PRINCE OF WALES NEARING AMERICA

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The Prince of Wales arrived on the liner Berengaria at quarantine, lower New York at 2:17 o'clock this afternoon.

S. S. BERENGARIA, Aug. 29.—Due to arrive at New York this afternoon on his second visit to the United States en route to his ranch in Canada, the Prince of Wales spent the morning in final preparation for debarking.

Last night he took a little time off and danced to phonograph music in a quiet corner outside the royal suite with Lady Mountbatten and Mrs. Richard Norton of his party.

Earlier in the evening the prince took time to receive a deputation of brother Masons, representing all the members of the order aboard the ship. The deputation, which included two Americans, greeted Wales as Past Senior Grand Warden of the United Grand Lodge and as Provincial Grand Master of Surrey.

Despite his private little dancing party with various women of his party, the prince could not resist the temptation of making his appearance on the polished floor of the ballroom. The heat, however, was so oppressive that he did not remain there long, but went on deck with Lord and Lady Mountbatten, walking along and singing to them softly humorous songs for the amusement of his kinsfolk.

Then he disappeared and did not turn up until 12:15 this morning when he appeared in the lounge, where Grace LaRue was singing to a few persons who had gathered there. The prince, captivated by her voice, sat down with General Trotter and listened to five songs, showing his appreciation by applauding heartily.

It has been remarked throughout the voyage that the prince is a great lover of music, and that he is partial to American jazz. Several times he has expressed his appreciation of the playing of an American jazz orchestra on board.

The voyage has been a pleasurable experience for the prince and for all of the passengers.

Wales has smiled his way into the hearts of all of his fellow passengers and he says that he has enjoyed his trip immensely.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The Prince of Wales will set foot on American soil today at Glen Cove, L. I. where an extra shift of workmen employed by the New York Yacht Club worked last night under electric lights to create a setting fit to welcome the heir to the British throne.

The exact time of the prince's arrival is unknown.

It was said at the offices of the Cunard line that the Berengaria would arrive at quarantine about four o'clock and it is possible that rough weather immediately outside Sandy Hook may cause a further delay.

Plans for landing the prince still were incomplete in some respects. He will be taken from the liner at quarantine, with his suite.

DRAIN MERCHANTS WARN TOURISTS

DRAIN, Aug. 29.—This city is in the midst of a controversy over the activities of the municipal traffic officer, C. A. Cornell, hired by the city council to curb the speeders who pass through town. The city of Drain covers a considerable area and the city limits extend for quite a distance north and south from the center of town, and it is claimed by the local merchants that tourists motoring through find themselves in the city limits before they are aware of the fact, and continue to travel without reducing their speed.

Local merchants claim that the local traffic officer, in making arrests, picks up people who have unknowingly violated the speed law, thus working a hardship on travelers who wish to obey the law, but do not see the city limit signs at either end of town. The business men claim that the activities of the speed officer is costing the town about \$200 a day in loss of business from the tourists.

Banners reading "Warning: traffic cop on duty: Drain merchants friendly to you. Go very slow," have been made and boys are stationed at either end of town to warn motorists of the traffic officer. Merchants have the signs displayed in their windows and every effort is being made by local business men to overcome the unseemly advertising the town has been receiving of late on account of the speed officer.
