Pierce, upon the recommendation of District Attorney Newton Borden has granted a conditional pardon to George Reynolds, who upon a plea of guilty, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$250 for driving an automobile while intoxicated. ### MARKET REPORT

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 19.—White henry extras are two cents higher in the local egg market with 45c marked up on the dairy exchange. Other grades remain steady and unchanged. The Portland market is now more in line with other centers and some of the jobbers are already cautious about getting it much higher, fearing that it will curtail consumption. Storage stock is coming out now and bringing a profit.

Print butter is two cents lower in the local market today with 42c quoted on parchment wrapped bricks at the creamery. Butterfat bids are 3c lower, with 35c offered for o. b. shippers' track in zone one. Portland delivery prices range from 39 to 40c.

Cube firsts are 1c lower on the exchange at 35c.

Country dressed meats and poultry are maintaining a steady tone with prices generally unchanged. Top calves 16c; hogs 14c; heavy hens 24c; light springs 25c.

Demand and supply well balanced.

The hay market continues steady; country shipments are improving but stocks are cleaning up promptly. Prices are unchanged.

Oregon onions are lower with No. 1 stocks selling in carload lots at 22. The lower level has stimulated the demand and stocks are moving freely.

Growers are digging their potatoes and offerings are pouring into the local market. Prices are unchanged.

Lettuce is plentiful with local stocks of good quality selling at \$1.75 a crate.

The melon market is easier with demand reduced by cooler weather.
