DEFENSE DAY TO BE OBSERVED

Committee Appointed to Arrange Program in This City.

PLANS BEING FORMED

National Guard Will Mobilize and Give Demonstration—Patriotic Meet at Armory.

In keeping with the national observance of Defense Day on September 12, Roseburg will devote considerable time to the consideration of defense measures. Mayor Rice has appointed a representative committee to take charge of the program for the day and this committee is starting work at once. The committee is made up of Alvin Knudson, of the American Legion, chairman; Captain C. B. Sutton, G. A. R.; Victor Meehl, disabled war veteran; Pearl Stewart, D. A. R.; Lieutenant Harley Watson, National Guard; Victor M. Peterson, Officers' Reserve; Fred W. Haynes, Spanish American War Veteran; Mrs. G. W. Riddle, W. R. C.; and Mrs. Ellen Post, American Legion Auxiliary. H. C. Waddell, a member of the state committee, appointed by Governor Pierce, is an ex-officio member of the local committee.

The purpose of National Defense Day is perhaps best explained in a statement made by John R. Quinn, national commander of the American Legion. Mr. Quinn says: "Four years ago the American Legion, with memories of the World War's waste, hardships, confusions and useless sacrifices still fresh, came to the realization that the United States had never had a real military policy. From its founding onward our country had drifted, always through periodically into chaos in emergencies and afterward settling back into the old rut. Until treasure and unnumbered lives had been the toll of this lack of a definite military policy."

"So the legion undertook to draft a military policy which would conform to our common sense ideal of adequate preparedness without militarism. For more than a year the thought, the research, the effort and the unflagging work of the Legion's best minds were concentrated on drafting such a program. Out of the toil came results; for the first time in its history the American Legion had a military policy."

"After four years of continued labor in building the machinery for such a policy, the time has come to see whether that policy can be successful in fulfilling its promise of protection. The secretary of war has proposed and the president approved the holding of a defense test on September 12th to prove whether such a policy will work in case of emergency. It is, in effect, a fire drill to see if the fire escapes will save lives. In other words, it is a mobilization on paper."

The American nation has built up a military organization. It is composed of the small regular army, the national guard, and the organized reserve.

It is the skeleton reserve which needs attention. In every community there are reserve officers, men of experience in various lines. The government has outlined a plan array in which every man eligible for army service has his place. Each community has been reached and there is over this country the spirit of a great army, a skeleton structure, which it is believed can be quickly raised to life and made a strong military power.

Just for the sake of example there is in Roseburg a reserve air battalion. Lieutenant Leo Devaney is the commanding officer of this organization. In the records at Washington is a list of the officers who would command this organization, there are too the names of many men who are eligible for duty in this outfit. In the event of war the battalion could be mobilized within a very short space of time, recruited to full strength and ready for service. There is also an infantry unit and artillery unit organized on the same basis, with its officers designated ready to be recruited to full strength on a moment's notice.

On National Defense Day, these organizations will be mobilized to determine whether or not the policy is really effective.

In many places the mobilization will be actually completed. In other places it will be on paper only.

In Roseburg it is not expected that any great observations will be made. Roughly it is planned to call out the National Guard for the day and with the one-day recruits which are being signed up hold a demonstration. Enrollment cards have been prepared and recruits will be taken for one day only.

A military drill and target shooting with the machine guns will probably be given. In the evening it is expected that a patriotic program will be given at the armory in connection with the home products show.
