THE SMALL HOUSE.

A friend who recently returned from a journey of some length, in which he had visited six or eight states, remarked that the thing that impressed him most, was the immense number of small houses that were being built. Compared with the dwellings of ample size that were so common a generation ago, the change indicated a considerable alteration in the habits of many people. In former days families were large, and when a young couple started out to build a home, they built for the future. They might not need a large house at the time, but they took it for granted that they would have a good sized family of children. They would often say that while they were about it they would better provide accommodation for all that might come. When people made a moderate amount of money in former years and wished better conditions of living, it was the usual thing to broaden out into a larger home, and to give their living conditions the dignity that comes from a dwelling having abundant space. It is a rather singular development, that in a period when so much progress is being made in our living conditions, as respects a pace we have had to take what some regard as a backward step. The average family is probably living today in more restricted quarters, with less space and air, than were enjoyed before the costs of living went up. The scarcity and increased wages of servants, also, have led many families to prefer smaller homes. There are advantages in the small homes and apartments which millions of people are building today. They are induced thereby to get along in a simpler way, with fewer encumbrances of furniture and equipment. This means less work to be done, and it should give people more time to devote to the finer aims, and the outdoor living that does so much to promote health.

If this prettiness is a mere superficial beauty, with no brains or heart behind it, it may be a long time before they find it out. Many of the divorces are the result of the power of a face, that seemed to dazzle and bewilder the men and prevent them from exercising their normal judgment. Mere doll-like beauty does not go as far as it used to. The majority of men want women to show something more than a finely chiseled countenance. They look for some wit and vivacity and intelligence behind it. Also beauty is not accepted as a substitute for efficiency in the business and professional world.

California Klan is reported dissolved.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 6.—Approximately 300 members of the chartered Ku Klux Klan at El Monte, near here voted last night to denounce the supreme authority of the national organization and return charter, membership cards and other papers to the imperial representative in Los Angeles. It was announced here today by officers of the El Monte organization.

Immediately after the meeting dissolving the El Monte Klan, its members met with former members of Los Angeles Klan No. 2, which rebelled against the imperial representative last week, and together with Klansmen from Azusa, Belvedere, Montebello, Covina and Pasadena, unanimously adopted the tentative principles of a new organization to be known as the Independent Order of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. This new order was formed after the Los Angeles "uprising" and number among its tenets, of course, said, religious tolerance, open membership lists and racial harmony.

ATTEND CROSSING HEARING AT SALEM

District Attorney Gay Corbin, and Attorney George Neuner, returned last night from Salem where they represented the county in a rehearing before the Public Service Commission on the order regarding the Oakland, Sutherland and Wilbur overhead crossings. A. P. Stearns and J. R. Lawwell of Oakland were also present at the hearing.

The commission a short time ago made an order allocating the costs between the state, county and railroad company. The order required the railroad company to pay only 20 per cent of the cost, dividing the balance between the county and the state.

The railroad company claimed that if the highway had been located properly the overheads would not have been necessary, and that because of this fact it should not be required to pay on the improvements. In the rehearing the county and state maintained that the highway had been properly located and that no exception should be made in this case, inasmuch as these crossings at Oakland, Sutherland and Wilbur do not differ from others in which the Southern Pacific paid 40 per cent of the cost. The commission took the matter under advisement. It is estimated that the Oakland crossing, which will be combined with a bridge similar to the structure at Myrtle Creek, will cost approximately \$50,000. The Wilbur and Sutherland crossings combined, will cost about \$25,000.

exhibits are here listed. There Community Exhibits: exhibits from Klamath county, Siskiyou county, California, and probably a grape display from Josephine county.

The largest pear exhibit ever assembled at any one place will be found at the Jackson County Fair as well as exhibits of apples, peaches and other horticultural products.

The Stock Department will have on display—dairy cows; stock cattle; poultry; rabbits; horses; sheep; hogs; goats; and forty head of calves, which the boys and girls of Jackson county have raised.

Clothing, canned goods, cakes, pies, cookies and many specimens of needle work and objects of art will be found in the Women's Department.

From the schools of the county will come exhibits which have exerted most careful and painstaking effort on the part of the children.

Along the amusement line there will be trotting, pacing and running races; the Dixie Syncope, a colored aggregation of Jazz entertainers; the Aerial Thompson's wire walkers; the best carnival company on the coast; many bands; five motion pictures; from one to three reels each; the big dance on the largest and best floor in southern Oregon, with an exceptionally fine orchestra furnishing the music; and many smaller entertainment features; such as individual exhibitors will furnish.

One hundred harness horses have been entered for the race program making this the biggest feature of the fair as well as the biggest race meet ever held in this locality. There will be forty running horses. A purse of \$5,000 is being offered for these races.

BENSON APPOINTED CITY ATTORNEY FOR REEDSPORT

Wallace G. Benson was appointed city attorney by Mayor C. McC. Johnson at the Tuesday evening regular meeting of the council, says the Port Umpqua Courier. The appointment was confirmed by the council and the salary fixed at \$50 a month. Mr. Benson was present at the meeting and assumed his duties.

The city attorney was authorized to draw up an ordinance amending the present ordinance fixing the time required to hold impounded livestock to as low a minimum as possible. This step is being taken to alleviate the conditions now existing. At the present it is necessary to hold such livestock in the pound for so long a period that the cost of feed is greater than the proceeds received from sale of the animals.
