ATTEMPT TO BRIBE
PHILADELPHIA MAN

(Continued from page one)

Commissioner Landis' investigation and until this is received they will withhold their final decision.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—As pre- parations were being made to re- ceive baseball, prodigal son of the nation, back into the hearts of the people, a new scandal has been revealed.

The ultimate efforts of which cannot be estimated. Commis- sioner Landis, who announced last night that Jimmie O'Connell and Cozy Dolan of the Giants had been declared ineligible for at- tempted bribery, will continue his investigations in Washington to- day in an effort to discover who put the \$2400 into the hands of the sub-outfielder who originated the scheme now credited to Dolan, and to what extent it was practiced during the season.

People over the length and breadth of the land who yester- day forgot business and politics and ordinary affairs of life to re- joice with the national capital as it returned its heroes, people who had been prepared for a real celebration at the new baptism of popular approval of the national game, today try to understand the circumstances of the situation sketchedly presented by Commis- sioner Landis in his announce- ment.

Heinie Sand, Philadelphia shortstop looms as the hero in baseball's latest family tragedy. The commissioner acted upon in- formation furnished by Sand who charged that O'Connell had offered \$500 to him to "throw" the game between the Giants and Phillies on September 27. New York won the contest, 5 to 1 and clinched the pennant.

O'Connell called before the commissioner, President Heydler of the National League, and John McGraw, manager of the Giants, confessed to offering the bribe and implicated Cozy Dolan, coach of the team, Captain Frank Frisch, George Kelly and Ross Young, the latter trio composing the backbone of the team. Frisch, Kelly and Young were complet- ively absolved by the commissioner following a hearing, but Dolan whose testimony in favor of him- self was of "such a character as to be unacceptable," the commis- sioner said, was blamed as the man who instigated the plot.

Immediately after announcing the story to the Associated Press in New York, Commissioner Landis accompanied by his wife, left for Washington to take over su- pervision of details of the world's series which is now expected to be played in an atmosphere whose drama can only be guessed.

Captain Frank Frisch was the only Giant remotely involved who could be reached for a statement. He said:

"I was dumbfounded when called before Commissioner Landis. Frisch said, 'I hope the whole matter will be sifted to the bot- tom and if any player has been guilty of doing wrong he will be properly punished.'"

Dolan, to whom present im- plication points the most severe finger, has been a base running coach for McGraw since 1921. He was formerly infielder on the Phillies, Pirates, Reds, Cardin- als and Yankees, and has been playing professional ball for the last 20 of his 37 years.

The newest blow to baseball has been landed most heavily on the Pacific Coast, where Jimmie O'Connell, \$75,000 "beauty," purchased by New York in 1921, occupied the same relative po- sition in public esteem that Babe Ruth now holds in the national field.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—In- vestigation of the charges of at- tempted bribery, involving the New York Giants, National League champions has been com- pleted and baseball officials ap- parently are convinced that the expulsion of Jimmie O'Connell, young outfield sub and Cozy Dolan, veteran coach, has brought the case officially to a close.

Cozy Dolan, Giant coach, who was also expelled as a result of O'Connell's confession, George Kelley, Captain Frank Frisch and outfielder Ross Young, also spoke to him concerning the bribery. O'Connell said, adding that they gave him to understand that the entire Giant team was "in on it."

"They were all in on it," the young outfielder said. "I am be- lieving the rest of that's all." O'Connell reported with other members of the team at the polo grounds at 10 o'clock this morn- ing declaring that he had not been "officially or unofficially notified of his suspension."

"I didn't know what else to do," he explained. He frankly dis- seminated the details of the at- tempted bribery.

HAZELTON, Penn., Oct. 2.—Heinie Sand, National League shortstop, who reported to the baseball authorities an attempt to bribe him to throw last Saturday's game to the New York Giants, still declined today to go into the details of the transaction. He said he had wired President Heydler of the National League for advice as to whether he should remain silent or make a public state- ment. Sand said the attempted bribe was made on the field be- fore the game.

Jimmie O'Connell, the Giant's sub-outfielder who made the at- tempt was a long time getting down to the point, Sand said. No

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mention was made of how the game was to be thrown; nor did O'Connell say how the bribe was to be paid or where it was to come from.

As soon as he turned him down Sand added, he reported the matter to Manager Art Fletcher of the Phillies, who informed Presi- dent Heydler.

Sand said he made a statement to Mr. Heydler, who informed him he would report to Commis- sioner Landis.

Sand said he then was called in to a second conference, at which he made a full statement to Judge Landis, the commissioner. Sand declared, said he "would run this thing to the bottom."

Sand said he was very sorry that O'Connell made the offer. He did not know why he picked him out, but thought it was because he and O'Connell were good per- sonal friends. Both had played in the Pacific Coast League. O'Connell with San Francisco and Sand with Salt Lake City.

"Ball players who play in the same league and then go to the majors, usually get chummy," he said.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—John J. McGraw, manager of the New York Giants, after a meeting of the team this morning, said that he did not think that either Dolan or O'Connell were vicious, or that either had any connection with a gambling ring.

"They were dumb," McGraw de- clared.

"I can't understand why those two men did what they did," McGraw continued, "when the chances were 100 to 1 that New York would win the pennant. The only explanation I can give is that they are a couple of saps. If you search the country over you probably couldn't find two bigger ones."

O'Connell attended the meeting of the club held at the polo grounds, but Dolan was not there. McGraw announced that both would be banned as soon as he had received official notice of Commissioner Landis' decision. This was taken to mean that O'Connell probably would leave for Washington with the Giants this afternoon.

Francis X. McQuaid, treasurer of the Giants, said he believed O'Connell had implicated Kelly, Frisch and Young because he (O'Connell) realized he was "in bad" and tried to put part of the blame on the others.

McGraw said that Frisch, Young and Kelly had denied any implication in the attempted bribe- ry. Frisch, McGraw said, would start the opening game of the series at second base and Kelly probably would be used at first.

"The attitude of the players to- wards O'Connell this morning," McGraw said, "seemed to be one of sympathy rather than resent- ment. At the meeting I tried to pep the boys up so that the in- cident would have no effect on the series, but of course I cannot tell how it will effect either the players or the public."

McGraw explained that the af- fair was entirely out of the hands of the New York club having been taken over by Commissioner Landis, who had made his de- cision. The Giant officials, the manager said, had cooperated with the commissioner in the in- quiry.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 2.—"Call- ing off the world series would not be too far to go to get the right results," of baseball's latest scandal, it was declared today by Barney Dreyfuss, owner of the Pittsburgh Pirates, who issued a statement declaring Jimmie O'Connell and Coach Cozy Dolan of the New York Giants, accused of offering a bribe to have a game with Philadelphia thrown last Saturday, "were only the pawns."

Dreyfuss, whose team for a time threatened to win the pen- nant in the National League, de- clared that Dolan last year ap- proached Pie Traynor, stellar star baseman of the Pirates and advised him to hold me up for \$15,000 salary for 1924.

Dreyfuss said he made charges against Dolan before Commis- sioner Landis after the world's series in New York last fall.

"Traynor repeated his story and there was clear evidence of tampering," said Dreyfuss' state- ment, which declared that both John McGraw, manager of the Gi- ants, and Dolan "were warned at the time to keep away from other clubs."

After the hearing before Com- missioner Landis, the statement said, Dolan said he had merely "told Pie he ought to get more money in 1924 and denied any one had prompted him."

STUDENTS MAKE PROTEST

SEATTLE, Oct. 2.—A resolu- tion of protest against Bolshevik treatment of students in Russia passed by an organization of fu- gitive students in Prague Czechoslovakia, has been received here by the associated students of the University of Washington. No ex- planation of the protest was in- cluded in the letter addressed to the "Union of students."

"In Russia most of the high schools have been closed, and in the remaining ones the number of students is nearly twice reduced," said the resolution in part. "Thousands of students are pit- tifully banished into far-off places imprisoned in concentration camps like enemies, jeered at and tortured in prisons because they want to study."

The resolution charged that on- ly sons of laborers were admitted to the schools; that their stand- ard was steadily lowered; and that many students were expelled and forced into exile because they were pursuing knowledge in- stead of free rations given to pro- letariat students by communists.
