WORLD RECORD RUN SET BY LE CONEY

ALLENTOWN, Penn., Aug. 30.—Al LeConey former Lafayette college star, was timed in 9 2-5 seconds for the 100 yard dash, a new world's record, in a track and field meet of the Knights of Columbus on the Muhlenberg college field here today. The old record was 9 3-5 seconds, held by Drew Kelly and Paddock.

LeConey running under the colors of the Meadowbrook club, Philadelphia, defeated Charles Paddock, Los Angeles, and Loren Murphree, Newark, he won by about six inches. Paddock just nosed out Murphree and hardly a foot separated the three Olympic stars as they neared the tape.

SHERIFF SLAYER IS FOUND BE FORMER MYRTLE CREEK MAN

VALE, Ore., Aug. 30.—District Attorney Robert D. Lytle announced that the killing of Sheriff W. Austin Goodman of Harney county, will be taken up by the county grand jury here Tuesday. The alleged slayer, Terrill, identified as Arch Cody, alias Fred Yardlow, of Myrtle creek, Ore., according to Lytle, who said he had sent out a number of telegrams in an effort to uncover the man's past. Sheriff H. Lee Noe brought Cody from Burns following the capture of the fugitive of Steins mountain.

That Fred Yardlow, alias Arch Cody, who is charged with shooting and killing Sheriff Goodman of Harney county, is the same man sent up from Douglas county in 1920 for horse stealing, is the belief of Sheriff Terrill of Jackson county, who was in Roseburg today on his way home to Jacksonville from a trip in Eastern Oregon. Cody stole a horse in the Diamond Lake district and went into California with the animal. He was captured by California authorities and turned over to Sheriff Terrill, but it was learned that the theft was committed in Douglas county, so George Quine, who was then sheriff, brought the man back to Roseburg where he was convicted and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

PRINCE DINES WITH COOLIDGE

Wales Joins President in Informal Luncheon at White House.

STAY IS SHORT ONE

Limits Visit to Few Hours With No Other Program Than to Meet Chief—Enjoys Visit.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—A royal welcome was given today by Washington to the Prince of Wales on his arrival here to pay his respects to President Coolidge.

Neither the intense heat nor the clearly expressed wishes of the prince himself that his visit should assume a very informal aspect, deterred thousands from crowding the union station long before his arrival and all approaches to the White House.

Strict police measures had been taken to prevent any close approach to the visitor and barriers had been erected to keep back the curious. By ten o'clock this morning, these barriers were already lined with crowds composed almost entirely of women, who dressed in their gayest bravado three hours of waiting and the rebuffs of the police for a clear glimpse of the prince.

Cheers from the platform heralded the prince's arrival a few minutes later and the crowd outside loudly took up the welcome. The prince raised his soft felt hat repeatedly as he walked out to the waiting White House automobile.

With Secretary Hughes by his side the prince sped off for the White House. The Prince of Wales arrived in Washington after one o'clock this afternoon and was driven immediately to the White House for an informal luncheon with President Coolidge. A crowd cheered him as he passed through the waiting room of the station and took his place in the big White House limousine. Outside the White House gates another large crowd was waiting to welcome him personally on his arrival here.

After the informal luncheon with President Coolidge at the White House, the prince left Washington at 3:30 p. m. today on a special train for Glen Cove, L. I.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—Edward, Prince of Wales, left early today on a special train for Washington, to lunch with President Calvin Coolidge, following a night of rest at Syonset, N. Y. Because of the early hour of departure—6:30 o'clock—the prince went aboard the train late night and retired almost immediately.

According to present plans the White House lunch will be simple and informal, only the President and Mrs. Coolidge and their son John and members of the president's personal staff, will be present.

The train bearing the prince is due in Washington at one o'clock eastern standard time, and luncheon would be served half an hour later.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Campaign thoughts and official cares were sidetracked for a while today by President Coolidge to open the White House to the Prince of Wales, who will be his guest at an informal luncheon. Having cleared his desk yesterday, his first day in the executive offices in two weeks, the president's official duties prior to the prince's arrival were of a more or less routine nature. He is planning, meanwhile, to begin work on the address he is to deliver next Saturday at the unveiling of the Lafayette statue in Baltimore.

Turning to his own clearly expressed wishes and to the deep mourning of the president's family for Calvin Coolidge, Jr., and the greatest informality marked the arrangements for the prince's short stay today, which was limited to his engagement at the White House, without even a visit to the British embassy. He planned to spend only three hours in the capital.

More Jewels Found Under M'Coy's Name

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 30.—More handfuls of precious gems, costly bric-a-brac and bits of gold and platinum jewelry today swelled the store of evidence being collected by county and federal investigators in the Mors-McCoy murder case and gem-smuggling mystery, as the result of the opening here yesterday of two safety-deposit boxes registered in the name of "Kid" McCoy, former pugilist charged with the murder of Mrs. Theresa Mors, August 12, last.

In one of the two boxes was found jewelry valued at several thousands of dollars, none of which was listed among the articles for which treasury department agents were searching in connection with an alleged smuggling plot, but all of which was identified as having belonged to Mrs. Mors.

Another lot of valuables was uncovered in the second box opened, including several costly vases, tapestries and gold and platinum novelties identified by Albert A. Mors, husband of McCoy's alleged victim, as having been stolen from the Mors antique shop since February last.

Federal investigators admitted that the new finds revealed little evidence bearing on their gem-smuggling probe, but the district attorney's men pronounced them of considerable importance in the murder case against McCoy.

The former ring idol will appear in superior court next Tuesday to plead to the murder charge and other charges of robbery and assault with intent to murder growing out of the death of Mrs. Mors and a subsequent shooting affray.

ARMY OF WORKERS ARE ENDANGERED BY SWEEPING FIRE

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 30.—Five hundred acres of timber on the Salmon Creek watershed, three miles east of Oakridge are burning, and officials are fearing a further spread of the flames, according to word reaching here this morning, if the raging flames cross the divide and sweep into the Salt Creek watershed, the lives of 2,000 more employees on the Southern Pacific right of way construction job will be endangered.

The dead mountain section, scene of many disastrous fires in the past is also threatened. The fire is green timber, in the Cascade national forest.

The conflagration started Friday evening when sparks from a donkey engine at the Davis-Webber Lumber company camp ignited the dry undergrowth and the blaze broke from control.

Heroic measures are being taken by the fire fighters, to keep the flames from jumping across to the dead mountain country, according to the reports.

If the wind is right, the flames are apt to sweep up the Salt Creek watershed where the army of men are working. Their only means of escape would be to crowd into the tiny creek while the fire swept past.

OAK RIDGE, Ore., Aug. 29.—Edgar G. Halder, owner of the Salmon Creek Logging company, while fighting the forest fire two miles east of here last yesterday became cut off by the flames and was overcome. Charles Fick saw his plight and succeeded in bringing him out. Halder was badly burned about the arms and face.

Two hundred men fought the fire all night.

DIPLOMAT INSTRUCTED

COST IN FRANKS HEARING HUGE

Quarter Million Estimated as Cost of Deciding Boys' Punishment.

ALIENISTS' FEES BIG

State and Defense Pays Large Sum to Decide Between Gallows and Prison.

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—The cost of deciding between hanging and prison sentence for Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb for kidnapping and murdering Robert Franks will amount to a quarter of a million dollars, according to a compilation of estimates by state and defense. Fees to mental experts make up the big items of both state and defense bills.

Not all bills are in, but Lawrence Cuneo, secretary to the state's attorney, estimated the total would be between \$50,000 and \$60,000. The defense spent another \$50,000, according to Clarence Darrow, chief of defense counsel, with attorneys fees yet to be fixed by the Chicago bar association.

Several actual trials have cost the state greater amounts, it was pointed out, but the Franks hearing established a record for a plea of guilty the state's effort being directed towards obtaining the severest of two punishments.

The salary of Judge John R. Caverly who has the case under advisement until September 6, was figured in the state's expense as was that of Mr. Cuneo and his assistants that totaled \$5,850. Stenographer costs were \$5,000 and guards cost a like amount, alienists' fees are estimated at \$14,000. To save a rental bill, the state purchased for \$100 the rented automobile in which Loeb and Leopold killed the Franks boy.

Most of the defense expenditures so far went to the alienists hired at \$250 a day to prepare the defense of "mental sickness," relied on to save the boys from the gallows.

Mr. Darrow and his associates agreed to have their fees set by a committee of the Chicago bar association which has not acted.

JUSTICE IS ILL

SALEM, Aug. 30.—John McCourt associate justice of the state supreme court is "quite seriously ill" at his home here and is confined to his bed in inquiry at the residence this afternoon revealed.

Members of the household said the nature of Judge McCourt's ailment had not been determined, and attempts to locate the attending physician were unavailing.

FLIGHT POSTPONED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Lieutenant Smith, chief pilot of the world fliers, notified Major General Patrick, chief of the army air service, of the postponement of the flight to Labrador in the following message: "Flight postponed because of weather conditions west end. Expect better conditions 31st."

NATIONS SIGN SOLEMN PACT

Formal Signing of Dawes Plan for Reparations Occurs in London.

OCCASION HISTORIC

Little Ceremony Attends Last Office in Putting Into Effect Plan to Help Germany.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—The pact drawn up at the recent international conference here, outlining ways and means of putting the Dawes reparation program into effect, was signed by representatives of the various nations early this afternoon.

There was no pomp or ceremony at the foreign office when the representatives of the nations which a fortnight ago reached an agreement for launching the Dawes reparation plan, signed at 12:40 o'clock this afternoon the documents embodied in the convention which passed into diplomatic parlance as the pact of London.

With the utmost simplicity, but with a solemnity which denoted the momentous character of the day's work, one after another of the diplomats signed the documents which the interested nations hope and believe will enable Germany to pay her war reparations and incidentally will restore the economic equilibrium of Europe and of the whole world.

The signatures were affixed in the ambassador's waiting room of the foreign office—a large room looking out across St. James Park to Buckingham palace. The first and second King Georges looked down from their golden frames upon the diplomats gathered there.

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POWERS WANT PROPER SAFETY

Joint Reminder Sent Chinese Government for Protection.

ALL CHINA ON EDGE

Troops Mobilized, Guns and Supplies Placed at Hand—Air of Conflict Prevails.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 30.—Reports of skirmishing in the Quinsan district where the forces of Chi Shieh-Yuan and Lu Yung-Hsiang, opposing Tachuns, are gathering although they have not been confirmed, have led to renewed efforts by Shanghai interests to avoid open warfare.

Although both sides are strengthening their positions it seems certain that the efforts of the Shanghai interests will at least result in deferring a general open outbreak and may avert it entirely. Many meetings will be held here tomorrow at which peace will be urged.

An inspection of the Quinsan region today showed machine gun emplacements and one heavy field piece as well as huge quantities of munitions and thousands of seemingly idle soldiers, variously uniformed. Many of the habitations in that vicinity are occupied by troops.

Heavy rains which have begun to fall again are regarded as an important factor in delaying hostilities as they hamper troop movements.

Business conditions in the foreign section of Shanghai are unsettled and the arrival of the foreign patrol is being held up. The foreign vessels here or enroute to this city number eleven, four American, four British, two Japanese and one French.

Japan and France are sending three gun boats and the Americans are sending the Isabell flag-ship of the Yangtze patrol and three American destroyers from Chefoo.

Rear-Admiral Charles B. McVay, Jr., commander of the Yangtze patrol is aboard the Isabell. The Yangtze estuary in the vicinity of Woosung has not been disturbed, although it is known that Chinese fleets from Foo Chow and Nanking have converged there.

Martial law regulations in the native section of Shanghai have been tightened and additional patrols put on.

Silver prices have dropped further and the price of rice is still rising.

PEKING, Aug. 30.—Members of the foreign diplomatic corps today visited the Chinese foreign office and received assurances that the Chinese government is endeavoring to avert civil war. Mediators interviewed Chi Shieh-Yuan and Lu Yung-Hsiang and received assurances that both leaders were anxious to avert if possible hostilities.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Two communications have been addressed to the Peking government by the British and American diplomatic corps in Peking, warning that government "in the solemn manner" of its inescapable obligation to prevent loss of foreign life and property as a result of the fighting in and about Shanghai.

On August 28, the Peking authorities were advised that the governments represented by the diplomats would "adopt such measures and utilize such means as are available to us to afford protection to foreign residents and to our trade and property at or near Shanghai in case the Chinese government failed to afford these interests adequate protection.

This communication read: "We the undersigned representatives of Great Britain, Japan, France and the United States learning of the grave danger to the provincial authorities of Kiangsu and Chekiang, feel it our duty to remind the Chinese government of the terms of the communication addressed by the United States to you August 11, 1923, and to repeat and reaffirm in the most solemn manner the declarations contained in the communication regarding the obligations

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
