RESTRAINT OF TRADE CHARGED BY COUNSEL AT OIL HEARINGS

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Sept. 19.—(A. P.)—The entire gasoline trade in America, and even in some foreign countries, is involved in evidence being produced in the gasoline price hearing conducted here by Attorney General Jesse W. Barrett of Missouri, in the opinion of well informed authorities.

Contracts brought forward at the hearing between the Standard Oil Company of Indiana and nearly all the other important companies of the United States, and applying to their foreign trade, are pronounced a violation of the anti-trust laws both by United States Attorney General Stone and Attorney General Barrett.

Some weeks ago the United States department of justice filed a suit against 48 oil companies doing interstate business, charging that by a system of licenses on "cracking process" patents, the gasoline trade of the United States was being restricted and monopolized, and asking that the defendants be enjoined from a continuance of the contracts and their effects. The contracts, the existence of which was alleged by the government, were produced at the Missouri hearing by the Standard Oil Company and admitted to be in effect at the present time.

A form of enforcement which was particularly denounced by Attorney General Barrett is illustrated by the contract between the Standard Oil Company of Indiana and the Standard Oil Company of California. This recites that the Texas company is owner of certain cracking patents; that Texas

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
