## RULING MADE ON CANDIDATE FOR SUPREME COURT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
SALEM, Oct. 12.—The three candidates for positions on the Oregon supreme court bench to be voted on at the election November 4, must have their names on the ballot in a single group, with no information that they are to be elected to fill vacancies. The elections are to be full six year terms. The supreme court so held today in an opinion by Justice Bean, in the original proceeding in mandamus of the state on relation of C. J. Smith, plaintiff, against Sam A. Kozier, secretary of state, defendant.

The opinion is a victory for the plaintiff and knocks Kozier's certification of the ballot, whereby O. P. Coshov, democratic-progressive, and H. H. Bell, republican appear as aspirants to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Justice Lawrence T. Harris and separate from these, Percy R. Kelly, appears as an independent candidate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice John McCourt. Under this arrangement they were to be elected to fill unexpired terms.

The opinion holds that the manner in which Secretary Kozier arranged the names on the ballot is unconstitutional. With the three names appearing in a single group, and with the voters instructed on the ballot to vote "for two" it is generally believed that Judge O. P. Coshov, incumbent by appointment of the governor after Harris' resignation will have an advantage that he did not have with the names arranged as certified by the secretary of state.

Also the election of Kelly was certain as the names were arranged by Kozier, since he had no opponent for the McCourt vacancy, but under the court opinion he now has two opponents.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—Lady Marie Gertrude Decelis, widow of the fourth Baron Decelis and sister-in-law of the present baron, who married Helen Vivian Gould, is said by the Daily Mirror to be living in poverty, making an insufficient livelihood by keeping a small village store near East Grinstead.

She is quoted as saying that she has not a penny except what she makes in her shop and that she is sometimes hungry owing to the smallness of her income. She declares she lost all her money in helping another and that she would be grateful to anyone providing her with remunerative employment.

## PRICE IS DEFENDED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—The state game commission, in monthly session today, agreed after several hours' discussion to prepare a resolution deploring the action of the Oregon state sportsmen's association in requesting the removal of Richard W. Price from the game board.

The executive committee of the sportsmen's association at a recent meeting at Eugene called attention to a resolution to Governor Pierce to the purported non-attendance of Commissioner Price at commission meetings, and to his alleged discordance with the commission.

The resolution charged that Price, manager of the hotel at Crater Lake, was working toward the inclusion of Diamond Lake in Crater Lake National Park.

According to Price, the government has announced that Diamond Lake will not at any time be annexed to Crater Lake National Park.

## ESCAPED CONVICT RETURNED

SALEM, Or., Oct. 13.—Their attempt to "see the world" blasted by the police officials of Boone, Iowa, where they were apprehended, B. L. Sherman escaped convict and Eldon Quinlan, 14 year old son of John Quinlan, chief engineer at the state penitentiary, are back in Salem today.

They were returned from Iowa yesterday by the father of the boy, sent to get them by Warden Dalrymple; and this morning Sherman related how he and the boy evaded capture for nearly a month, but refused to admit that he enticed the boy into running away by telling him glowing stories of adventure and places to be seen, as charged by the prison officials.

Sherman said that he met Quinlan near a swimming hole in west Salem about 6 o'clock in the evening of the day following his break from the prison grounds. From there, he said, they walked to Rickeral where a truck picked them up and carried them to McMinnville. They walked and bumbled rides into Tillamook, and from there worked their way on to Astoria. At Astoria, according to Sherman they shipped aboard a small schooner for San Francisco and from there beat there way east by railroad, bound for Elgin, Ill. where Sherman's father lives. They spent two days in Green River, where Warden Dalrymple had been advised they had been seen, but evaded capture there, as they did in Denver, where they stayed one day.

## CHINESE SIGN AN ARMISTICE

(Continued from page 1.)

In the immediate choice of a successor to General Ho Feng-Ling, defense commissioner of the Shanghai-Sungkiang district. The appointment is regarded as patronage at the disposal of the conquering armies. Already there are four candidates for the place. Two of the contenders are adherents of General Chi Shieh-Yuan, military governor of Kiangsu province and the remaining two have the support of General Sun Chun-Fang, military governor of Fukien province, who is regarded as a controlling force in the appointment.

A municipal council proclamation from the international settlement issued here today, prevents street assemblies during the emergency and exhorts all residents to retire to their homes immediately after dark. The order names the boundaries of the settlement and rules that no one will be permitted to enter or leave unless they can produce evidence of being engaged in peaceful pursuits. The municipal council governs the international settlement.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 12.—General Lu was a holdover appointee from an old Anfu party administration and relied on his military strength to back up his refusal to vacate office. The move to oust him was started on August 27, when the Kiangsu military governor's forces, operating under instructions from the central government, attacked the Chekiang forces near Quinsan, west of Shanghai.

The Chekiang forces were torn apart by a revolt in their own ranks about two weeks ago. Until that time, they had repelled the attacks of the invading Kiangsu troops and were engaged in an encircling movement near Tai Lake, west of Shanghai, preparing to start a rear attack against the enemy. The revolt was the beginning of the Chekiang defeat. Their forces cut off by traitors in their own ranks, the Chekiang troops narrowed their lines down to a defense army south and west of Shanghai, but the Kiangsu forces, tasting victory pounded away at the northern front until they captured the important town of Sungkiang, 28 miles south of here a few days ago.

A hint of crushing defeat of the Chekiang forces was contained in the appearance here of General Wang Ping, defense commissioner last Friday night and was disarmed by French police before he entered.

Should the central government forces be able to police the newly acquired territory with a minimum number of troops the opportunity will be presented to withdraw the Kiangsu provincial forces to the Chihli-Manchuria border where the central government armies are engaged in an intensive struggle with the armies of General Chang Tso-Lin, who is fighting for control of the central government. General Chang, is an ally of the defeated Chekiang military governor.

TOKIO, Oct. 12.—Manchurian armies proceeding against the central Chinese government at Peking resumed their general attack on the Shanbalkuan front today, assaulting forts held by the central government, south of the great wall.

This information was contained in an official communique issued from the headquarters of Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian commander in chief, at Mukden this evening, according to a dispatch from Mukden to the Kokusa News Agency.

TOKIO, Oct. 12.—Lu Yung-Hsiang and Ho Feng-Ling who today surrendered the city of Shanghai to the attacking forces of the Chinese central government.

## LAND FRAUD CASE IS ON IN MEDFORD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 13.—Nora Anderson, a middle aged woman, formerly of San Diego, Calif., now living on a homestead 34 miles from this city, on which she was located by George W. Laidley and S. C. Ehl, on trial in the federal court charged with using the mails to defraud, was the chief witness at the resumption of the hearing this morning.

From her testimony it developed that a party of seven southern California residents seeking homesteads, and admitted that she had telephoned Laidley upon her arrival here as a government witness, and had stayed at the Laidley home for four days, "because she thought it would be nicer than staying at a hotel." She denied that her testimony had been influenced in any way by either of the defendants, or their attorneys. She said she was satisfied with her homestead and was now living on it. The witness said she did not "truly believe" statements she had made in an affidavit, "to the government authorities."

During the time Miss Anderson was on the stand Judge Bean took a hand in the questioning.

Mrs. Stephen A. Peck of San Diego, Calif., was the next witness. She told of being interested in an Oregon homestead and interviewing Ehl at his San Diego residence on the matter. Eventually the Pecks were located on a claim on Hyde Creek. The court also took part in the questioning of Mrs. Peck to bring out the full testimony.

Mrs. Peck testified that Ehl told her that the fee for locating was \$160, with a first payment of \$35 to cover the expenses of an inspection trip, the balance to be paid when located.
