SLUSH FUND IS THEME FOR LA FOLLETTE YET

Speaks to Detroit Crowds
and Says Republicans
Are Buying Election.

HAS LARGE AUDIENCE

Declares Finance Plan Is
Only Way G. O. P. Has
of Saving Candidate
"Utter Defeat."

dency into Ohio today, leaving
for Cincinnati, where he speaks
tonight.

The independent candidate's
address here last night was his
first in the middlewest. The au-
dience, the largest that has greet-
ed him since he started on his
present tour, time and again
cheered as he outlined his policy,
assailed the republican party
which he declared was not con-
fining itself to the raising of a
"slush fund" to save its candi-
dates from "utter defeat," and
commended Senator Couzens, who
is running for reelection in Michi-
gan as a republican.

Mr. La Follette also recalled
the Newberry case, asserted that
his proposal to curtail the powers
of the supreme court was being
misrepresented and declared that
if he were president he wouldn't
be willing to have a drop of Ameri-
can blood shed to protect invest-
ments of American millionaires in
other countries. Reiterating his
"slush fund" charge, Mr. La Fol-
lette said:

"The use of money in doubtful
states is only one of the methods
by which the republican national
committee and its financial sup-
porters are striving to have their
candidate saved from utter de-
feat, far more insidious, far more
corrupt in its ultimate social con-
sequences is the use of the fi-
nancial and economic power of
business interests to intimidate
and coerce citizens who are giving
their support to the progressive
ticket, this pressure is being
brought to bear upon business
men, home owners, borrowers,
and employees—upon every class
of citizens whose economic po-
sition enables them to apply the
thumb-screw."

With reference to his attitude
toward the power of the supreme
court, to which he declared,
"there has been widespread mis-
representations," Senator La Fol-
lette said:

"The progressives propose
merely to submit a constitutional
amendment, at some future date,
and after opportunity for ade-
quate public consideration, which
shall answer the question:

"Shall the people rule through
their elected representatives or
shall they be ruled by a bare ma-
jority of the supreme court? The
proposed amendment will not de-
prive the supreme court of any
power whatever specifically con-
ferred upon it by the constitu-
tion of the United States."

"The false statement also is
being spread that this proposed
amendment, if adopted would de-
prive the supreme court of pow-
er of acts of state legislators, and
that it would imperil fundamen-
tal rights, such as are involved in
the Oregon supreme school case
and the Nebraska case."

"I say that statement is
false. The proposed constitu-
tional amendment will in any way
affect the power of the supreme
court, except as related to acts of
congress. It will in any way
restrict the power of the court
to pass upon the acts of state
legislators."

"Thus it is that with false propa-
ganda and the use of money in
huge sums, in doubtful states, the
reactionary interests propose to
secure this election for their fa-
vorite candidates."

TYPHOON FATAL TO 30 FILIPINOS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
MANILA, P. I., Oct. 10.—Thirty
Filipinos are dead and many
missing as the result of a typhoon
which swept over the Ca-
sayan valley, according to a tele-
gram received today from the
casayan provincial constabulary
commander.

The report added that al-
though the typhoon occurred a
week ago, many sections of Ca-
sayan province remain shut off
from communication and the
death toll may be increased large-
ly when complete reports are re-
ceived.

The typhoon sank many
boats and launched and hundreds
of small houses were torn from
their foundations and carried
away.

Total damage done by the dis-
aster will reach several hun-
dred thousand dollars, according
to reports received here.

PETITIONS OUT TO EXTEND CITY

Many Signers on Petition to
Include District North
of Town.

LINES ARE UNCERTAIN

No Definite Decision Has
Been Reached Concern-
ing the Boundaries
of New Territory.

From the way in which signa-
tures are being attached to the
petitions for the inclusion of the
Riverside, Fruitvale and Jones
additions, north of the city, it is
apparent that this territory will be
added to the municipality within
a short time. It is very probable
that the city limits will not stop
at the boundaries originally plan-
ned by those desiring the inclusion
of this district, but will go west of
the track as well, taking in the
railroad property, and some of the
farm land. Several of the residents
west of the track desire to come
into the city, and it may be decid-
ed to extend to proposed limits to
meet their request.

So far little opposition has been
found by those circulating the pe-
titions. The general sentiment fa-
vors the addition of this district,
and few have refused to sign the
petitions. It has been suggested
that the city limits be made identi-
cal with the school district bound-
aries which would take in a wide
territory, but no definite decision
regarding the exact location of the
boundaries has been announced.

The residents of the districts
proposed to be included not only
feel the desire for fire and police
protection, but they believe that
their district will grow faster, and
increase in valuation much more
rapidly inside the city than out-
side.

A municipality is a separate road
district, and the county turns over
to the district the full amount of
road tax raised. This will give the
new territory considerable money
for road work, and improvement,
and it is quite probable that many
improvements of this character
will be made. It has been pointed
out that the cost of inclusion will
be light. The city tax of Roseburg
is nine mills. At the present time
the residents north of the city
limits are paying fire insurance at
the rate of \$1.50 per \$100, for a
three year policy. As soon as they
are included in the city this rate
drops to \$1.20 per \$100, a differ-
ence of \$30 on the \$100. This
takes three mills off the cost of
entering the city. As soon as hy-
drants are installed, and adequate
fire protection is given the district
will take the city rate of \$30 per
\$100, which cuts the insurance
rate six mills, making the cost
only three mills at the present
rate of city tax.

and to attack United States Sen-
ator Robert M. La Follette, in-
dependent candidate for presi-
dent.

In expressing his aversion for
Senator La Follette's independ-
ent candidacy Mr. Cannon said
he had little regard for a "man
who is elected as a republican or
democrat, and then turns around
and raises the devil with those
who put him in office."

"I guess I don't have to keep
my mouth shut about whom I
mean," Uncle Joe said, "it's Bob
La Follette."
