REGULATE CARS DURING FIRES

Council Passes Ordinance Requiring Autos to Give Way to Apparatus.

DECLARE EMERGENCY

New Regulations Put into Immediate Effect Following Passage on Third Reading

A new ordinance regulating traffic during a fire, was passed by the city council last night. The ordinance carries an emergency clause so the rules were suspended and it was passed upon the third reading. This ordinance was made necessary because of the way in which auto drivers have been impeding the progress of the city's fire apparatus, and because of the handicap caused by autos being parked in burning areas, their owners going off and leaving them, so that it became necessary to move the machines by hand in the event of a spread of the fire.

This new ordinance is now in full effect, and will be strictly enforced. For the information of the residents of the city, the full text of the new law is given below:

Sec. 1. That upon the sounding of the fire alarm of the city of Roseburg, or of any ambulance answering an alarm of fire or emergency call and sounding a siren or bell or other alarm known to be the alarm of warning of the apparatus or vehicle of the fire department or police department or of an ambulance, the driver of any other vehicle, other than a vehicle or apparatus of the aforesaid fire department or police department or of an ambulance, shall immediately bring such vehicle under control and proceed slowly upon the right hand side of the street until the location of the fire is ascertained or known to be in some other section of the city, except as provided in section 2 hereof.

Sec. 2. That upon the approach from any direction of any vehicle or apparatus of the fire or police departments of the city of Roseburg, or of any ambulance answering an alarm of fire or emergency call and sounding a siren or bell or other alarm known to be the alarm of warning of the apparatus or vehicle of the fire department or police department or of an ambulance, the driver of any other vehicle, other than a vehicle or apparatus of the aforesaid fire department or police department or of an ambulance, shall immediately drive as closely as possible to the right hand curb and stop, and shall not proceed until such apparatus or vehicle of the aforesaid departments, or either of them, or ambulances, shall have passed on for a distance of six hundred feet, and shall not follow within 500 feet thereof.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the fire chief to establish fire lines during any serious fire when in his judgment it becomes necessary or advisable, and to prohibit anyone from going within such fire lines except as authorized by some member of the fire department or police department, and when such fire lines are established it shall be the duty of all other persons to remain outside thereof, and it shall be unlawful for any other person to go within such fire lines.

Sec. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons other than members of the fire or police departments or the owners or drivers of ambulances to have or use upon vehicles in the city of Roseburg any siren or bell, the sound of which is like unto the sound of the siren or bell of any fire apparatus or vehicle of the fire department or police department or of any ambulance.

Sec. 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof or upon pleading guilty thereto before the city recorder of the city of Roseburg, be punished by a fine of not more than \$500 or by imprisonment in the city jail not more than 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 6. Whereas, the fire department of the city of Roseburg is greatly hampered in answering its alarms by vehicles traveling upon the streets, this ordinance is deemed of immediate necessity for the preservation of the peace, health and safety of the people of the city of Roseburg, and an emergency is therefore hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage by the

common council and its approval by the Mayor.

GIVES REPORT ON WORK DONE BY HEALTH UNIT

Editor, News-Review: For your information and that of your subscribers, I am submitting herewith financial and statistical report of the Douglas County Health Unit for the eight months ending September 30.

The value of the Health Unit has been secured by the hearty cooperation of the doctors, the teachers and the parents of Douglas county. Of striking value has been the reduction in the number of contagious diseases reported, as follows:

February 29, March 116, April 80, May 41, June 144, July 7, August 16, September 7.

In addition the Health officer gave 23 talks to 861 persons, 3,828 pieces of literature were distributed, 103 press articles printed and 8 exhibits and demonstrations held. There were 82 sanitary inspections, 14 dairies inspected, 54 water supplies investigated, and 27 nuisances investigated. There were 7 Wassermann tests made, 11 smears examined, 57 diphtheria cultures made, and 109 water samples examined.

The two nurses on duty made 105 nursing calls, 23 prenatal calls, 9 maternity visits, 4 preschool calls, 123 infant and 116 school child visits. They held 202 conferences, 1422 children were examined for contagious diseases and 2153 examined for defects, 190 health talks given to 3325 pupils and 77 sanitary inspections of school houses, 3 child clinics held and 125 examined.

The Health Officer made 108 visits to the County Home, 108 home visits, 65 visits to the city and county jail, 117 visits to the hospital, performed 29 operations, reduced one fracture, 1 dislocation, 2 obstetrical cases, treated 179 patients, made 21 investigations and examined 20 for insanity, 335 office conferences were held, 1710 letters sent out, 291 telephone calls and 11,222 miles travelled in Douglas county on official duty by the Health Officer.

ALL-METAL PLANE ON TRIAL TRIPS

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The navy's first all-metal airplane has completed successfully its preliminary trials at Garden City, L. I., the department announced last night. Constructed almost entirely of the same special alloy metal used in the Shenandoah, the claim is made that the new machine "combines the lightness of duralumin with the strength of steel," insuring "greater air speed, faster climb and low landing speed."

It carries a 200 horse power motor capable of a speed of 130 miles per hour.

FIRE TOLL IN THE U. S. ASTOUNDING

An average of 41 deaths and the destruction of property valued at \$1,770,000 is the daily toll taken by fire in the United States.

The annual property loss due to fire would pay one-half the interest on the public debt or maintain the army and navy.

It is the equivalent of the total yearly production of gold, silver, iron and copper in the United States.

It would pay for the erection of 2509 hospitals costing \$200,000 each.

To reduce fire hazards the fire department has formulated some simple rules for general observance. They are:

"All electrical wiring should be inspected and approved before use. Care should be taken in handling electrical heating devices.

"All gas lights or open flames should be kept away from woodwork and other combustible materials.

"An electric flashlight should be used in looking for gas leaks.

"Matches should be handled carefully and properly disposed of when extinguished. They should be kept in a metal container in-

accessible to children. Gasoline, benzine and kerosene should not be used to start fires. If used for cleaning, the work should be done out of doors.

"Chimneys and flues should be inspected, cleaned and repaired before winter. Hot ashes should be placed in metal cans.

All refuse should be promptly collected and removed. Good housekeeping is a valuable ally of fire prevention.

"Every citizen should realize that large fires usually are small at the beginning. He should, therefore, use every precaution to prevent them. They might not only destroy his own property but cause loss and suffering to others."
