**STATE PRESS COMMENT**

**The Socialist Candidate.**  
Morris Hillquit, an ardent advocate of the doctrine of socialism, is in charge of the eastern headquarters of the La Follette-Wheeler campaign, in commending La Follette at the New York state-socialist convention, Hillquit said: "Let me say at the outset that the American socialist party has not given up a single one of its principles, nor has it been asked to give up any of its faith in joining this new movement. This movement will grow, and when it does the socialist party will be the biggest political power in the land."

Victor Berger, a well-known socialist congressman from Wisconsin, in support of La Follette, says: "La Follette is a socialist in everything but name. He has been one for 20 years. He hasn't voted the republican ticket since 1904. There is no reason why he can't be our candidate."

Eugene V. Debs, chairman of the national executive committee of the socialist party, and who recently was released from the Atlanta penitentiary for traitorous activities during the period of the war, makes the following declaration in behalf of La Follette's candidacy: "It is in no spirit of presumption that I declare a willingness to appeal to the shades of Marx and Engels (the founders of German socialism) upon this vital issue. I have the positive conviction that they would have advised and approved the course taken by our delegates at the historic Cleveland conference for progressive political action. No fundamental principle of socialism has been or will be in the least compromised."

The Oakland World, an organ of the socialist party, in its current issue declares that La Follette stands for the "three cardinal principles required to make a good socialist."

It is an old maxim that a man is known by the company he keeps. And La Follette definitely justifies the comment of the Palo Alto Times upon the decision of the California supreme court which denied to the La Follette electoral candidates a place on the state ticket upon characterization as "dependents."

"While the La Follette-Wheeler organization is put to some inconvenience and subjected to a certain practical effects of this decision, it degree of embarrassment by the practical effects of this decision, it is not placed in any false position. The La Follette-Wheeler following will have its chance to vote, since the candidates will be represented on the ballot by the socialist electors. And it is as a socialist rather than as progressives or independents that these candidates are more accurately labeled. The readiness with which the offices of the socialist organization were made available and accepted indicates this fact."

"Report to this arrangement would have been impossible for any team of candidates out of sympathy with socialist principles. The incident has served, therefore, to prove conclusively the claims of many of the La Follette opponents that his candidacy against the nominees of the two major parties has raised the issue of socialism in this campaign."
