## JESUS GREATEST ORATOR

I wish all political candidates and speakers could read a little essay on "The Art of Public Speaking."

It is by ex-Senator Albert J. Beveridge, who writes with authority, because he is admittedly one of the country's best speakers. His book is especially timely now, when many folks are first attempting public speaking to aid the new political movement.

What an abundance of rapid, meaningless and ignorant talk, what a supply of gesticulating and hammering and unwarranted emphasis could be done away with if many so-called speakers would only read and practice what Beveridge says.

"Oratory is an art, in the sense that music, painting, sculpture and the like are arts," says Beveridge.

Then, pointing out that it would be only the most daring or foolish person who would try to practice the arts of music or painting or acting—or even shoeing a horse, driving an automobile, laying brick—and the like, without practice and experience, he utters this proven truth:

"Yet, curiously enough, most of us feel that we can practice without knowledge or effort the two oldest and noblest of the fine arts, writing and speaking."

Robert G. Ingersoll, Daniel Webster, Wendell Phillips and Patrick Henry are listed by Beveridge as perhaps the four greatest public speakers America has produced—considering their efforts purely from the standpoint of oratory as an art and without reference to opinion.

"The supreme master of the art of public address" was Jesus Christ, Beveridge believes.

"The loftiest theme can be treated best in simplest terms," he says. "Take, for example, the Sermon on the Mount, or, indeed, any of the teachings of Jesus, who, considered even from the human point of view was the supreme master of the art of public address."

"Or take Paul's speech to the Athenians on Mar's hill, the finest example of oratory ever delivered by mortal man—or, not far below Paul's masterpiece, that of Lincoln at Gettysburg. These sermons and speeches were exalted, yet they were in the language of the common people."

The final rule for speakers, suggested by Beveridge, is one so simple that it would seem unnecessary. It is:

"Stop when you are through."

"All enduring speeches have been comparatively short. None of the sermons of Jesus could, by any possibility, have occupied three-quarters of an hour, and most of them must have been less than half as long."

"So be brief as you are simple, as plain as you are fair, and content with a good job well done. Stop when you are through."

## POLITICAL OVER CONFIDENCE.

The majority of people have some tendency to believe what they want to believe about politics. When the managers and newspapers of their own parties issue confident claims that their candidates are going to be elected, many people accept these predictions at their face value. Politics is a mighty uncertain game. Results that seemed positively sure are constantly failing to materialize. The undercurrents of popular opinion can never be positively estimated. The public may feel very deeply about a certain thing, while managers and forecasters fail to realize the strength of this sentiment. So it happens over and over again that results on which the leaders had banked with the most confidence, are not secured. The voters who stay away because they think the results are settled in advance, often look pretty foolish the day after election. They read their newspapers with disgust, and think that if they had realized the real state of things, they would have gone to a great deal of inconvenience to get to the polls. The politicians would better not crow too confidently about the success of their tickets. They have got to make their supporters feel that the battle is never won until the last ballot is cast. Managers and orators and politicians can never do the whole thing, but the enthusiasm of the average person must be enlisted. The average voter must be aroused from apathy, and made to feel the uncertainties of politics, so that he or she will speak to friends and neighbors and ask them to get out. Unless the disposition to work for political success is communicated to a multitude of inconspicuous people each of whom does a bit for the cause, political results are apt to prove quite different from expectations.

Don't be a slacker on election day. Show your loyalty and patriotism to your country by going to the polls and marking a ballot. How do you expect to get anything out of a government that you are too lazy and indolent to even express your opinion at the voting booth?

Anyway, we never did have much interest in a fellow—no matter what his sphere in life may be—who plugged for the enemy while his big guns were belching forth death-dealing missiles to the bodies of American soldiers.

We will all be glad when the November election has been written down in history. There is enough stuff floating around in the air to make a wild bull green with envy.

"Play ball" will now be diverted to playing politics.

DAWES WILL NOT  
"SOFT PEDAL" ON  
SUP. COURT ISSUE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
DAMES SPECIAL ENROUTE  
TO OMAHA, Scotts Bluff, Neb.,  
Oct. 10.—Charles G. Dawes, re-  
publican nominee for vice-presi-  
dent, announced today as he en-  
tered Nebraska for four speeches  
that "soft peddling" of the en-  
suing court issue by the leaders  
of the La Follette movement  
would not deter him from attacks  
on the independent candidacy  
based on that question.

Realizing that they are com-  
bining something instinctive in  
every patriotic American, they  
are soft peddling a little bit on  
this proposition," he declared.  
"But why is it there in their  
platform? Because in my judg-  
ment it had not been there, the  
largest portion of that aggrega-  
tion, the socialists, who are in  
the words of Eugene V. Debs, are  
in this campaign adhering rigidly  
to the socialist principles and  
flying the red flag—would not be  
behind this movement."

Mr. Dawes, in accordance with  
his announcement, entered Ne-  
braska prepared to continue his  
fight on the La Follette move-  
ment almost to the exclusion of  
discussion of the democratic side  
of the campaign in the home state  
of his democratic opponent, Chas.  
W. Bryan.

Four platform speeches were  
arranged for the republican nom-  
inee at Grand Island, Columbus  
and Fremont before arriving in  
Omaha about mid-afternoon for a  
night speech there in the auditor-  
ium.

## CITY TICKET IS COMPLETE

Burt Withdraws Petition  
Nominating Him as Can-  
didate for Mayor.

## COUNCILMEN FILE

M. C. Radabaugh Nominat-  
ed From Second Ward—  
W. E. Ott's Petition  
Comes too Late.

Warren Burt, last night with-  
drew from the race for mayor after  
his petition had been filed with  
the City Recorder. Mr. Burt's  
petition was placed in circula-  
tion yesterday, and was lib-  
erally signed, and was filed yester-  
day evening. Mr. Burt, how-  
ever, refused to allow his name to  
go upon the ballot and with-  
drew his petition. He stated that  
his candidacy was advanced with-  
out his consent, and that he had  
at all times refused to run for  
the office and had maintained  
that he would not accept the of-  
fice even if elected.

M. C. Radabaugh's petition for  
councilman from Ward 2 was filed  
last night, and his name will  
go on the ballot together with  
Stanley Kidder and Frank Lil-  
burn.

A petition nominating W. E.  
Ott as a councilman from Ward 1  
was circulated yesterday, but was  
not completed until too late to  
file with the recorder and conse-  
quently Mr. Ott's name will not  
get upon the ballot. It is ex-  
pected, however, that his supporters  
will write in his name. Storey  
Iles and Frank Clemens are can-  
didates from the first ward.

In the third ward Fred Riedel  
and Dr. C. B. Wade are can-  
didates, and in the fourth ward  
the names of Dr. C. K. Allen and  
G. W. Young will appear upon the  
ballot as candidates.

The withdrawal of Warren Burt  
as a candidate for mayor leaves  
the field to Dr. George E. Houck,  
and Dr. J. G. Day. Both of these  
were nominated by petition and  
are seeking the office.

For recorder R. L. Whipple,  
the present incumbent, is opposed  
by H. J. Watson.

W. F. Thomas, the present city  
treasurer is unopposed for the of-  
fice.

## SPECIAL DEVICE FOR FORDS IS SHOWN

A demonstration of the Buck  
steel rear axle attracted consid-  
erable attention today. The demon-  
stration was held on Rose street  
near the Ford garage and many  
representatives drove stock cars  
and trucks equipped with this de-  
vice up a 40 per cent incline. A  
special incline was built for the  
purpose, and the truck and tow-  
ing car went up the steep grade  
without difficulty, except when the  
runway became wet after a rain,  
making it impossible to secure  
traction. Time after time the car  
was driven up the incline, stopped  
in the middle and then started  
on to the top again. The device adds  
a great deal of power to the new  
gear and speed to the back wheel,  
making driving easier and safer.  
The Lockwood Motor company ar-  
ranged the demonstration, and is  
agent for the special axle in this  
territory.

## LATE WIRE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—An-  
other cloudless day with the sun  
promising to take most of the  
chill out of the air by game time  
was the weather prospect at 8 o'-  
clock this morning for the seventh  
and decisive world championship  
clash here today between the  
Washington Senators and the New  
York Giants.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—A dele-  
gation of Chinese merchants called  
upon Dr. Carleton Simon, deputy  
police commissioner in charge  
of narcotics, with a request that  
he aid them in ending what  
threatens to be a renewal of a  
long war in China town.  
One man was killed and two  
wounded in shooting affrays.

KASUMIGAUARA, Oct. 10.—Dis-  
appointed thousands waited at the  
waterfront here throughout the  
day for the appearance of Major  
Pedro Zanni, Argentine aviator,  
who unexpectedly delayed his air  
cruise from Kagoshima, Japan,  
to this port, the air base for To-  
kyo, by landing at Kushimoto  
where he decided to remain for  
the night.

The weather for tomorrow is  
unsettled.

An elaborate banquet has been  
planned for Major Zanni tomorrow  
night at the flying base here.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.—Chicago's  
board of education faces a par-  
tisan strike today when residents  
of the Englewood districts an-  
nounced 700 and 800 children  
would be withdrawn from a jun-  
ior high school and neighboring  
schools, because of failure to pro-  
vide for pupils of three element-  
ary grades.

The board promised to provide  
for the pupils, who later were  
transferred to other schools, the  
parents said. They recently were  
refused a petition for an injunc-  
tion to restrain the board from  
making the transfers.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—In-  
creases in retail food prices in the  
month ending September 16,  
ranging up to three percent were  
shown in all but one of 21 cities  
for which figures were announced  
today by the bureau of labor sta-  
tistics of the department of labor.  
Butte, Montana with a decrease  
of one percent was the only ex-  
ception to the general increase.

CARLELE, Ill., Oct. 10.—Four  
robbers entered the Baltimore  
and Ohio railroad station early  
today, held up the night telegraph  
operator, Walter Hayes, and es-  
caped with a pouch of first class  
mail and \$22,000 after holding  
up the operator at the depot in  
Sandoval, 14 miles east of here.  
The amount stolen at Sandoval  
was not learned.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.—Germ-  
any's capability and willingness to  
pay under the Dawes plan were  
discussed before the city club here  
today in an address prepared for  
delivery by Dr. Morris J. Bonn,  
German financial expert.

The question of Germany's abili-  
ty to pay as far as the loan was  
concerned, Dr. Bonn declared was  
easily answered by the fact that  
the annual revenue in a normal  
year pledged for reparation pur-  
poses is three times the total  
capital value of the loan. Other  
claims under the plan he said  
could be complied with fully only  
if there was a complete economic  
recovery in and outside of  
Europe.

There is little danger of repu-  
diation by Germany, he said, even  
though the government may be  
chaunted, for the Dawes plan was  
supported by both socialists and  
nationalists. No German states-  
man would dare risk through rep-  
udiation the future evacuation of  
the Rhineland, he asserted.
