Reedsport is coming into the Home Products Show to be held in the armory in this city on Sept. 10, 11 and 12, with one of the most complete exhibits of home products ever contained in any show of like character in this part of the country," stated Will E. Holbein, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, who returned from Winchester Bay last evening, after attending the better part of two days in Reedsport and Gardner interviewing the manufacturers in regard to the big show.

The exhibit will include salmon, meat products, lumber, sash and doors, sectional garages, wood pulp, butter, and all by-products of timber. Two booths have been contracted for, and at least one man will be with the exhibit during the show. The office of the county agent, Cooney is cooperating fully with the Chamber of Commerce in putting on this first home products show, and it is certain that many acreable surprises will be in store for all who attend.

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COMMUNISTS BREAK UP REICHSTAG MEET

(Associated Press London Wire.)

BERLIN, Aug. 28.—Final balloting in the Reichstag on the bills necessary to carry out Germany's part of the Dawes reparations program has been postponed until tomorrow because of the prolonged interruptions of the communists.

The disturbances in the house yesterday culminated in general fighting and the Reichstag president to restore order was compelled to call in a police squad and have three of the communists removed.

Unless the nationals decide to give the executive program negative strength by pronounced defections from their Reichstag lineup there is apparently scant hope of the government obtaining the two-thirds majority required for final passage. The bills yesterday passed their second reading.

Determined upon ratification of the Dawes program regardless of the attitude of the deputies Chancellor Marx has obtained from President Ebert a decree providing for the dissolution of the Reichstag, which he intends to use if the necessary two thirds vote is not forthcoming.

FARM REMINDERS.

More vetch and oats or barley on heavy, rather poorly drained soils of western Oregon; dairy farms would pay well for alfalfa. The combination of alfalfa and corn nearly two to one and almost equals any flower in yield while far surpassing it in palatability. The average yield of vetch and oats on the experiment station heavy lands from 1914 to 1921 was 12.7 tons per acre.

Anyone wishing to buy or sell a pig at weaning time and lacking information on which to base the price may safely put it at nearly one-third of the market value of a 200 pound pig. This relation of cost of weaning to cost of market animal in Oregon was arrived at through many surveys and studies by the experiment station animal husbandry department. The actual cost of producing the pig depends mainly on the size of the litter, but 50 per cent of the value of the 200 pound pig has been found to be a fair valuation of the weanling.

Poultry flocks with free range conditions on clean soil in western Oregon are just about free from disease and generally quite vigorous. The open air range house for the rapidly growing chicks is recommended by the experiment station providing as it does an abundance of fresh air, and being readily removed to fresh areas thus avoiding contamination of soil, one of the poultryman's worst foes.

One crop farmer using irrigation water all need it at once whereas diversified crops in suitable rotations in one community permit a more even distribution of water throughout the irrigation season. An increase of 50 per cent in crop production through rotation is made on the experiment station farms at Corvallis, where the oldest experimental plots in Oregon are maintained.

Drainage tile for western Oregon located in the friable streak below the blue clay has proved most effective on the experiment plots at the Corvallis station. They are carried over, under or around all thick impervious layers.
