STUMPING POWDER IS NOW AVAILABLE

United States Bureau of public roads will distribute stumping powder to Douglas county farmers through the Oregon Agricultural College county extension service. This information has recently come to County Agent B. W. Cooney.

The explosive will be handled by county pools which total car lots, says County Agent Cooney. Twenty-four thousand pounds of stumping powder was distributed last spring by Mr. Cooney and excellent field results were secured. The new stumping powder will be 20 per cent strength and will contain 300 sticks to each 100 pound box.

The powder will be distributed to farmers in lots of 50 to 1000 pounds on an individual order. The explosive has been named Pyrotol. Every farmer in the county has use for at least 50 pounds of this explosive in stumps, snags, drains, ditches, rock blasting, digging wells, subsoiling orchards, construction of private roads and many other farm uses. Mr. Cooney wishes all interested farmers to write or call on him for the price and information relating to the powder.

SPANISH FEDERALS MEET RESISTANCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

TETUAN, Morocco, Aug. 28.—Spanish columns, which are passing up the valleys of the river Lau under command of General Jerrano, are encountering serious resistance from rebel tribesmen. After concentrating at Tisgarin the Spaniards begin a march through the narrow canyon, bristling with rocky obstacles and broken ground, in an endeavor to relieve the outlying post on the other side of the river. The enemy appeared in strong force, however, compelling the Spaniards to reach a decision for the abandonment of Chentofa.

The Moroccan then attacked the Spanish position on the western bank of the river, known as artillery hill where very fierce fighting occurred. Both sides suffered heavy casualties. The foreign legion bore the brunt of the attack, losing a number of its officers in addition to a number of men of other ranks.

BARNES CIRCUS IS COMING THIS FALL

Barnes circus is coming to Roseburg, according to an announcement made this morning by Roy Bellows, western representative of the circus. The date for the show has not yet been definitely determined, but will probably be early during the month of October. Roseburg was not booked this year, but later chances have made it possible for the show to make Roseburg, and within a short time the exact date will be announced. The circus at that time will be closing its summer season and will start the task of preparing its new equipment preparatory to going into winter quarters, where preparations for the ensuing summer will be made. Mr. Bellows has been instructed to purchase 600 tons of poles, 100 stakes and a large quantity of saw lumber. These materials will be purchased locally, and will be on hand when the circus arrives.

FORMAL SIGNING OF DAWES PACT SAT.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The formal signing of the pact to make effective the Dawes repatriation plan, concluded at the recent international conference will take place at the foreign office in Downing street Saturday.

Sir Eric Grove, permanent under-secretary of foreign affairs, will sign on behalf of Great Britain with the allies and the Germans will be represented by their respective ambassadors.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The outlook for ratification by Germany of the Dawes plan agreement, concluded at the recent international conference at London, became worse today, according to latest news from the German capital. The Reichstag probably will vote on the pact late tonight. It was learned by officials here.

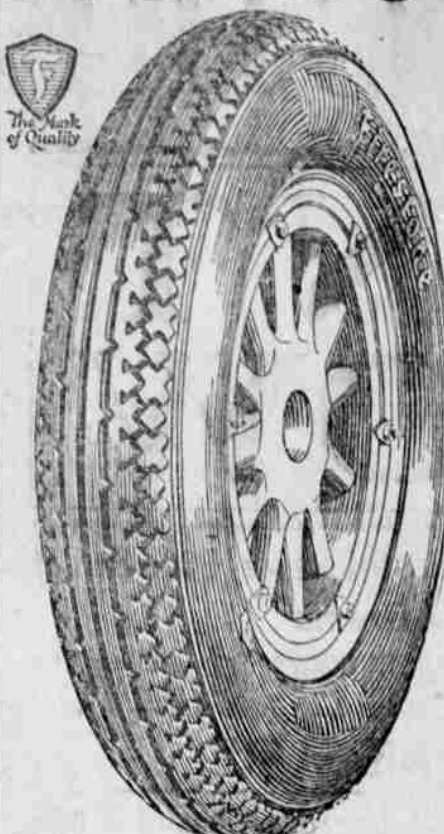
