## CAL COOLIDGE BACKS LODGES

President Thinks Law and Order Based on Fraternism of Man.

### WANTS COMMON SENSE

Reiterates Policy of Homely Consideration of Big Problems—Shuns Political Discussion.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—"Fraternism is a strong reliance of ordered government according to public law," was enlivened today by President Coolidge in an address to delegations representing the National Fraternal Congress.

The rituals of nearly all fraternal organizations," Mr. Coolidge said "are based upon religion. No true fraternity can rest on any other conceptions. It is due to those reasons that they are supporters of true aims of society, strong reliance of ordered government, according to present law, is the cause of righteousness and religion and effective promoters of peace and good will among the nations of the earth."

The president characterized the spirit of brotherhood as the "fundamental principle of our country." As a result, he said, there is a "very great deal more of equality in America than is yet appreciated." He named the elemental virtues necessary to succeed as including industry, loyalty, faith and fellowship.

"Not to have faith in our fellowmen," he continued, "is not to have faith in ourselves. It is to deny our mutual dependence upon each other and upon a divine power. We live in an ordered universe ruled by law and by the guiding power of providence. Not to hold faith appears to me to attempt to fight against the stars in their courses. Such resistance must end in destruction. Faith in God is the beginning of religion."

As in urging a better understanding among individuals, the president declared the development of humanity requires fellowship.

"The great effort of civilization is to provide the right to come into fellowship among all the individuals of the human race," he said. "It has been and can be somewhat aided by legislation but in the main it must be worked out and provided by the people themselves. It is not so much of a rule of law as an attitude of mind."

Mr. Coolidge confined his remarks to his selected topic of fraternalism, not touching at any time directly on politics and the campaign. He spoke on the south portico with the delegates assembled on the White House lawn.

Neither did the president refer by name to any particular fraternal order or secret society. In outlining his views, Mr. Coolidge reminded his audience that "because I believe in these I would not have it thought I believe in nothing else or suppose that in our social and political relations many other things do not need to be done."

"Before we conclude that the times are altogether out of joint," he continued, "that our institutions have proven a failure, that we must have an entire new order of things, we ought to be certain that we have fully availed ourselves of the advantage of the observance of these simple, elemental, homely virtues. It will be time enough to experiment with proposed substitutes when these have been exhausted."

"It is not necessary to refer to the desirability or my general belief in the general prevalence of common sense."

## TOWN OF WILBUR HAS CLOSE CALL

Fire This Morning Threatens Destruction to Entire South End.

### ONE HOME BURNED

Residence, Barn and Two Sheds Consumed in Fire Which Sweeps Over Wide Area.

The town of Wilbur was threatened with destruction by fire today and a call for relief was sent to Roseburg. One home was burned, a barn and two sheds consumed and several houses set on fire, but saved from total destruction.

The fire started in the Charles Mead home, occupied by J. G. Sands and wife. A hot fire was going and it is believed that sparks set fire to the roof, which was covered with moss. The fire spread very rapidly and within a few minutes the entire structure was burning. Flying embers quickly scattered the fire to more than a dozen places, and the entire south end of the town was threatened with destruction.

The Methodist church, directly across the street from the burning house, caught fire more than a dozen times. The W. T. Thompson home also caught fire several times, and the roof was almost totally wrecked when burning shingles were torn off.

The parsonage and the Charles Parker home also caught fire, but were saved from any great damage. A barn behind the Methodist parsonage containing a large quantity of hay, was totally destroyed, and two woodsheds, one behind the church and the other further down the road were burned.

Section hands and a bridge crew aided the men and women of Wilbur, and when it looked like the entire town was going to be wiped out a call was sent to Roseburg for help. Chief Fletcher drove the new State fire engine over on its first hard road test, making the eight mile trip in about 12 minutes. The timely arrival of the department probably saved the Parker residence, which was threatened at that time, and Roseburg men helped in fighting out the grass fire which spread over a large area.

## OLD JOSEPHSON HOUSE BOUGHT

Building Will Be Remodeled for Modern Undertaking Parlor.

### WORK BEGINS SOON

Harry Stearns, Well Known Douglas County Man, Is Behind the New Enterprise.

A deal of more than usual importance was consummated yesterday when Harry Stearns, of Yoncalla, bought the old Josephson property at South Jackson, Mosher and Main streets from Mrs. Emma Olmstead. The consideration was \$13,500. The property has an 80 foot frontage on both Jackson and Main streets, and also 100 foot frontage on Mosher. The building was erected many years ago for a residence by Mr. Josephson, a pioneer merchant, and is in excellent condition. Mr. Stearns proposes to at once remodel the structure, providing an adequate chapel for funeral services, and making every provision in the plan for carrying on a thoroughly modern undertaking establishment. The location for the business is excellent, fronting as it does on three streets, and the rapid expansion of the commercial district of the city brings the new establishment within the business section of the town. Mr. Stearns is well known throughout Douglas county, he being a native of this section of Oregon, and has conducted a large business at Yoncalla for several years, included in which was an undertaking establishment, so is not a stranger to Roseburg people. No detail will be overlooked in the plan for the new undertaking parlor that will make it one of the most complete of its kind in the southern part of the state.

### CHINESE CIVIL WAR IMPENDING

Conflict is contained in charges by Chi Shieh-Yuan that his rival, Lu Yung-Hsiang violated a peace treaty signed two years ago by the Kiangsu and Chekiang provinces by harboring and accepting support from two military leaders lately expelled by the northern forces with which Chi is aligned.

Chi says his single aggressive purpose in the impending conflict is to capture the Shanghai-Sungkiang district. His immediate aim is to capture the Shanghai-Sungkiang, two miles south of Shanghai and forty miles down the Whangpoo river from Shanghai. Chi will move overland against Shanghai, he says, taking the outskirts of the city at the same time attacking Woosung by land and sea.

A warning issued today by naval authorities to all craft advising against ascending the Whangpoo river toward Shanghai between sunset and sunrise is expected to have the effect of bringing concentration of all foreign warcraft here.

Trains arriving here hourly from the armed districts are carrying thousands of refugees who are seeking protection in the foreign settlements.

PEKIN, Aug. 29.—In addition to the warning note sent by the diplomatic corps to the Chinese foreign office yesterday, declaring that the government would be held responsible for injury to foreigners or property in the war zone which is threatened in the vicinity of Shanghai, the British minister is understood to have sent a separate note regarding the Shanghai-Nanking railway, which is menaced by the hostile Chinese forces.
