## TILLER CUT-OFF ROAD IS URGED

Taxpayers in Section Believe the Improvement Should Be Made.

COST BE NOMINAL

Outlay Not to Be Considered as Expense But as an Investment or an Asset.

County Commissioner Ed Weaver and Roadmaster Floyd Frear, who spent a couple of days in the Tiller-Drew section last week looking over the road situation, and examining into requests of the people from those localities, returned yesterday. In speaking of the work that ought to be done, Mr. Frear said this morning that the Tiller cut-off in Trail, intersecting at the latter point with the Crater Lake highway from Medford, is an improvement that is entirely feasible and ought to be completed at the very earliest moment. The county road to Tiller is in very good condition and is graded the entire distance from Canyonville, so that it is fit for auto traffic the year round. The grade from Tiller to Drew is excellent. This is a distance of six miles and cost a lot of money. The government aiding in its construction, and of the entire distance from Tiller to the Douglas-Jackson county line of 26 miles, only about 10 miles needs any great deal of work to make the road fit for travel by autos during the entire year. The road on the Jackson county side from Trail to the Douglas line has been graded and is in excellent condition, although not as wide as it might be. But the grade is fine and the work so far done is a permanent character. From Drew to the boundary, a distance of ten miles, the road crosses Elk creek at four different points, and there are no bridges of consequence. The grade between those points should be laid out on one side of the creek and crossings done away with. With this work done and the road graded, there would be no difficulty in traveling over the cut-off at any season of the year. In fact, according to Mr. Frear, six or seven miles of grading would do the business, and the work would be easy.

Tax payers in the southern part of the county are insisting that this road project be completed. Work was started on the Tiller cut-off during the time Smith Barron was forest supervisor for this district, and at that time the grade between Tiller and Drew was built. Since then little has been done. A year ago the government appropriated a couple of thousand dollars and the county the same amount, and some improvements were made at places where the work was most needed. That the Tiller cut-off would be of inestimable benefit to Douglas county may be seen from the fact that the distance to Trail by way of Medford is 124 miles. Going by the way of Gold Hill it is 117 miles to Trail, and from Roseburg to Trail by the Tiller cut-off it is only 75 miles. The Trail route is the direct road to Crater Lake, and at present all travel from the north bound to Crater Lake must go by way of Medford or Gold Hill. The Tiller cut-off intersects the Crater Lake road at Trail, and with the road in a reasonable year-round condition, travel would come via that route. At present there is some travel over the road, but there are some steep pulls and bad crossings that make it hard for autos. Messrs. Frear and Weaver made the trip over the road during the rain of last week, and the Ford car in which they traveled negotiated the entire distance to the foot of the mountain above Drew without a hitch. At the foot of the hill there they put on the chains to complete the trip over the divide into Trail.

It is pointed out that the road between Tiller and Drew is one of the best in the section, and that it is now being completed by the North-Tillamook road. It is pointed out that the government can be induced to see the necessity of completing the improvement by appropriate sufficient money. It is pointed out that the Tiller cut-off may be a splendid road at small outlay and travel route that would save many hours of travel. It is pointed out that the government is now spending \$100,000 a year on the Tiller cut-off, and that the improvement is a permanent one, and that it is a matter of public interest.

## AMERICAN WILL TAKE ROLE OF FINANCIAL DICTATOR OF EUROPE UNDER THE DAWES PLAN

Seymour Parker Gilbert, permanent agent for Reparations Payments, to use the unofficial words of Secretary of Treasury Mellon, is "brilliantly competent." His experience in the United States Treasury department extended over four administrations, those of McAdoo, Glass, Houston and Mellon. He is credited with having worked out many of the details of the Mellon tax plan.

The transfer committee is to have the direction of a unique policy under the Dawes plan. Permanent assignment to the post. All German reparation payments from whatever source are to be deposited to the account of the agent for reparations payments, in the new bank of Leipzig, the "Gold Bank," which is chartered in Germany for a period of 50 years under the Dawes program. The world probably soon will see this American agent for reparation payments writing checks for billions of gold marks for transfer to the Allies.

To Regulate Transfer. Recognizing the theory that in the long run the reparation funds raised in Germany and transferred to the Allies cannot exceed the balance of trade, without currency and budget instability following the Dawes plan, authorizes the agent for reparation payments and the transfer committee to regulate Germany's reparation payments and transfers to the Allies in a manner to prevent crisis in the foreign exchange and to effect the largest transfers to the Allies without causing currency instability.

PARIS, Sept. 19.—(United Press)—An American in the role of virtual financial dictator of Europe, with the possibility that he may become the greatest single financial authority the world has known is provided by the Dawes plan for a settlement of the reparations problem. This position is that of chairman of the so-called transfer committee. The chairman will be known principally as agent for reparation payments. It is the most powerful position under the Dawes plan. Upon the urgent request of the reparation commission here, Owen D. Young, a prominent business executive of New York and one of the principal members of the settlement inquiry that drew up the Dawes plan, is assuming the all-important post of agent for reparation payments. Young is accepting this position only temporarily while he familiarizes another American, Seymour Parker Gilbert for

Should the payments by Germany exceed the amount that the transfer committee can be transferred, it is provided that those funds can accumulate in the Gold Bank up to 2,000,000 gold marks, sums in excess of which will be invested in Germany; but the accumulations in the Gold Bank are to be limited to 5,000,000 gold marks. If this limit has been reached, the payments from the German budget provided for in the Dawes plan are to be reduced until transfers to the Allies can be increased and the accumulations in the Gold Bank fall again below the limit. There are provisions, also, whereby the committee can suspend the accumulations before reaching the 2,000,000,000 limit or can allow their continuance beyond that limit, when judged necessary.

**TRIES KEROSENE AS FIRE STARTER**  
Starting a fire yesterday morning with kerosene caused painful burns in Ed Noah, a local blacksmith, and resulted in the fire department being called out to assist in putting out the blaze. Getting up early, Mr. Noah found the morning chilly, and pouring a quantity of kerosene onto the stove, he applied a lighted match to the "killing" with the result that an explosion occurred immediately. The stove was somewhat demolished and the burning oil ignited Mr. Noah's clothing in the effort to drive himself of burning trousers he suffered a badly burned left hand and painful blisters on the left leg from the flash to the feet. Prompt arrival of the department prevented the fire from getting away and saved the premises.

**MAD DOG CAUSES MUCH EXCITEMENT**  
A mad Shpherd dog created considerable excitement around the depot yesterday morning because the animal was killed by Officer Ketch. The dog was first seen by the Oak street team. It charged him, and he ran into his station and shut the door. The dog then began making up and down the platform, making the station who appeared in sight. Chief of Police Ketch was alerted and he killed the dog, being forced to fire four shots into its body before finally ending its life. The animal was flamed by a man meeting a short distance outside the city, who said that he had brought it to a local veterinarian for treatment for distemper.
