On this foray they will be accompanied by their famous band and drum corps which will greatly add to the interest and excitement of the expedition.

In order to prevent any danger of hostilities, R. D. Bridges, Gobbler, has been delegated to "make big talk" with the Chiefs and will offer himself as a hostage for the security of the members of the tribe in our midst. To show their peaceful intentions the Gobblers will don their headpieces and join the redmen in their march and festivities.

While these are kept secret from the pale faces, it is rumored that symbolism, torture and romance are all introduced into the ceremonies with powerful effect. 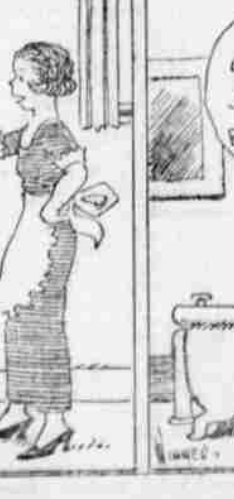
