ARMY'S CHIEF DROPS REIGNS

(Continued from page one.)

plans to become the nucleus of any military force the country may be obliged to place in the field. He has taken a leading part in the development of the citizen components of the army of the United States.

"General Pershing has already received from the congress the thanks of that body and of the American people, and now I extend to him anew the thanks of the nation for his eminent services and tell certain that I voice the sentiment of the entire citizenry of the republic in wishing him long life, happiness and prosperity in the retirement he has so richly earned."

The general lays down his burden of active military duty with the satisfaction of having witnessed as a culmination of the task which he has contrived devotedly in the period since the war a test of the new national defense program which he and his associates regard as eminently successful.

General Pershing's farewell to his associates of the army was given over the telephone line after he had concluded the radio address to the country for which this was arranged last night. Calling roll of corps area headquarters from Washington to New York, and thence to San Francisco, with an instant response from each, the general inquired of each major general in command the result of Defense Test in his territory. The unvarying reply of success and enthusiastic response brought his personal thanks and congratulations. Then he bade them farewell.

General Pershing has not indicated his plans for the future.

The single decoration on his tunic, of the scores that are his, was the ribbon showing that he had, with hundreds of comrades in the world war army, been awarded a distinguished service medal.

Pershing's office was deluged again today with cablegrams, messages and letters of greeting from all over the country and many parts of the world.

TEACHERS MEET AT HIGH SCHOOL

Annual Pre-School Gathering Held This Morning to Plan Work.

SUPT. HAMM SPEAKS

Urges Teachers to Teach Patriotism Daily in Song, Recitation and Story—Rules Discussed.

The annual teachers meeting preliminary to the opening of school was held this morning at the high school building. City Superintendent M. S. Hamm was in charge and brought to the attention of his teachers many matters of school routine, such as the rules and regulations governing pupils and teachers, professional upkeep, school calendar, observance of Constitution and Education weeks, registration of certificates, etc.

In conclusion the superintendent spoke to the teachers as follows: "The above announcements for many of you are repetitions of previous admonitions, yet these little details continually followed make up a unified system of procedure and provide smoothly working schools. May I add some other statements?"

"As teachers we are more or less patterned for those in our charge. I need not emphasize too strongly, careful thought about our conduct outside the classroom. Modern society provides many outlets for the social tendencies of our young people. It is my belief that as teachers we should do everything within our power to stimulate by our conduct, a desire for the wholesome use of leisure time in wholesome recreation. Let us show by our actions and habits alignment with those influences in Roseburg that make for clean living, proper regard for law and order, exemplary citizenship and unchallenged Americanism."

"Our duty is quite plain concerning character development and loyalty to country."

"Parents have an obligation to discharge in teaching their children obedience to our laws, thrift, honesty, reliability, clean living, etc. But we know that some parents permit their children to form these habits of conduct and thought by accident, from contact with others or from society in general. Some young people are there fore lapsed as to their moral fiber and have worldly conceptions of living. It is imperative that we must, whenever possible, by precept, example and outlined course, teach proper manners and morals. Each day there is ample opportunity in each class incidentally to draw a moral lesson from some phase of the recitation. Let us do this whenever possible and unconsciously our boys and girls will form correct concepts of living. I do not think we can over-emphasize this duty of our profession. Nor should we slight proper training in courtesy. We should teach good manners from the first grade to high school seniors, especially proper conduct in public gatherings, respect for one's elders and the usual courtesies of everyday living. Life is much more than so much arithmetic, geography, geometry or shorthand. A knowledge of the fundamentals is necessary and a well rounded education in the academic and vocational fields is most desirable, but perfection in these subjects without a proper outlook on life and the ability to adjust oneself in a positive way to our complex social structure thereby dealing justly with one's fellow men, is effort all wasted and years of schooling spent for naught. Let us therefore continually take stock of our selves in this great undertaking and ever remember that we are teaching boys and girls, not subjects—aiding them to be good, true loyal citizens."

"We all know there are many insidious doctrines rampant in America today, seeking to undermine our nation. The American home has also an obligation to ward its children in this respect, but the school is indeed the cradle of the nation's life. It is for us teachers to inspire love of one's country, proper regard for our national emblem, respect for America's traditions and national heroes. Do not forget to teach patriotism daily by song, saluting the flag, reciting the creed or by story. We receive our compensation from this state. As teachers we owe the state fullest allegiance and loyal devotion. We must satisfactorily discharge this obligation to our boys and girls."

"And may I bespeak your cooperation in civic affairs. We should do our part in making Roseburg a better place in which to live. Let us render every service we can to this community. We should evidence keen interest in every worthy civic enterprise."

"At the year's close may our hearts be glad and our consciences be free knowing that we have, in keeping with our abilities, faithfully discharged our obligations in all these affairs. With such feelings the year will have been eminently successful and the boys and girls will have been given a new vision of life by our having worked here."

JEALOUSY DRIVES WOMAN TO UNHAPPY MARRIAGE

Can jealousy drive a woman to an unhappy marriage? This is the strange question that Booth Tarkington, famous novelist, both propounds and answers, in a remarkable way in "The Turmoil," pictured in Robert Henley's new Universal Jewel production which comes Sunday and Monday to the Antlers theatre. Tarkington utilizes a trick of fate to make what at first glance seems an impossibility a living, breathing reality, and, when reduced to "brass tacks," an intensely logical and very gripping dramatic situation.

The picture shows the inside of an American newly-rich family, crammed with suspicion, jealousy and hate. The daughter of the family engages in a flirtation with a society "lounge lizard," and her jealousy fanned by an affair between this man and her brother's wife, finally elopes, although left alone, she could probably never have dreamed of marrying the man.

The sinister influence of the jealous sister-in-law runs like a thread through the events of the stirring picture; one man is driven to drink, another to death, through her machinations—and still she herself is apparently a good woman. The play is crammed with such paradoxes; in fact, every character is human, with all its human contradictions, rather than the stereotyped dramatic form.

CREWS CALLED FROM THROUGHOUT STATE TO COMBAT BLAZE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PASADENA, Calif., Sept. 12.—Crews from practically every national forest in California and a party of experienced men from southwest forest service headquarters at Albuquerque, N. M., today were aiding all available fire fighting forces in this district in the battle to control the San Gabriel brush fire, which for two weeks has been raging in the Angeles National forest east of here.

Early today the flames were sweeping northwestward from Monrovia peak and Van Tassel Canyon, after having frustrated an attempt to pinch them out with converging fire breaks. On another front they were moving north from the west fork of the San Gabriel river. A thousand men were participating in the struggle, several hundred of them being engaged in constructing a great fire break from Mount Wilson to a point north of Monrovia peak while others fought at close grips with the blaze.

Adverse winds and low humidity were hampering the fire fighters and federal officials directing operations would venture no prediction as to when the blaze could be brought under control.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY PRUNES MOVING OUT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Sept. 12.—Two carloads of dried prunes of the 1924 crop in the Willamette Valley, the first of the season to move, were shipped from here to eastern market centers today. A third car will go forward Monday.

Included in today's shipments were an assortment of sizes including 30s 40s and 50s, with the 40s predominating. Inspectors passed all of the prunes as first grade.

In a trade letter issued today M. J. Newhouse, manager of the North Pacific Prune Exchange, reaffirms his statement of a week ago that the total dried prune crop in Oregon and Clark county, Washington, will not exceed 30,000,000 pounds. Forty percent of the crop has already been sold, he asserts.

Picking and drying operations in the central Willamette Valley will be wound up today with few exceptions.
