FORMER OAKLAND
RESIDENT DEAD

William D. McGee, a former resi-
dent of Oakland, died at his home
in Washington last Sunday, ac-
cording to word received here. He
was a brother of the late C. A. Mc-
Gee, and an uncle of George M.
Wilcox, who resides on the McGee
place. The report of Mr. McGee's
life is given in the following clip-
ping from his home town paper:
William D. McGee, 73, pioneer
of the Puget Sound and Oregon
country, and a former member of
the Tacoma fire department, died
at his home near Des Moines,
Wash., early Sunday morning. Mr.
McGee was a veteran of the Civil
war and a member of Chester Post,
G. A. R. of Tacoma. Following
the close of the Civil war the Mc-
Gees crossed the plains and settled
at Oakland, Ore., in 1871. He was
married to Sarah Frances Weaver,
a native daughter of Oregon, and
in 1884 they moved to Tacoma,
where they resided until 1901, the
family then moving to Seattle
while the father and two sons joined
the gold rush to Alaska. They
spent 14 years in the Cooper river
country. Coming out of Alaska,
Mr. McGee purchased a ranch at
Des Moines and the family has re-
sided there since.
Mr. McGee was a member of Tac-
oma's volunteer fire department,
and upon organization of the city's

LATE
WIRE
NEWS

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, Oct.
3.—The fate of the revolution in
Honduras, in the opinion of offi-
cials, now hinges upon the ques-
tion of whether the main body of
rebels besieged by strong contin-
gents of government troops in
Comayagua will be able to break
through the cordon and carry
their civil warfare into other
parts of the republic.

A government attack on the
bottled-up rebels in Comayagua
is being delayed in order to pre-
vent unnecessary bloodshed.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Interest in
the Irish bill which passed
through all its stages unamended
in the house of commons tonight
is being dwarfed by the buzz of
political gossip predicting an
early defeat of the government in
the general elections.

Everything still remains in the
realm of speculation, but opin-
ion seems to be hardening that
either on a vote of censure next
Wednesday or upon the question
of the Russian treaty which is to
come up early in November, the
MacDonald government will be
overthrown.

There was talk tonight that in
the event of the downfall of the
present labor government King
George would summon former
Premier Baldwin to form a new
government and that Mr. Bal-
win would decline the task and
that then the monarch would in-
vite former Premier Asquith to
take up the burden.

This speculation, however, in
some quarters, was characterized
as improbable, it being asserted
that should Mr. MacDonald, if de-
feated decline to resign he almost
certainly would advise King
George to dissolve parliament,
whereupon the labor government
would readily appeal to the coun-
try to give labor another trial,
trusting to its achievements, es-
pecially with regard to its foreign
policy and MacDonald's success
in helping to make successful the
Dawes plan.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Immigra-
tion Commissioner Curran has
recommended to the department
of labor that deportation proceed-
ings against Luis Angel Firpo be
dropped. Mr. Curran said the evi-
dence given at the hearing on Ellis
Island did not bear out the charges
that the boxer had brought a wo-
man into this country from Argen-
tina for immoral purposes. A
charge that Firpo committed per-
jury in statements to the immigra-
tion authorities, is pending in the
federal court.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—A com-
plete review of the veteran's
bureau of all disallowed claims of
world war veterans was urged in
a memorandum presented today to
Director Hines, by National Com-
mander Frank J. Irwin, of the dis-
abled American veterans.

In asking that a separate divi-
sion be set up for this task, Com-
mander Irwin contended that
thousands of veterans were being
denied benefits either through ig-
norance of the liberalizing clauses
of the Reed-Johnson bill enacted
by congress last June, because
permitting their claims to lapse
through discouragement due to de-
lays in obtaining action.
