OLEOMARGARINE AND THE DAIRY INDUSTRY

Everybody recognizes the economic value of the Oregon dairy industry, and the value of milk and its products on human growth and freedom from disease.

Certain manufacturers found out that they could extract the butterfat from whole milk and sell it, and then add to the skim milk some cheap vegetable oil and sell it to poor people as something to take the place of butter.

Posing as philanthropists, they carried on a tremendous campaign of advertising, as similar people had done to eliminate lard and substitute vegetable oils.

Harping on cheapness, many families were weaned away from dairy products. These families may wonder why their children do not thrive as they should.

Every sale of a pound of oleomargarine displaces a pound of butter. It is very hard to secure data on oleomargarine sales in Oregon, but it is estimated that in 1923 between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 pounds of margarine were sold here.

Just as the absence of whole milk and butter in the diet of babies, children and youths has stunted their growth, so the great dairy industry, mercantile establishments—the state itself has been stunted.

What will the future be? Will the number of cows in Oregon decrease? Will there be fewer creameries and cheese factories and condenseries as the years go by?

The dairy business of Oregon is conducted by Oregon citizens. They suffer when the state suffers. They thrive when the state thrives. Their interests are Oregon interests.

The oleomargarine business is far-flung. Its manufacturers are not here, save for one little factory. They want to make money, and they are making it—somewhat at our expense.

The stay-at-home vote and the woman's vote are two hitherto unknown factors that have weight enough to settle the issue of any national campaign.

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NOT PROTECT SOLDIERS' HOME

New Fire Ordinance Would Leave Institution Without Fire Protection.

BOUNDARY IS LIMIT

Fire Department Will Be Penalized for Taking Equipment Outside of City Lines.

Shall the city of Roseburg refuse to give fire protection to the Oregon State Soldiers Home, just because it is located outside of the city limits?

The ordinance covering this matter has been prepared by a committee recently appointed by the council, and if it is adopted in its present form this important state institution will be left with no protection other than that furnished by its own equipment, which although it is very good, needs the service which the city can lend in the event of an emergency.

The ordinance as it is now prepared prohibits the city fire department from taking any of the apparatus outside of the city limits, except to organized municipalities where there is a pressure water system, and other equipment for fire protection.

All calls to rural districts must go unanswered, and any member of the fire department who takes the apparatus outside of the boundaries, is subject to a fine, and if a volunteer member of the department is guilty, then the monthly allowance to the department is to be forfeited.

At a former council meeting the matter of protecting the home was discussed, and there was some sentiment expressed that the city should not be called upon to furnish fire protection for the institution.

Should the ordinance pass in its present form, however, the city department will have no other recourse but to stop at the edge of the city, and watch this valuable institution go up in smoke.

Aside from all this, however, there is still a stronger opinion that the city should give protection to the soldiers home because of the lives which would be risked in the event of fire.
