SENATOR WHEELER TALKS IN PORTLAND

(Associated Press Special Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 7.—
Senator Burton K. Wheeler, in-
dependent vice-presidential can-
didate was enroute south through
Oregon today with only one
scheduled stop at Roseburg, after
delivering two speeches here last
night. He reiterated his charges
that Secretary of the Interior
Work had entered into the secret
agreement with J. P. Morgan and
company regarding freight rate
discrimination in Alaska, declar-
ing it enabled the Morgan inter-

Henry Cook, alias Garbutt, alias

she gave to him, Cook and his
adopted son, Gibson told the police
he was in the bathroom when the
murder was committed.

Senator Wheeler reverted to his
charges concerning acts of Cal-
vin Coolidge while he was gov-
ernor of Massachusetts in con-
nection with the Cosmopolitan
bank.

He reviewed the results of the
Teapot Dome investigation and its
ratification and declared that
while Coolidge didn't know of the
scandals everyone else in Wash-
ington knew of them, even the
school boys.

He attacked Dawes, declaring
he belongs in the same company
with Fall, Daugherty, Mellon and
Daugherty.
