SIX ARE KILLED IN HERRIN RIOT

1:30 o'clock. Within half an hour the excitement had subsided, at least temporarily.

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 29.—Acting on authority from Governor Small, Adjutant General Carlos Black, at 2 o'clock this afternoon put in a long distance call to Carbondale, to order troops to Herrin.

The general said he had placed the call and would instruct Major Robert Davis of the 130th Infantry, and Lieutenant W. N. Allison to proceed to Herrin at once, with the third battalion headquarters company of the 130th Infantry.

Sheriff George Galligan of Williamson county talked with General Black over the telephone shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon and made a formal request for troops.

According to information gained over the telephone from here Sheriff Galligan is in control of affairs. The trouble started, according to one story when Deputy Sheriff Bud Allison invaded a garage to levy an execution order on an auto.

Allison was accompanied by a number of other deputies who exchanged fire with a group of men inside the garage, according to the report. Deputy was killed and six men in the garage, according to long distance reports contained here.

CARBONDALE, Ill., Aug. 30.—Acting on order from Adjutant General Black, Major Robert W. Davis, commander of the third battalion, 30th Infantry late this afternoon began mobilizing troops to be dispatched to Herrin, where a clash in which six men were killed occurred this afternoon. The time of the departure of the troops has not been fixed.

HERRIN, Ill., Aug. 30.—The case against Carl and Earl Shelton, brothers charged with the murder of Constable Cagle, Ku Klux Klansman, in the rioting here last February 8, was dismissed in Herrin city court today by State Attorney Delos Duty on the grounds of insufficient evidence.

FREIGHT RATES ON GRAIN ARE REDUCED

(Associated Press Landed Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 30.—The public service commission today issued an order modifying upward its order of last January whereby the interstate freight rates on grain, hay and other farm products were reduced. The railroad took the January order to court, claiming the reduction was confiscatory and about ten days ago the court ordered a modification. The order today, while it increases the rates over the January order still keeps them considerably lower than the rates that prevailed prior to the January order and which are now effective due to litigation.

The modifications are that hay, straw, grain and other farm products will be shipped in the future on a uniform scale of rates throughout the state applying equally on branch and main lines, and applying an arbitrary 3 cents on a joint haul of 100 miles. Under this order a farmer living on a branch line, it is claimed, will pay no higher rates to Portland than a farmer living at an equal distance on a main line.

"The maximum rates established by the commission," said Chairman H. H. Corey today, "are substantially lower than the present rates. To illustrate: 'Hay formerly moved from Herrington to Tillamook at a \$7.50 per ton rate. It will now move under a \$5.90 rate. The slightly higher rates prescribed as maximum rates by the commission in lieu of the rates contained in the order returned by the commission to the court will practically remove the opposition of the western Oregon farmers that existed toward the commission's previous order.'"

Commissioner Newton McCoy did not join with commissioners Corey and Campbell in the modified order today, but insists on contending for the order now before the court although the interstate commerce commission refused to allow any reduction whatever on farm products, and western Oregon farmers opposed the commission's previous order.

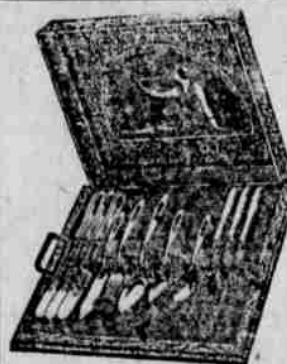
