. put his views into action and committed murder he went beyond the pale of rightful philosophy and it is for the overt act in the belief he is to be punished," Mr. Marshall declared.

"I have shown your honor that within the law those defendants are responsible; that their beliefs may not be urged as mitigation of the offense and that the judgment must be based upon the turpitude of the crime," continued Mr. Marshall.

He then turned to the definitions of murder in the Illinois statutes to show that the crime against young Franks came within those laws. There was, he urged, no element of "justifiable homicide," present to warrant any punishment "short of the penalty of death."

From the statutory definitions of murder and kidnapping, Mr. Marshall progressed to citations in which courts of this state have interpreted the statutes, particularly as to the meaning of "malice aforethought, expressed and implied."

He then started a summarization of the crime, prefacing it with an agreement with the judge that premeditation and all other elements of deliberate crime were present here.

"It is proved here," said Mr. Marshall, "that these 'master criminals' wanted to commit an undetectable crime. And they did commit a most atrocious crime, one which deserves only one punishment, and that the death penalty."

"Now is there anything in the proposition that defendants are not yet 21," the assistant state attorney asked. He read court precedents in which minority was an issue in appeals and was overruled by higher courts.

Mr. Marshall pointed out that "an infant" more than 10 years old, is in this state, considered capable of realization of crime and may be held responsible for it in the same manner as an adult.

Mr. Darrow half turned in his chair and whispered earnestly with Leopold, while Mr. Marshall discussed the age element.

"And now we come to turpitude. The baseness and villainy of this crime are admitted. And nowhere in the jurisprudence of Illinois is there a crime so vicious, so depraved as the crime at the bar," said Mr. Marshall.

He then cited a number of Illinois decisions, everyone of which he said, had resulted in affirmation of the death sentence. The first was that of Walter Krasner, who is in the county jail on a charge of killing a policeman. Mr. Marshall pointed out, in 19 years old, the same age as Leopold.

Mr. Marshall pointed out that Krasner's youthful companion Bernard Grant, was also under sentence of death.

"And can it be said," he queried, "that these two shall be executed and two others of the same age, but with better education and opportunities who have committed a more atrocious murder, shall escape?"

DAVIS SAYS COLOR HAVE NO BEARING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—In filing governmental positions, John W. Davis as president "would consider only the ability of the applicant and his fitness for the position which he wishes to occupy," the democratic candidate for president declared in a letter to Eugene McIntosh, executive leader of the Bronx colored voters' democratic progressive association, made public today.

Mr. McIntosh in a letter, has reminded Mr. Davis that he had not included the word "color" in a phrase of his acceptance speech in which he declared that in making appointments in the event of his election, he would "set up no standard of religious faith or racial origin as a qualification for any office."

"Since the national democratic party in the past has not seemed to favor presidential appointment to offices of colored citizens, may I not ask you directly the question: If being a colored citizen would be a bar to presidential appointments by you if elected president?"

The democratic nominee replied: "My acceptance speech meant exactly what I said. In making appointments I shall consider only the ability of the applicant and his fitness for the position, he wishes to occupy."

Meanwhile McCoy's attorneys have already begun to lay the "ground work for an insanity defense added by strange ravings on the prisoner's part yesterday which state's attorneys said were feigned, but which police admitted looked genuine. One defense attorney examined the prisoner yesterday and three others will examine him today, but will make no report on his condition for several days.

INDIANS ARE GIVEN RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE

HOQUIAM, Wash., Aug. 20.—Every Indian born within the territorial limits of the United States is now a full-fledged American citizen, and has suffrage rights and is subject to all citizenship responsibilities including liability to personal taxation, Congressmen Albert Johnson declared today. "The act approved June 2 of this year, granting this citizenship," said Mr. Johnson, "and it supersedes the requirements of the Burke act of 1906 which the Indian bureau through the competency commission controlled the issuance of Indian naturalization certificates, thus limiting citizenship to competent Indians holding land in severalty and separated from tribal relationships."

"There is no question that every Indian is entitled to register and vote at the elections this year."

Indians in the state of Washington have been denied registration in the primary election they can register for the fall election.

SAYS PROTESTANTS SUFFER FROM WAR

CHAUTAUQUA, Aug. 20.—The Rev. Chauncey W. Goodrich, American representative of the central bureau for the relief of Evangelical churches of Europe, said today at the Institute of international relations from the Christian point of view that the war and the economic disorder which followed had seriously affected three fourths of the protestants on the continent.

In the separation of church and state in some countries, he declared, religious minorities are not receiving their rights.

She is survived by the widower, and two small children, Evelyn Beatrice, and Madeline June. Her father resides in Pennsylvania and her mother at Myrtle Creek. The funeral services are to be held at the Methodist church at Myrtle Creek on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Knotts of Roseburg, officiating. Interment will take place in the L. O. O. F. cemetery at Myrtle Creek.

Returns from 102 precincts out of 685 in Wyoming tabulated at 10 a. m., gave the following figures in the democratic contest for nomination for United States senator.

Ross 1904; O'Mahoney 1462; Laird 609. Ross on these returns had a plurality of 442.
