## FUNERAL OF MRS. STEARNS YESTERDAY

The funeral of the late Mrs. A. F. Stearns was held from the family residence at 2 o'clock Wednesday, being attended by one of the largest gatherings of friends of the family that ever has attended a funeral in Oakland.

The floral tributes bespoke the esteem of Mrs. Stearns which came from the community and distant places. Many letters and telegrams were received from prominent people expressing their sentiments and regrets of being unable to attend.

Pallbearers consisted of T. B. Davis, C. H. Maupin, F. M. Kohler, James Medley, B. W. Strong and R. W. Davis.

Many people from Roseburg, Eugene, Yonahis, Drain, Elkton and Cottage Grove were present. Prominent people from further points were Hon. George M. Brown of Salem, Ore., Justice of the supreme court; Mrs. L. B. Stearns and Francis Spaulding of Portland; Mrs. Mildred Chenoweth Russell, of Spokane, and Mrs. Marie Stalmeier of Marshfield.

Interment was made in the L. O. O. F. cemetery, Rev. J. K. Howard officiating and Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Kitter as funeral directors.

## OUTBREAK OCCURS IN FRENCH SENATE

Two letters, had reminded the French and Belgians of the declaration they had made when they entered the Ruhr that they had done so merely to enforce payment by the Germans.

And the German delegates at London, through the British prime minister had made it plain that the Reichstag would not accept the proposed plan unless the Ruhr were evacuated. Nevertheless, M. Herriot went on, he had come before the cabinet in Paris "decided to limit to a maximum of one year the military occupation of the Ruhr."

"To go beyond this was to risk again a rupture of the conference," the premier added, and he became convinced that if France remained in the Ruhr except for a definite stay she would stay there absolutely alone.

"They will appear considerably to all those who believe with the experts that defaults and penalties must be avoided as much as possible and that the reparations problem must be solved peacefully and righteously."

Arbitration, he continued had improved markedly the method of transfer such as was defined in the Dawes plan and has transformed the regime of payment in kind which has caused so many difficulties in the past.

M. Herriot repeated his promise to go before the assembly of the League of Nations at Geneva in support of the pact for mutual assistance and to urge the league to organize its right of investigation under the treaty of Versailles in regard to states whose armaments are limited by treaties. He said the French declaration had done its utmost in London to bring forward the problem of inter-allied debts, but it had found it impossible to graft this question on to the question of the execution of the Dawes plan.

This, however, he added, would be discussed at another conference.

"Security," the premier continued, "should be considered at another conference. I do not see why France should not take the initiative in such a brave manner."

M. Herriot reminded parliament that he had obtained an agreement from the British at London that they would not withdraw from the Cologne area until after it was determined that Germany was fulfilling her obligations. He also gave the text of the agreement for the resumption of normal economic relations with France.

In concluding his remarks, the premier again referred to the League of Nations, declaring: "The London conference, in our opinion, marks only one of the first steps against war which ought to lead to a true peace. We shall very soon have to pursue the work thus commenced before the League of Nations."

The premier received a genuine ovation from his friends, but the hostile demonstration was quite marked, the communists crying "amnesty," and hoisting banners. The communist deputy, Henri Marty, led the cat calls and howling, but the opposition subsided when M. Herriot took the rostrum and began to speak.

Before he had launched into his statement, however, the howling began again and M. Marty held aloft a banner bearing the phrase "another crime."

Great enthusiasm was displayed when M. Herriot declared that the application of the Dawes plan would dissipate the war spirit and when, he told of France's horror at the thought of war.

The premier also was applauded when he said he could not refuse the Dawes plan, which was based on cooperation and when he emphasized the importance of arbitration.

He was interrupted by the communists, who cried: "Down with war, and long live peace." These interruptions were frequent but the premier's supporters gave him rousing cheers when he told of the method which had been adopted for determining when reparations were in default. This method, he said, was entirely in accordance with the treaty of Versailles.

A violent display by the communists forced Paul Painleve, president of the chamber to discontinue the sitting after the premier had finished his statement. M. Marty's language had been so unrestrained that M. Painleve had at various times warned him, but when he finally produced the communist's amnesty poster and waved it from the rostrum that Painleve put on his hat signifying the session was at an end.

The communist deputy then started to scale the secretary's desk and to occupy the speaker's empty chair, but the ushers prevented this move in time and hastily evacuated the chamber and its galleries, while the extreme radicals kept on crying "amnesty."

The phrase which made M. Painleve suspend the sitting was Marty's shouted declaration: "All the ministers are filthy scoundrels."

BERLIN, Aug. 21.—The German government has begun the legislative program required to carry out the agreement reached at the London conference for launching the Dawes reparation plan.

A bill presented to the Reichstag provides, first, assent to the London protocol; second, authorization for the minister of finance to float a loan of 800,000 gold marks, and third authorization for the government of the Reich to take measures with a view to the surrender of state railway bonds to the value of 11,000,000,000 gold marks and bonds to the value of 3,000,000,000 gold marks under the law relating to taxation of industry.

## AMBASSADOR'S NOTE MUST BE MODIFIED

PEKING, Aug. 21.—E. Yoshizawa, Japanese minister to China and senior diplomat at Peking, has informed L. M. Karakhan, Russian ambassador in China, of his refusal to circulate among the members of the diplomatic corps representing the protocol powers the Karakhan note regarding the transfer of the Russian donation to the Soviet government it was announced today.

The refusal it was said, was due to irrelevant matter and personal allusions contained in the note.

Yoshizawa is said to have suggested to Karakhan that he re-draft his note in more moderate terms.

The Karakhan note created somewhat of a sensation this week by its tone, as well as by its refusal to accede to the terms laid down by the United States under which the latter country would consent to the transfer of the Russian donation. The United States offers to carry to the transfer provided the Soviet government regards itself as a signatory to the protocol of 1901, but such consent, it was pointed out, must not be construed as American recognition of the Soviet government.

## DAWES CAMPAIGN TO BE ON 'BRASS TACKS'

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
ENROUTE EAST WITH GENERAL DAWES, Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 21.—Definite conclusion to conduct a campaign of "brass tacks—not bombast" was reiterated by Charles G. Dawes, as he traveled eastward on his first campaign trip as the republican candidate for vice-president. Such an intention was announced by the nominee in his acceptance address Tuesday night at his home in Evanston, Ill., and was emphasized by him today in discussing the speech he would make in Augusta, Maine. Mr. Dawes feels voters want a discussion of issues conducted with definiteness and force, rather than any exhibition of generalities.

"The American voting public in my opinion wants straight from the shoulder speaking from their candidates for their national offices, and I intend to give it to them," was the way he summed up his intention.

Believing that extemporaneous address lends itself more to such treatment of the issues than does prepared speech-making, he does not intend to write out his speech in advance. In fact before leaving Evanston yesterday he threw in the waste basket the address he had prepared for delivery at Lincoln, Neb., August 29, on the agricultural question and will speak extemporaneously. He prepared his Augusta address in part several days ago.

RARE CHALMOOGAA GROWN BY U. S. FOR LEPROSY CURE

(By Associated Press.)  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Uncle Sam has enlisted in the fight against leprosy from a new angle. At the department of agriculture's station at Bell, Md., the government is engaged in propagating chalmooгаа plants, from which oil will be obtained to treat leprosy.

About 670 plants are growing in Maryland, and over 2,000 have already been shipped to Hawaii, the Philippines, the Canal Zone and Porto Rico, to mature in the warmth of a tropical sun. There is no place in the United States where the trees will develop fully.

This work has been going on since 1920, when Joseph F. Rock, agricultural explorer attached to the office of foreign seed and plant introduction, visited the jungles of Burma and Siam, searching for chalmooгаа trees.

Tracing chalmooгаа history, Mr. Rock found that its seeds and oil have been known for centuries to the natives of Burma and southern Asia in general as palliatives in leprosy and other skin diseases, and were employed by them both externally and internally.

There are about 500 lepers in the United States, as nearly as can be ascertained, says the United States public health service. About 225 are in one colony at Carville, La. A small colony which was located at Buzzards Bay in Massachusetts was merged with the Louisiana colony in 1921. There are about 300 registered lepers and it is estimated that around 150 have not been identified.
